His answer was: "My interest in the Alumni Association started during my term as Vice President External of the BCIT Student Association. Included in the responsibilities of that office was acting as liaison officer to the Alumni Association. In an effort to perform this, I contacted Dick Melville, Director of Information Services for BCIT. He explained that the Alumni Association had been relatively dormant over the past few years.

"I could not accept the idea that the common bond of having gone through the BCIT experience did not mean that much to people.

"I still do not accept it and I am certain that I am not alone in feeling that graduates of BCIT are still interested in what happens to BCIT today."

Well then, Virginia, what are lan Robertson's plans for the future of the Alumni Association?

As luck would have it, we asked him just

'Well, in the short term, I see the main task as being one of creating a strong awareness of the Alumni Association's existence. We plan to use this year's BCIT Open House as the focal point to build that awareness and are already working on the Alumni Association's exhibit for it.

"In conjunction with the awareness goal, we hope to maintain communication to graduates with newsletters such as this.

"Another short-term goal is to attract future graduates into the Alumni Association.

'As for longer term goals, the major priority is to build a grass roots Alumni Association; that is, encourage individual technologies to form their own associations

under the direction of the Alumni Association. I would also like to see the Alumni Association become a strong lobbying group to any administration that concerns itself with BCIT.

So you see, Virginia, there still is a BCIT Alumni Association. But lan's final comment should be made public. It concerned how he would measure success during his term as president.

'By the end of my term, I hope to have created enough interest that a full election can take place and that a majority of the 12,000 BCIT alumni will take part."

Cont Ed ready to meet your training needs

Continuing Education and Industry Services Division of BCIT may be remembered as "Career Programs"—or "Extension Division"—or "Industry Services". Now it has become one division, with its major objective to serve part-time students—on campus, through correspondence offerings, or on-site anywhere a need for training can be identified.

Grads normally face the need for more training as work experience and responsibilities increase. After graduation. Could you use some up-dating in communications, supervisory or managerial skills? Have there been changes or new techniques introduced into your career area that you should acquire?

Whatever the need, CE and IS can help you. If you are within commuting distance of the campus, BCIT can offer a wide array of night courses, special courses given in

two-to five-day formats, or part-time registration in day school technologies.

If you are interested in business courses and can attend from 5:00 to 7:15 p.m., there are dozens of courses at various downtown Vancouver locations.

If located in a remote area, BCIT can now offer 61 courses by correspondence—and that figure is growing each month. Training can be brought to your doorstep if you can assemble a group.

If there is a need for some specialized training, but you have not been able to clearly identify it, BCIT has training consultants who can do needs analysis on a contract basis.

And once needs are identified, program developers can design the required course, or courses.
