Installation of Telex in the Library Circulation area in late Summer now provides instant communication between BCIT and subscribers in Canada and the U.S.A

It is metered and charged for on a time-used basis.

September 19 saw the initiation of inter-library loan service by Telex between BCIT and UBC libraries when an introductory message was tapped. The direct-dial, no delay inter-connection should speed loans here.

Film bookings and Book Store orders are now facilitated by this means and other departments and services are expected to find it useful.

"Calculated costs of the planned alterations and additions exceeds the amount of money budgeted for the expansion," reports Chariman of the Technological Planning Committee R. S. Carey.

It is still hoped that expansion will be complete by Fall 1975.

"We will have to plan for the maximum use of our present class rooms, lecture theatres and laboratories.

To illustrate the extent of the problem, Mr. Carey points out that when the original class room laboratory block was built in 1962, the cost per square foot was about \$14.50. The estimated building cost of a similar building in 1975 will average about \$35 a square foot, or less than half the accomodation in comparison with 1962 for about the same expenditure.

"Recommendations of division directors and technology heads, on which the overall expansion plan were based, are presently receiving close scrutiny by the Executive Committee in order to effect substantial cost reductions and still retain the principle of increasing our enrolment of students to the maximum.

"We know that the number of students who wish to take training here will increase year by year.

"To further test estimates of student enrolments expected by 1975, each Technology Advisory Committee is reporting its best estimate from committee members who are in a position to know what to expect.

"For example, Hotel, Motel and Food Service Management indicates an expanding demand with great opportunities for employment of graduates in the future, whereas the Natural Gas and Petroleum Technology is new filling adequately the demand for training by students and opportunity for employment of graduates."
