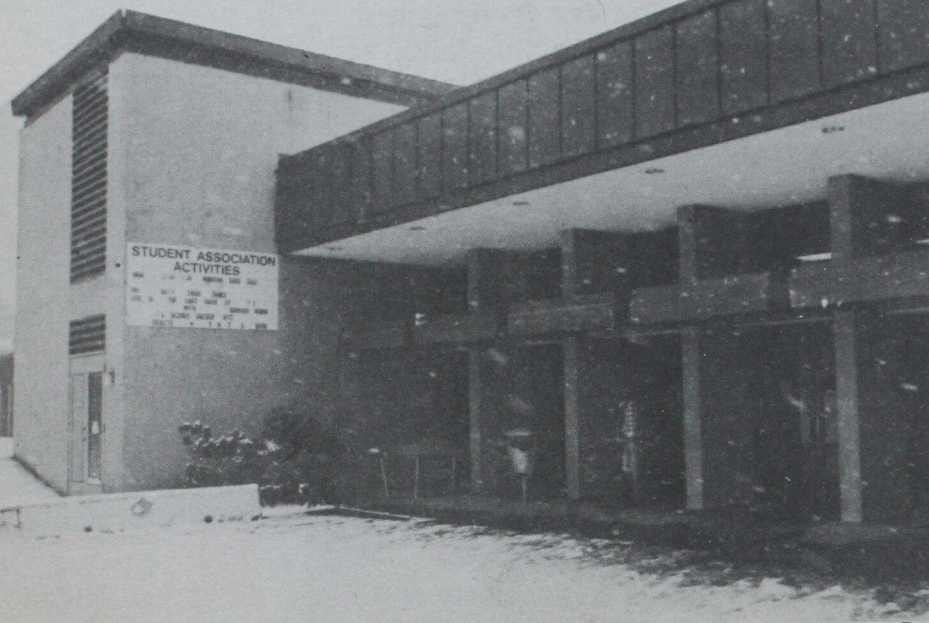

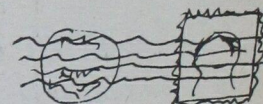

Quality the concern

"This," stated S.A. President Antoine Van Dierendonck, as he dropped over 200 pages of PPBA documentation in my lap, "clearly shows the cuts that are coming if Institute budget needs are not met."

Page after page, the implications of under-funding were there in black and white. Even if Ministry funding remained at 83-84 levels, cuts to services and programs would be necessary. But if budgets were cut by as much as just ten per cent, the effects would be far more brutal.

At varying levels of cuts, departments predict increased student/instructor ratios, reduced class hours and even potentially dangerous engineering labs due to staff layoffs; reduced program hours - in some cases to the point where certification or accreditation may be withdrawn; delays in administrative work, including financial aid disbursement; and the discontinuance of many support services. Departments also predict these factors will contribute to higher rates of attrition.

If funding were to drop by more than 15 per cent, however, many departments claim they would either discontinue altogether, or be forced to offer shorter, vocational level training.

"PPBA" stands for **Priority Planning and Budget Allocation Process**, and is an exercise the Institute is going through for the third year in a row. Departments submit documentation stating what services and programs could be maintained at the previous year's funding (level 3), what services or programs could be added or expanded in the event of an increase (level 4), and what impact a 10% (level 2) or 15% (level 1) reduction in funding would have, as well as the implications of 'no service level' funding.

"The Institute was told to look at formula funding to see what they would be getting in 84-85," said Van Dierendonck, "and it looks like about 3.8 million dollars less, and that is about 3 per cent down from 83-84 levels, so most people are looking at Level 2 funding."

"Already in some technologies, students are currently not getting the hours they paid for," states the S.A. President.

Level 2 funding means even fewer hours and services, something that deeply concerns the Student Association.

"At Level 2 funding, the Institute will have to increase tuition fees," said Van Dierendonck, "and we can accept that to a point, but there must be a guarantee that the quality of education doesn't drop. Otherwise the result would be a college level education at a higher-than-university price."

"And an Institute guarantee



doesn't even carry much weight, considering the promise they made last year when raising tuition. They were supposed to provide an extra 100,000 dollars in student financial aid, but as soon as classes started, the funds were needed elsewhere," claims Van Dierendonck.

Antoine admits the Institute may not have had much choice, but he says the Student Association is going to encourage the Institute to take a very close look at its 'high cost of management' and at all the paperwork the administration generates.

"We're very worried that our education will suffer, and that we'll be paying more for less."

The Administration is not solely to blame, says Van Dierendonck. "When you look at the budget pressure the government is putting on the Institute, and you look around and see industry demanding people with technological training, you wonder what the government is thinking."

Van Dierendonck says the duty of the Student Association is very clear.

"We have to bring up the level of awareness at the Ministry of Education that BCIT is not a college, but an Institute where graduates are in great demand by B.C. industry. Ministry officials don't seem to want to understand BCIT."

BCIT is currently looking at different methods of delivering its special brand of education, increased use of computer technology for example, but this area is subject to the same budget woes. "It takes time and money to develop new methods and cost efficiencies, which cutbacks don't allow," says Van Dierendonck.

Antoine recommends that students pressure both their MLA's and the Student Association, especially if they are seeing their hours cut already. "We can't take action unless we are aware of specific situations of course cutbacks."

This Friday, Antoine, Stefan Elmitt, Treasurer, and Phil Henderson, S.A. Business Manager are meeting with Duncan MacPherson, Bursar and V.P. Administration to discuss the pending tuition fee increase. About the same time, the budget committee will be submitting its report to the President's Policy Committee, with final recommendations going before the Board of Governors later this term.

Meanwhile, students are holding their collective breaths. So far this term, the government has announced the closure of the David Thompson University Centre due to high cost, and the three B.C. universities have announced tuition fee increases averaging from 22 to 33 per cent.

More on tuition and budgets

The budget meetings are over; Friday, February 3rd will yield the results. Student Association President Antoine Van Dierendonck will meet with Duncan MacPherson, Bursar and VP Administration to hear the grisly details and to put in a final effort on behalf of the student body. Although he doesn't expect to change what's already been done, Van Dierendonck does have plans to go one step further, and

ask Premier Bill Bennett for additional funds for BCIT.

Van Dierendonck is afraid that without additional funding, BCIT will become more like a college, lacking specialized training and high tech equipment. Claiming BCIT isn't and was never intended to be a general education facility, Antoine states "I don't even mind paying more (to come to BCIT) but there's no guarantee as to the quality of the education"

Van Dierendonck is further concerned that if the business community doesn't feel BCIT grads are being trained to industry standards, they won't support the Institute. And, his contention that increased fees are acceptable if quality is maintained is echoed by one first year student who stated: 'tuition fees have to go up, just like everything else. If half the province would quit or go on strike, we might be able to keep prices down. I know I'll be back.'

Cutbacks are being hinted at, however. According to Van Dierendonck, the Physics

department labs may be combined, even though the labs are said to be at near capacity and much of the equipment in need of overhaul. The Counselling department is also expecting a drop in funding. This would reduce the complement of counsellors even further. Antoine claims Langara has 11 or 12 counsellors to handle the same number of students as BCIT's six.

The student activity fee will likely see an increase next year. But, according to the SA Recreation Chairperson, Rob Paterson-Burton, it will be money well spent. The plan is to upgrade the Whistler Cabin significantly. The first move is to purchase the land, to the tune of \$80,000 and secondly to overhaul the building, an additional \$100,000 touch. Paterson-Burton said: "We

should think of BCIT gards who never get rich; as alumni, they deserve cheap accomodation. This won't be a dumpy little place for sleeping bags, but a place to be proud of."

On a final brighter note, Assistant Athletic Coordinator Jim Mitchell is lobbying for the return of extra-mural sports at BCIT, which were removed IN 1980/81. Mitchell has approached the budget committee with a cost per team per year of \$15,000. In the face of massive cutbacks, those in favour of extra-murals aren't too optimistic. Athletic Coordinator Wally Rowan supports Mitchell's proposal, but commented "there's just too much competition with television and video games. Who wants to watch a school team play?"

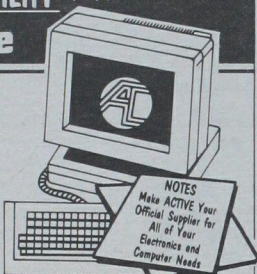
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Foreign students adjusting despite 'culture shock'

While most, if not all students here at BCIT have gone through a form of shock due to finals, many students on campus are experiencing a different kind of shock...culture shock. A number of students here are from many different countries - Hong Kong, Libya, Iran, Kuwait and other parts of Africa and Asia. Not surprisingly, many find it difficult to adjust to Western civilization.

Imagine having to learn social customs all over again, language, values, and attitudes and countless small things that we in North America take for granted, including how to make purchases, common gestures and facial expressions and what they mean and all the acceptable ways of dealing with daily life.

While the foreign students on

campus must adjust to our way of life, we can help them by having a better understanding of their culture.

In the next few months, we'll explore certain aspects of the many countries represented by the students here on campus. This week we'll take a look at Africa.

The fundamental unit of many African societies is the family, which includes the basic family structure and the tribe.

When you think of 'tribe', certain images probably spring to mind, most of them representative of Tarzan films. Today the tribe represents an extended family and is almost the equivalent of a nation. It has physical boundaries and sets guidelines for ethical and moral standards and acceptable behavior. It provides the members with physical and emotional

security and has rules governing responsibilities, society and the actual culture.

The tribe is so highly regarded that getting a job or education may depend on which tribe you are from. Politics in Nigeria, for instance, involve mainly tribal leaders, who are frequently among the candidates for national parties.

Another very important aspect of foreign culture is trust. Certainly it's important here, but in Africa it plays a bigger part in social interactions and day to day life. Friendship comes before business as opposed to the western way of 'getting the job done' first. African societies are warm and friendly, people generally assume that everyone is a friend until proven otherwise. When Africans smile, that's a good sign and it means they like you.

Once you are accepted as a friend you automatically become a member of the family. Because formal invitations are not necessary, this means you can drop in to visit anytime.

Making friends within the African culture is easy. Strangers are accepted quite readily and close bonds often develop because of business interactions.

Next column we'll look at two more sides of African culture; time and their respect for authority.

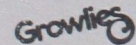

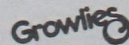

BCIT Board of Governors considers Ministry position

The Board of Governors rang in 1984 with an optimistic first sitting held on Wednesday, January 25th. A wide range of topics were discussed, the highlights of which were BCIT's upcoming twentieth anniversary celebrations, course changes in the Health and Engineering Divisions, and Government attitudes towards BCIT and other post-secondary institutions.

The consensus among the Board members regarding B.C. Government policy toward education was one of quiet condemnation. All agreed with BCIT President Gordon Thom that 'Further restraint will have an undesirable effect' on the quality of instruction provided to BCIT students. The point was also raised that BCIT requires additional consideration in Government funding due to the costly hands-on training provided only in technical institutes.

The Ministry of Education appears to be very passive in this respect, offering BCIT a substantially greater budget cut than UBC. Much publicity has been devoted to the UBC restraint crisis as a result of that school limiting enrolment and threatening monstrous tuition increases. Board members seemed to offer little sympathy for UBC in this matter, one suggesting

that '(UBC Pres.) Pederson should clean house before he starts to moan', implying that a well-planned budget would reduce support services and administration before making cuts that would affect student welfare.

Further BCIT-BC Government disagreements were visible during a presentation made by Brian Gillespie, Dean of Health division. The Government appears reluctant to assist in funding expanding BCIT programs even though Business is 'banging on our door looking for more skilled graduates', Gillespie said. These courses may have to be offered initially as continuing education programs until the Ministry endorses them.

All Board members were optimistic about BCIT's much publicized twentieth anniversary bash. Gordon Thom indicated in his report that he was pleased with

media participation and combined faculty/student response to the event. Thom added that he has recently appeared on several open-line talk shows, most importantly CTV's 'Webster', earlier that day. A ten minute video tape called 'Discover BCIT' was also mentioned, though not shown due to technical difficulties.

Upcoming events relevant to the twentieth anniversary were also discussed, most importantly the open house at BCIT March 23-25. Twenty-five thousand people are expected to tour BCIT that weekend, and a feature on BCIT is being run in the March issue of BC Business magazine. A rededication ceremony is also planned for

October 1984. A copy of BCIT's anniversary calendar was later presented to each member of the Board.

Some very positive thoughts were shared regarding those new programs which the Ministry has endorsed - notably, a one year survey technicians' program, a third year Natural Resources diploma available to graduates of the Forestry and Fish/Wildlife technologies, and a new Mechanical Systems technology which Board Chairman Malcolm Wickson described as a 'Hell of a good program'.

The final significant event of the meeting was the presentation of a small carving by Mr. Wickson to

past Chairman Alan Emery, a long-time BCIT Board member. Wickson briefly outlined the contributions Mr. Emery has made over the past few years to the betterment of BCIT.

Overall, the January 25th Board meeting reflected a positive outlook for BCIT's future. It only remains to be seen how well BCIT is received by the public through its twentieth anniversary, but all seemed very enthusiastic about the prognosis. One can only hope that a lack of Government funding won't prevent BCIT from accelerating to its full potential even in the midst of the economic crisis currently crippling post-secondary education in B.C.

PVI and the Ministry negotiate strike funds

Management at Pacific Vocational Institute is negotiating with the Ministry of Education in an attempt to retain funds saved during the walkout by staff in November.

The Ministry of Education wrote to the institute in November, stating it believed PVI saved \$158,900 through wages and salaries during the three days staff were off the job and asked the institute to remit that amount to the ministry.

Len McNeely, PVI bursar, said the institute then wrote to the ministry explaining PVI anticipated a shortfall of \$588,000 in its operating budget.

He explained the institute had 'performed a large amount of development work and we asked consideration be given for a part of development work to cover this deficit'.

He said the letter asked the ministry to waive the funds saved by not paying staff who did not cross picket lines and to fund the institute an additional \$430,000 to break even.

The bursar stated the ministry rejected PVI's request but did not elaborate whether the rejection was for the \$430,000 for developmental work or the \$158,900 saved through wages and salaries or both.

But the \$158,900 figure is disputed by PVI in any event.

McNeely said the actual savings were 'about \$120,000 as there are some costs (incurred

during a walkout) anyway'. TRAC was in operation, for instance.

And the savings are further cut, he said, by expenses directly relating to the walkout, such as the Labour Relations Board hearing which had considerable legal expenses.

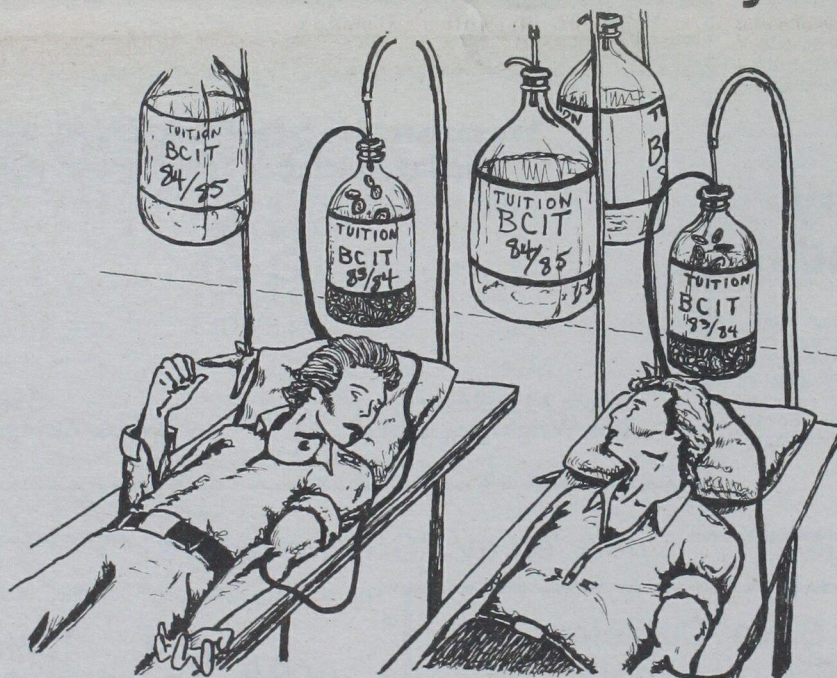

we are capable of, but it gives potential students an opportunity to see the options available to them in post-secondary education."

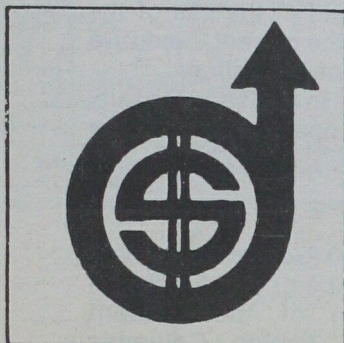
Melanie emphasises that no matter what technology you are in, you can get involved, and that Open House depends on that involvement.

In August 1981, the Presidents Executive Committee appointed the 'BCIT Task Force on Integrating and Improving Planning and Budgeting' to study planning and budgeting processes with the objective of installing an effective resource allocation for fiscal 1981/82. The Task Force, the President's Executive Committee and the Board of Governors agreed on the need to ensure that the allocation of 1981/82 funds was, and was seen to be, the result of an effective and fair decision making process.

The result of the Task Force study was the Priority Planning and Budget Allocation Process (PPBA). Management consultants Currie, Coopers and Lybrand, who were responsible for developing the process, report that the objectives of the first cycle have been largely achieved. These were:

a) To satisfy the needs of senior management and budget unit managers to allocate fiscal 1981/82 funds effectively and fairly by May 1981.

b) The active leadership and involvement of the Board and senior management who are prepared to resolve issues and decide on practical priorities.

c) As little documentation as is necessary to integrate BCIT planning and budgeting for 1981/82 and to justify requests for resources.

d) The active involvement of those responsible for results in the review of plans and in influencing decisions on their priorities for 1981/82.

e) A process that results in the information required for the BCIT expenditure plan submitted to the Ministry in June, 1981.

f) A process which, with little modification, can be applied to developing plans and budgets for subsequent years.

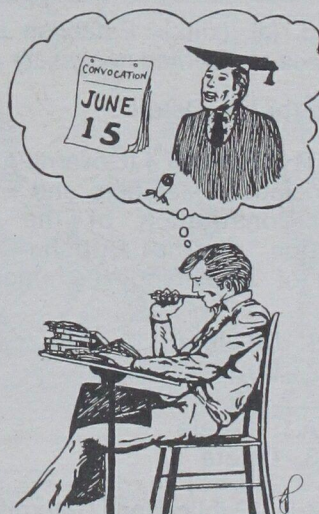

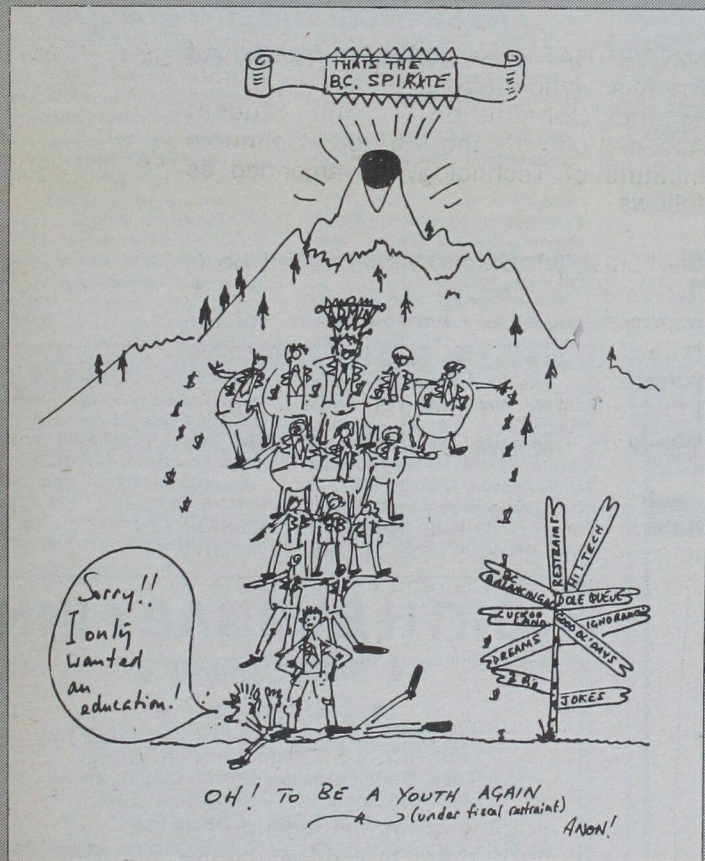
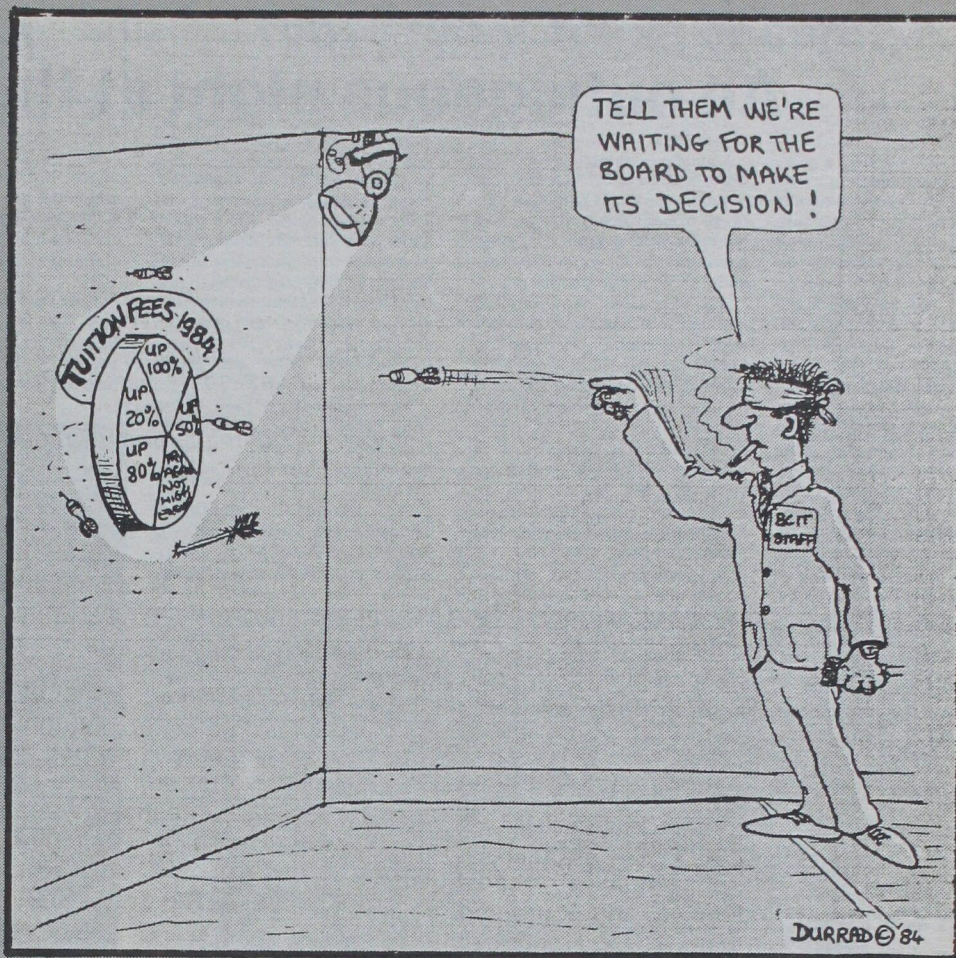

An outrageous night at the opera

NINA HAGEN is one of rock's most unique artists. It's a result of her ability to blend the most abstract and unusual qualities of her personality into a highly entertaining image. She projected this self-creation to more than 1100 dedicated fans at the Commodore last week.

Visually, hagen was at her best. Wearing a multi-colored vest, black tights, red shorts and a vulture's head (complete with protruding beak) strung across her crotch, she was indeed a delectation to watch. Her hair was not only different shades of fluorescent pinks, blues, oranges and greens, but it was also a variety of lengths ranging from shaved and spikey on top to a long pony tail extending to her waist. But a talented performer cannot depend on visual tricks

alone to substantiate credit to her reputation. It was the dynamic range of her voice that separates her from other singers. Her vocal span extends beyond the outer limits of the musical scale.

And of course, I can't forget to mention the make up, complete with black lipstick, highly accented cat eyes, and spakling beauty marks. Hagen is an odd sort of person, a little extraordinary, but her eccentricity is not feigned, it is definitely an integral part of her character. She doesn't wear an artificial mask that she throws off upon leaving the stage, she's just naturally unusual.

But although many of her songs were sung completely in German, her innovative use of cheorography enlightened my interpretation of their contents. She employed amazing brilliance

by executing her imaginatively performance perfectly and by never losing control. There was a continuing hint of humour and enjoyment throughout the entire evening as Nina introduced 'Solid Gold' and followed into intesnely clever versions of Michael Jackson's 'Beat It', Frank Sinatra's 'My Way', and David Bowie's 'Golden Years'.

Her treatment of each cover song was enhanced with her billilingual lyrics, bizarre appearance, dynamic vocals, creative theatrics, and professional musician showmanship. Hagen's backing quartet consisting of Merry Stewart:keyboards and clavitar, Steve Schiff:guitar, Karl Rucker:bass, and Sti Loroque:drums, played exceptionally tight stylistic variations of Euro-pop, funk and punk. Although a great majority of her material was from her new, more accessible LP, 'Fearless', she didn't neglect to do some of her earlier underground hits from her first two import albums, African Raggaie and TV-Glotzer(white punks on

dope). But her best material originated from her latest work, with her own 'New York, New York' standing out as one of her strongest songs.

Now that Hagen has moved to L.A. chances are she'll have the opportunity to visit our fair city regularly. She sells out the Commodore quite quickly each

time she appears and has a steady loyal following of fans. There's no doubt about this woman's unique ability to entertain with her wild appearance and shocking voice. If only she can ignore the pitfalls of becoming Americanized and keep her off-beat German culture intact and blossoming, she will remain an outstanding performer.

This movie chronicles the life of Shirley 'Cha Cha' Muldowny, the first woman to be accepted into the 'man's world' of race car driving.

Heart like a wheel opens with Shirley as a little girl. She enjoys it when her father sits her on his lap and lets her take the steering wheel. She is having a ball driving down the highway at high speeds. Then we see Shirley as a teenager drag racing with her boyfriend. She loves the thrill of it and wants to do it all the time. After the two get married, she starts entering competitions. This is fine for awhile but Shirley wants more. She wants to make the big bucks and enter the important races.

This doesn't sit too well with her husband who treats her involvement with the sport as a mere hobby. However Shirley can't accept this, and her obsession puts a strain on the marriage.

Besides the marital problems, Shirley finds it hard to be

accepted into the man's sport. She must overcome the chauvinistic attitudes and remarks to be accepted for her talent.

In the process, she loses her husband and takes up with Connie Kalletta, a famous driver. He believes in her, but soon the competition end of things puts a strain on their relationship as well.

The movie contains plenty of track action, personal conflicts and drama. Despite a credible performance by Bonnie Bedelia as Shirley, the film on the whole didn't do much for me. The thrill of competition, and winning, and the agony of defeat just wasn't there. If she won a race, that was nice, but if she lost a race, I didn't care. And this type of involvement is essential for a film like this to succeed.

The film is basically just an overview of a gutsy woman. That's great for Shirley Muldowny, but it doesn't translate into a movie.

As strangers meet

Another Australian film, another love story and another success. Yes, the Australian quality is there, with the accents, the drama and the subtlety, but **Lonely Hearts** is slightly different from most Australian films because it isn't set in the country.

The story takes place in a moderately fast paced city where everyone is out to make a buck and people have little time for strangers. Two strangers do meet, however, through a dating service, and the story, comical and serious, builds from there.

Patricia, played beautifully by Wendy Hughes, is a woman in her late 30s who has never lived her

Many love stories seem the same, and this one too may have some typical ensembles, but it is more honest and appealing than any I've ever seen before.

Confusion over sex seems the big issue for the new couple. While Patricia is seeing a Psychiatrist because of her inhibitions and hangups, Peter is seeing a 'raspberry', a drop-in hooker.

There is comedy in **Lonely Hearts** but there are also some sad moments. I wouldn't call the movie a tear jerker or a comedy, but a perfect balance of both.

Hardcastle (Robert Clothier of the Beachcombers) has arranged a meeting between his daughter, Kate (Kim Horsman) and a young chap named Charles Marlow (Colin Mochire). He hopes that the two will hit it off and get married. Meanwhile Mr.

Hardcastle's mischievous and unkempt stepson Tony (Stephen Dimopoulos) goes to the local pub and accidentally meets Marlow who is travelling with his friend George Hastings (Norman Browning). They're looking for the Hardcastle home, but Tony plays a joke on them and says that the house is very far away, but points out that they can spend the night at the local inn. The inn he directs them to is really the Hardcastle house. So the two treat it as such. However Mr. Hardcastle can't understand why Marlow and Hastings are so rude, as he

knows Marlow to be a kind gentle man. The mix up starts here and gets even crazier when Kate poses as a barmaid to see what kind of a man Marlow really is.

The production is highlighted with excellent period costume design by Phillip Clarkson. Much imagination went into the splashy colours and flowing fabrics. The set design by Ted Roberts is imaginative and colorful as well.

The cast is superb...the actors have perfect timing and mannerisms and work very well together.

She Stoops to Conquer is English Comedy at its best and will certainly get rid of your February blahs.

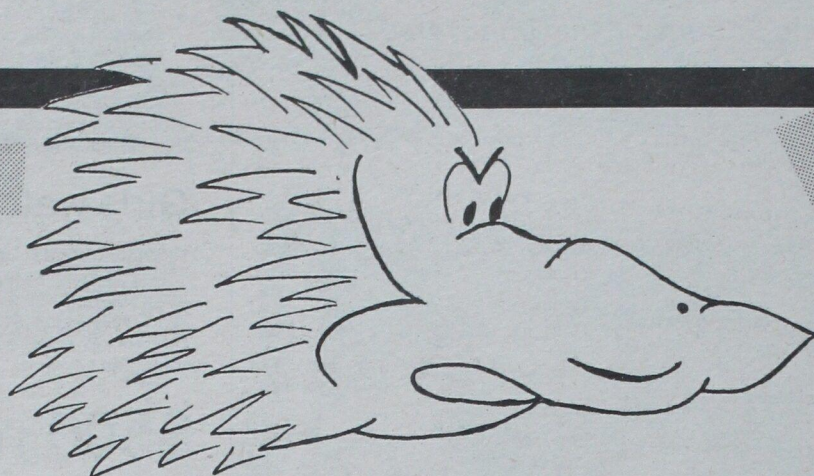
