## OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT STUDENTS PRAISED

Amity Cooinda Packaging of North Vancouver is so grateful to Operations Management students for conducting time management studies that they have asked for the following words of appreciation to be printed in the UPDATE:

"A 57 per cent reduction in work hours — what manager wouldn't be happy? This was one of the consequences of a study conducted by BCIT students at our workshop for mentally handicapped adults. Not an easy task, considering the complexity of the operation and all the variables to be considered.

Amity Cooinda Packaging Ltd. accepts customer contracts, such as plastic shrink wrapping of posters and smoked salmon gift boxes and trains the mentally handicapped "clients" to process them. The object of the workshop is to provide a protected environment, teach assembly skills and promote these adults into positions in the workforce.

Chief instructor Joe Ribic coordinated the efforts of Operations Management students in completing 14 Method/Time Measurement studies (resulting in firm recommendations) which concentrated on current assembly packaging operations. In one study alone, five out of six recommendations have been implemented. The calibre of reporting was professional and detailed, enabling us to follow through with the suggestions quickly.

The challenge to BCIT students in their analysis was to recognize the adult client's various skill levels and their ability to work with/without supervision. They were able to inject this criteria into their reports, making them workable and realistic.

## STUDENTS HELP SAVE RAINFORESTS

Students Derek Whitaker and Ken Gardner of BCIT's Horticulture program are trying to raise \$1000 in support of the World Wildlife Fund's efforts to save the remaining tropical rainforests in South America.

The students are spreading the message that, for the sum of \$25 anyone can own one acre of tropical rainforest. Any donation at all will help the students in their goal.

Each year between 28 and 39 million acres of tropical forest, representing an area larger than Austria, are destroyed or damaged. At current rates of forest destruction, three quarters of a million species will likely be driven to extinction by the year 2000 and one species in three by the next century.
