TECH CLUBS COMING

Elections are under way at BCIT now for Technology Club representatives. Under the terms of the New Constitution, each Technology will become a club with an elected President, Vice-President, Social Chairman and Sports Chairman. The President will be a second year student and the Vice-President, a first year student. Both will sit on the Students' Council. Sports and Social Chairmen may be of either year, and will represent their tech clubs in a committee. Each Tech Club will bid for, and sponsor all social events at BCIT and will receive 75% of the resulting profits. The other 25% will go to the Students' Council, who will loan the Club the initial funds. The purpose of the Tech Clubs, is to promote enthusiasm and coordination between the different technologies and years.

BOARD

The much awaited notice board is to be built soon on the two walls under the west stair case in the Foyer. Wally Quarry, vice-president of the Student's Council is not sure of the exact date the Dept. of Public Works will erect the notice board. "It will cost about \$800" he stated. It will be of the closed type, as this is school policy, so any student wishing to get an announcement posted, will have to submit it to the administration for approval. This is not what the students wanted, but it is a definite improvement over the two easels by the doors.

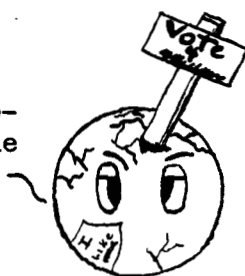
Applicants should see Mr. B. Frisby, Director of Student Affairs, Room 235-A.

1. There will be two polling stations open between the hours of 11:20 a.m. and 1:30 pm. on Friday, April 22, 1966. These stations will be in the main foyer and in the Food Training Center.
2. All posters and other campaign material must be removed before 8:00 am. on Friday, April 22, 1966.
3. In order to vote, Students' Cards must be presented. Those without student's cards will not under any circumstances be allowed to vote.
4. No one other than:
 - Chief Returning Officer
 - Deputy Returning Officer
 - Polling Clerks
 - Staff Advisors to C.R.O.
 - Retiring President
 shall be allowed at the polling stations, except to vote, not at the counting area.
5. If a ballot is spoiled, return it to the polling clerk who will issue another ballot. Ballots that are spoiled and placed in ballot box will not be counted. (Spoiled ballots - crossed out, changed or added to)
6. Partial ballots (i.e. with one or more positions not voted for) shall be counted.
7. All registered students in first and second year have the right to vote.
8. There shall be no voting by proxy.
9. Results will be posted in the main foyer as soon as a majority has been declared.
10. Any decision by the Chief Returning Officer regarding any election or voting procedure shall be considered final.
11. An advance poll will be open from 10:00 until 10:30 in the main foyer on Friday, April 22, 1966.

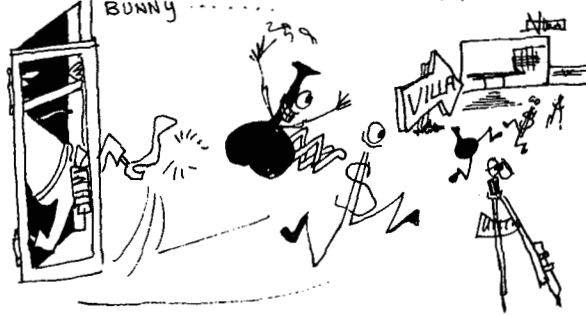
What happened to Bus. Man? Could it have been that unsettling effect of having to miss Mr. Riopel's Economics lecture in order to play the game? I wonder!

N.E.S. BULLETIN

The Student Placement Office in Room 222 has just received copies of a booklet designed for students of technological institutes covering the employment picture for graduates of 1964-65 across Canada. This booklet contains extremely interesting information, including starting salaries for several technologies as offered by employers last year, and a general picture of the employment situation for technological graduates as a whole in Canada.

You may obtain your copy by calling in to Room 222 and asking for the Supply and Demand booklet which, of course, is free.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT INTERVIEWS

Many students have had questions regarding the techniques to be used in interviewing prospective employers both for summer and permanent employment. In an effort to get some basic information to the student body, your Placement Office would like to make the following points:

1) Many employers make specific requests for a certain type of student or employment background when they contact this office. When this is the case, we go through the files, choose those students most qualified for the positions and arrange interviews with the employer. **YOU CANNOT BE CONSIDERED IF YOU ARE NOT REGISTERED WITH THE STUDENT PLACEMENT OFFICE.**

2) If the employer does not make specific requests, the Student Placement Office then advertises the positions by means of bulletins placed on the wall outside Room 222 and distributed to the departments concerned. You then may come to Room 222, pick up an

application and make an appointment to see the employer.

3) Many employers ask for a transcript of your marks. You should preserve all the transcripts you receive so that you may have them Xeroxed by the Library at a cost of 10¢ each for submission to the employer. **DO NOT** forward an original transcript to the employer. For permanent employment, he may ask to see all three transcripts. If you do not have your originals, the Registrar's Office will make

arrangements for you to get copies of them at a cost of \$2.00 each. It's a lot cheaper to save the originals.

4) When you are applying for a job, try to find out something about the company so that you may ask intelligent questions of the interviewer. The Student Placement Office has information concerning employers which is available to you any time between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. daily. This information is gradually being expanded and is easily available on our literature racks for your perusal.

5) You are not under any obligation to accept any specific offer an employer may make. Employers appreciate the fact that technologists are in short supply and many of you will receive several offers of employment. However, if you decide not to accept, you should advise the employer as soon as possible so that he may offer this position to the next man or woman on his list.

6) Some employers have offered employment other than that originally advertised. You can normally expect that if this is done, the employer wishes to give you every assistance in earning additional

SPORTS CLASSICS

THE DEMPSEY-FIRPO BATTLE

On September 14, 1923, ninety-thousand fans crowded into the Polo Grounds to see the battle between the modern David and Goliath. Dempsey, the defending champion looked like a boy beside the giant from Argentina, Luis Firpo.

With the first blow, Firpo caught Dempsey with a sharp right to the head, knocking Jack down. Dempsey bounced off the canvas and immediately caught Firpo on the jaw with a vicious left hook, and Firpo was down. Up without a count, the now angered Firpo landed a terrific right to Dempsey's body with enough power to kill an ordinary man. Jack just rocked back and shot a right to Firpo's head and Luis was down again.

Up at the count of two, Firpo was dropped again with a left to the jaw. Firpo got up and nailed Dempsey with two vicious rights, but Jack came back to knock Firpo down again. In all, Firpo was down seven times in that first round, but his pride and courage refused to let him be counted out.

Up after the seventh knockdown, Firpo called upon his last ounce of strength. Firpo landed a long right to Dempsey's jaw, which knocked Jack out of the ring into the first row of sports writers.

Weakly, he crawled back through the ropes with the help of the sports writers, reaching the ring at the count of six. He rose and stood helplessly against the ropes, an open target for Firpo's fists.

Unfortunately, Firpo lost his reasoning and, in his anxiety to finish off Dempsey, he missed with several rights. Dempsey fell into a clinch and held on for dear life until the round ended.

Firpo had spent his great strength and was an easy target for a refreshed Dempsey in the second round. Firpo was knocked out in just fifty-seven seconds, thus ending one of the roughest fights for the heavyweight title. What say you to that, Cassius?

7) Above all, you should make as many contacts with employers as possible. You may have a specific company or position in mind and we do not guarantee to discover every opportunity available. Check with the Student Placement Office to see if we have contacted the employer in whom you are interested. We may have some data of value, including the individual personnel manager's name.

If you have any questions or comments about the above information, do not hesitate to come to the Student Placement Office and see either Mr. J. Freberg or Mr. E. Rumohr who are placement specialists assigned to this campus by the National Employment Service at the request of your administration. If they haven't got the answer they'll get it as soon as possible.

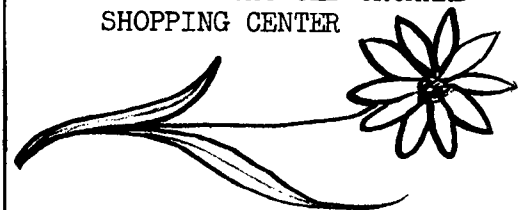
Some quick predictions: watch for C&S II in 2nd year and Business Management in 1st year.
