LINK goes daily

Word has leaked out from the publications department that there is a move afoot to provide BCIT's official news-organ, the Link, on a daily basis to compete against the establishment rag, THE GEORGIA STRAIGHT.

The pro-establishment, liberal rag, The Georgia Straight, has made formal announcements over the establishment, broadcast mouth-pieces that they were considering going daily to meet the needed services of informing the public of Vancouver council meetings, court meetings, intra-mural sports, free school school board meetings, etc. - providing a public forum for the status quo. Besides this, the Georgia Straight, in true capitalistic tradition, will move into providing added advertising space for department store sales and will print in full-colour their leaflets.

Their editorial policy will also be completely altered from an effort to reduce the high cost of drugs and bring them to old age pensioners at cost to


siding with drug manufacturers and pot manufacturers to entice them into their advertising sphere. The Link abhors such turncoating and thus will move into the daily circulation field in Vancouver and outlying areas like BCIT. Such a move, the Link publishing staff foresees, will make a definite alternative to the daily Georgia Straight. . .

"This is a two paper town," Roy Wood said at a hastily called press conference in the Beverage Room of the Villa Motor Hotel. "We are offering the people of Vancouver what it needs, another voice written by the same editorial writers."

However, moves to have the Link print from the same building, using the same reporters and belonging to the same Student Association union have been officially denied, but secretly confirmed.

Roy Wood, a completely unquotable man, said, "We completely deny such a move." However, when questioned further Wood said that the Link would be a mourning publication while the Georgia Straight would be the alternative afternoon paper.



THE POSITION:

This is an administrative position to carry out the wishes of the students through students' council. That is, he co-ordinates all the activities of the student association and maintains its efficiency.

Julio guides himself by ideas presented to him and by what student council wants, modified by his own thoughts on the matter.

TIME INVOLVED:

If one organizes himself well he will be all right and this goes for any Association position.

STRESSES:

The job can be overwhelming (as can any) but this is simply a matter of not letting things bother you. If a problem is too much there are plenty of students who would be delighted to help and if this doesn't help there is nothing preventing you from resigning. (In other words you need not be "carried off in a straight jacket".)

TECHNOLOGY:

The position is best suited for business technologists (Julio in Administrative Management). One reason is that they are oriented for such a position and also in certain cases course credits may be obtained (but don't count on it ahead of time). Again it is important to remember that work load sharing is essential if credit cannot be obtained.

SUGGESTION FOR NEXT PRESIDENT

- Use the system as much as possible
- 2. Use committees to relieve the work load
- 3. Give your executive the full responsibility of each individual's function.



REFLECTIONS BACK:

The executive was essential for the successful year. Julio is greatly pleased with the student participation in social activities and intra and extra-mural sports. Dividing the vice-president position into internal and external solved many problems especially the work load.

Improvement is needed on the social side, the social chairman needs help with advertising and organization — it's too much for one person.

The main problem this year was executive-student communication which was somewhat reduced by the Room at the Top page last term. Julio feels that it will improve with the new closed circuit radio loudspeaker system. There have been hassles with this because some instructors want control of it, these are being solved and will be eliminated with the multi-purpose building.

FUTURE OF THE ASSOCIATION

An office manager will be a necessity. He will be maintained on a salary basis and be permanent. His function would be to run the association's basic business and prepare necessary executive reporting. In other words he would relieve the executive from non-decision making jobs. It will be important to limit this individual's power which could be accumulative.

MONEY

An honorarium of \$360 is given by the student association (as it is to all executive members). This is not only meant as an incentive but also takes care of many additional expenses and compensates for some time that could have been involved at a part-time job.


ROBERTS' RULES OF ORDER

Julio guided himself this year on how council was run the previous year — a semi-formal system where basic rules were used to maintain order. The rules, he feels, if used rigidly would bog proceedings down and only a small minority would be proficient with their use. (This is what almost occurred at a couple of meetings this term.)

PERSONAL BACKGROUND

Julio was born to an Englishman on the Canary Islands and moved to England at one where he lived for 21 years. He then came to Canada and worked for CPA for two years. He heard about BCIT from an English friend Terry Wilshire our vice-president two years ago. From him Julio learned about the student association even before starting first year.

He is in the administrative management option of business. He hopes to get an administrative position with the U.N. in Geneva and utilize his fluency in French and Spanish.


I'm majoring in archeology I plan to be a rubble rouser



A MODEST PROPOSAL

Observing the off-campus and extra-curricular activities of BCIT students can prove to be a good exercise in sociology.

It appears as if many of our fellow students are leading rather schizophrenic lives, with one personality from 8:30 AM to 5:30 PM, Monday to Friday and another personality for the evenings and weekends. This fact can be borne out by watching students at school dances or school sporting events. Drunkenness and occasional rowdyism appear rather frequently as a means of escape. For the students who don't attend these events, other means of escape exist. For some it is dope, for others their own private means of letting off steam. In general it appears as if a large number of students are not leading the jacket and tie influenced life off-campus as they are on-campus.

Now a number of you reading this may think this is normal. But is it? Compare this with UBC or SFU (much as some of you may hate to) and you will realize that the students there have their lives much more oriented and together than a large number of BCIT students do.

This disorientation has a number of causes. The most obvious ones are the amount of work and the social pressures to succeed that are put upon the shoulders of each individual upon entering BCIT. The hours of classes per week here are higher than most other post-secondary institutions in the province. Certainly we graduate in less time than the universities, but is this load we carry beneficial to us in our two years here? I don't think so.

The social pressures of our work-oriented society to succeed and be productive, almost unbelievable in North America and these are reflected

In doing so we pay the price of giving up our private lives from Monday to Friday and being allowed to recapture them on Saturday and Sunday only.

Many of you will argue that we will have to do this when we get into industry anyway, so why not start now? This is a defeatist attitude and if we follow it change will never come. We must change things here and now if we want them to be changed at all.


Another cause of disorientation is lack of motivation. This is the main cause of apathy or non-involvement at this institute. Obviously a great deal of the students here only wish to take as much of the pressures of the institute as they have to and leave as quickly as possible to go out and "do their own thing". BCIT students are being dictated to and they show their response to this, by being involved with the institute as little as possible. One of the duties of the institute (which it has ignored) is to gear itself to the views and desires of the student body.

One definite step that can be taken to remedy this situation is via the avenue of a student body which has a major participating role in the decision making processes of the institute.

I therefore propose that:

- 1) Students be elected to sit on the Advisory Council of the institute and participate in formulating policies.
- 2) Students should have a voice in deciding upon courses of study and course content. Being told that the instructors and administration know best, simply is not a good enough excuse.
- 3) A student board be set up to make assessment of instructors. After all, usually the students know better than anyone else how good an instructor is.

Many people will dismiss these proposals with charges of "student power". You may call it what you wish, but it is a positive step in getting students really interested in the time they spend here five days a week and allowing them to have some voice as to how this time will be spent.

LOOKING AT THEN...


Painted shadows dancing across the wall, crystal vases blazing with firelit brilliance.

like a woman in labor, she bucks and tosses through her final days. . .


Washed by waves of miles gone by, cleansed by the wetted winds of seven seas.

NUDITY AROUND THE WORLD

There have been rumblings about dress problems at BCIT but we are not unique in this situation. Below is a copy of a letter indicating the dress problems in Malaysia.

Professional Circular No. 13/69 Pakaian Guru2 di-Sekolah

Many complaints have been received about the standard of dresses of teachers and teachers in training and these dresses are considered socially unacceptable in schools and teaching institutions. The coming to schools and to classes in transparent mini-skirts, and dresses with low plunging necklines revealing large areas of the bodies and wearing transparent dresses, is certainly not suitable as classroom wear.

It is generally accepted that teachers exercise very great influence over their pupils and their students and they share with the parents and the other community youth leaders the responsibility of teaching manners, morals and ethical values appropriate to the Malaysian society. These educational objectives are best accomplished if strict attention is given to the physical and emotional needs of the pupils by teachers providing and creating a favorable environment and proper appearance and personal good bearing when they are on duty inside and outside schools and in premises where they are involved with their pupils or students.

Appropriate dress for teachers is therefore essential in addition to neatness and cleanliness. APPROPRIATE DRESS IS A MARK OF GOOD TASTE. To continue the Tradition of high standard of dress the following minimum points are expected to be observed by teachers in schools and teacher training institutions:

- 1. Mini-skirts, extremes of open-back dresses, Bermuda shorts, tight jeans and dresses with low necklines will not be accepted.
- 2. Excessive make-up is not in good taste.
- 3. Colorful Hawaian shirts are not appropriate.

4. Long unkempt hair.

Please refer to para. 3 of Ministry of Education's Professional Circular No. 11/68 dated 25th September, 1968 regarding dress for Physical Education.

Please bring to the notice of all teachers the contents of this circular.


