APPLICATION FORMS by Bev English

In order to get an interesting, high-paying job, you must first get an interview. In order to get an interview, you must be able to communicate effectively in writing. The written word, as presented in your application form and your resume, will give

a prospective employer a first impression of you.

Here are some pointers to remember when completing an application form. Remember, most of the employers who recruit on-campus will request that you complete the standard application form supplied by the Canada Employment Centre on-

campus.

1. If possible, take the application form home to complete on your own time and in your own surrounding. Remember that neatness is very important to visual impact.

2. Read the form carefully before attempting to complete it. This will help you avoid entering information in the wrong section.

3. Under the 'Work Experience' section of the application do not put 'student'. Begin with your most recent job and continue to list them in reverse order. Remember that a practicum

which is part of your course is considered to be work experience (eg Directed Studies). 4. Most forms request narrative comments regarding your extracurricular activities, your hobbies, the type of work you desire and any additional information relevant to the field of work for which you are applying. Remember to keep it simple. This is not the time to write your autobiography. 5. Review your application form carefully. Grammar, sentence structure and spelling must be perfect. No exceptions may be made to this rule.

6. You will have to supply the names and addresses of at least two references. Keep a list handy and remember to inform these people that you are using them as reference. 7. Remember to sign and date the application form. This is the most frequent omission noted by employers.

Now that you have completed the application form, make a copy of it. This will help you save time when you complete other application forms.

Get it in on time! Most job vacancies will have an application deadline. If your application is late, it will not be considered for an interview.

Help still available

Financial Assistance Available for the Spring Term

Students experiencing financial difficulties should be aware that they can still apply for the following types of student aid:

1. BC Student Assistance (Canada Student Loan/BC Grant)

Students who have not yet applied for BC Student Assistance for the 83-84 academic year can still do so. For students in most technologies the deadline for submitting applications is March 16, 1984.

Students who applied for BCSAP earlier in the year but wish to have a reassessment of their award should make an appointment with a Counsellor. The deadline for submitting Requests for Reassessment is March 16 (for most technologies).

2. BCIT Spring Bursaries

The deadline for applying for Spring term Bursaries is January 20, 1984. Both first and second year students can apply.

Bursaries are non-repayable grants that vary between \$100 and \$1000. Applicants must make a good case that they have exhausted all other potential sources of funds and still find they will be short of money to finish their year. Students must have an overall average of not less than 60 per cent at Christmas to be considered for a Bursary.

3. BCIT Emergency Loans

Students who are expecting to receive funds from a source such as a Canada Student Loan or a B.C. Grant may find themselves in financial difficulty on a short term basis. Such students can apply for a BCIT Emergency Loan. To do so, they must make an appointment with a Counsellor.

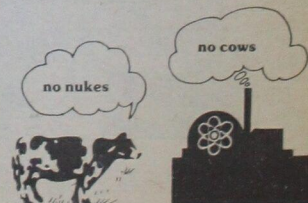

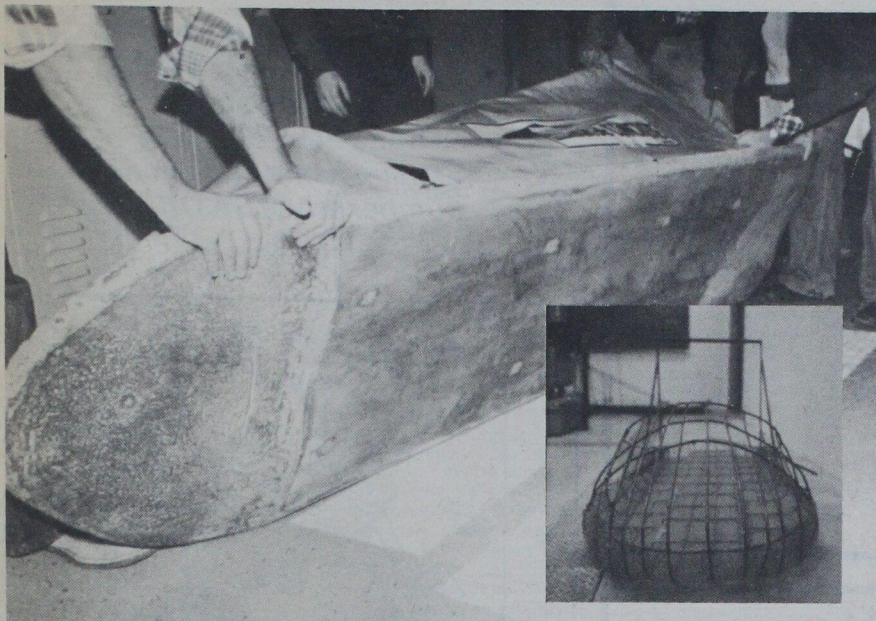

In just one short month, as many as thirty Civil and Structural students will climb aboard several concrete toboggans and race down a hill in an attempt to beat the time of similarly equipped students from other colleges and universities.

In case the reference to a 'concrete toboggan' slipped by you, let's explain what this is all about.

These toboggans are actually

constructed of a slab of concrete, and weigh from 140 to over 900 pounds, and carry up to five students each. But don't laugh, they can move - over 60 km an hour in fact!

Six Health Mistakes Not to Make on Campus

Health mistakes students make are more likely to be those of omission rather than commission. It's the things you don't do that are more likely to make your body rebel, rather than those you do.

1. Don't skip real food and become a victim of 'snack malnutrition'. many students fall into the habit of surviving on snacks, a soda and cheese and



crackers from a vending machine, a sweet roll and coffee for breakfast, maybe even for lunch. This kind of eating can put on extra pounds. Buy a good nutrition and calorie book so you can pick low-calorie, high-nutrition foods.

2. Don't fail to recognize stress as a big college problem. It has

its own special built-in stresses, such as: exams, grades, and new social situations. This stress often manifests itself in headaches, stomach upsets and fatigue. Recognizing it, makes it less frightening.

3. Don't ignore a recurrent physical symptom. See your doctor or one in Medical Services in the SAC Building.

4. Don't let fear keep you from getting help if you think you've caught VD. See your own doctor or one in Medical Services. All visits are confidential.

5. Young women account for the greatest increase in cigarette smoking in this country, and women are beginning to figure more prominently in heart attacks statistics, so think before you start to smoke. Once you're hooked, it's very hard to stop.

6. Don't assume the whole year is shot of you get mononucleosis. The anxiety of students who learn they have it, more often causes the need for

prolonged rest than the disease itself. See your own doctor or one in Medical Services and above all, keep calm.

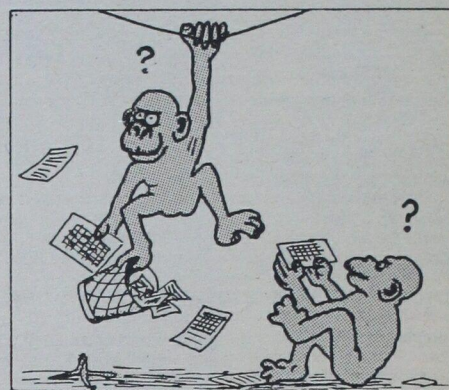

Unbelievable character ruins great show

It took Barbra Streisand 14 years to finally make this film and she should not be disappointed with the results. She's hit every major magazine cover and been the subject of many an article and review. She even had a whole hour of the ABC newsmagazine 20/20 devoted to her. Why? Because never in the history of motion pictures has a woman co-

produced, co-authored, starred and directed, all in one film. Naturally, she sang all the songs, too.

Part musical, part comedy, part drama with satirical overtones, *Yentl* is the story of a young Jewish girl in turn-of-the-century Poland. Not satisfied with being a dutiful daughter who cooks, cleans and prepares to become a dutiful wife, Yentl has a passionate desire for

learning. She wants to study the Talmud-sacred writing - a privilege reserved only for men. When her father dies, Yentl sees opportunity knock and answers.

Disguised as a boy, she begins her studies. Here she meets Avigdor (Mandy Patinkin), a man's man and scholar extraordinaire. They become fast friends and Yentl becomes increasingly devoted to him, so much so that when he is denied marriage to Hadass (Amy Irving), his beloved, Yentl agrees to marry her instead. This way Avigdor can still visit Hadass. Needless to say, this situation provides most of the laughs in

the movie as Yentl gently tries to avoid consummation of the marriage. But how much can a poor girl take? Eventually the stress and her innermost feelings become too much to bear and Yentl finally reveals her secret to Avigdor as well as, surprise, surprise, her love for him.

Streisand unmistakably possesses one of the greatest singing voices of our time and she belts out a few good ones in this movie. As a director she elicits satisfactory performances from her cast. There are some beautifully filmed scenes of rain and

starfilled skies but nothing breathtaking. As an actress, she can hold her own; the scene where she 'bares' her soul to Avigdor is particularly touching.

Unfortunately, in this film, as in most of her others, Barbra is always Barbra. Not for one moment did I believe she was a yeshiva boy. Her face and her personality are too unique to be disguised. So, unless you're an avid Streisand fan, this film is not for you. She deserves much credit for pulling off such an enormous undretaking, but fails in the believability department. Great singer - yes, but a yeshiva boy? I just don't buy it.

Dull movie

Meryl Streep has done it again - another fine performance by this competent actress. Unfortunately that's the only thing the movie *Silkwood* is...a bunch of performances.

Streep plays Karen Silkwood, the woman who was contaminated at the Kerr-McGee nuclear plant ten years ago. She also became a union activist and apparently had documents to show how badly the plant was being run. She set out to meet a New York Times reporter, but never made it. She died - her car went off the road. Some say she was murdered.

I'm not trying to downplay the

importance of Karen Silkwood, but her life doesn't make much of a movie. Most of the time we see Silkwood at the home she shares with her boyfriend, Drew (Kurt Russell) and her girlfriend dolly (Cher). They work, sit around, eat, drink, talk and chain smoke. In this respect, the daily life of a one industry or plant town is shown quite effectively. But watching someone else's dull life doesn't make a movie very entertaining. The key dramatic scenes at the nuclear plant are limited to a select few.

So Silkwood is a movie which showcases good, capable acting, but on the whole, it leaves you empty.

These Stones

have gathered no moss

UNDERCOVER (WEA)

A new label and a new record from one of rock's oldest surviving groups, some say the world's greatest rock and roll band. Ever since the Stones released *Some Girls* back in 1981, they have been making some consistently energetic and outstanding records. Despite the slump they experienced in the early to mid-seventies with *Goats Head Soup* and *Black and Blue*, they have once again established their superiority by writing and producing some of the best music on the charts today.

The Rolling Stones are not fading old timers stretching their luck. With each successive release of original material, they are rocking our socks off. Despite the fact that sex symbol Mick Jagger turned forty years old this past summer, the Stones show no signs of slowing down. Perhaps to some (myself included) he wears it well and physically looks more appealing. His rich flexible voice has also ripened over the years like a fine wine.



Undercover is the Stones' first release since before their '81 tour with new material, and its

good to hear they haven't lost their touch. With songs like *She was Hot*, and *Too Tough*, Jagger

and Richards prove they still have the chemistry to create mean rock and roll. The Rolling Stones still thrive on the success of their sexist lyrics and arrogant snotty attitude, although they have cleaned up their appearance and polished their reputations more recently.

With this album, the Glimmer Twins go beyond the usual cheap portrayal of women and succeed with political scorn in songs like *Undercover of the Night*. The Rolling Stones have never been known for their political comments, so it seems a little unusual for them to show any concern. These ideas are intensified upon viewing the violent video of the song. But it's a pleasant surprise to hear Jagger and Richards writing material with substance rather than reinforcing their male chauvinistic attitudes.

This disposition is continued on side two with *Too Much Blood*, a rap number concerning social deviance in our so-called civilized society. The Stones still deliver their blues with slick soulful originality. Ever since the beginning, the Stones have included their own versions of old blues classics emphasizing

their black roots. I remember their debut LP contained only one song penned by Jagger and Richards, as compared to this latest release which is 100 per cent original material.

It's great to know the Stones still have the spunk to stay on top unlike many of their counterparts. Hopefully, the Stones will include Vancouver on their next North American tour, and in the meantime I'll keep *Undercover* close to my turntable!
