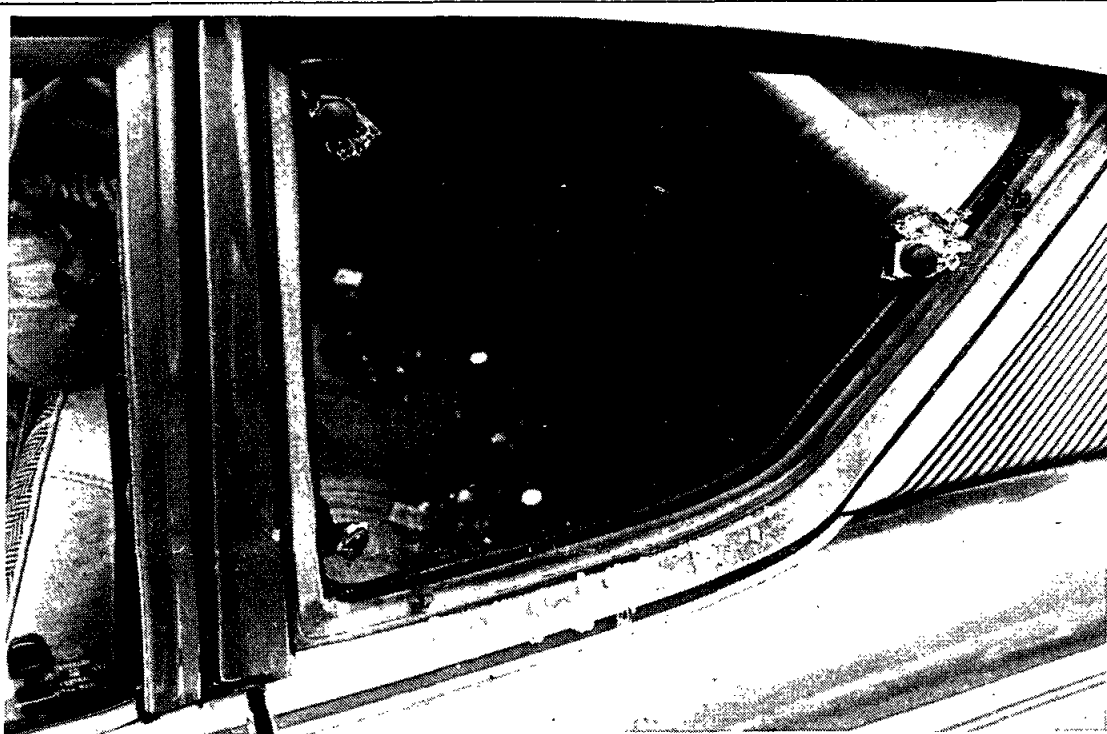

RENOVATIONS CONTINUE

Renovations continue to be made to the Student Activity Centre (SAC) in order to have the new food facilities ready within two weeks. Walk-in coolers, triple sinks, food preparation areas, and a number of other equipment is currently being installed, as well as the new plumbing and electrical hook-ups made necessary by the new additions. The overall plan is to have a complete food outlet in the SAC cafeteria offering breakfast and lunch to all students.

Adjacent to the new food outlet will be constructed a 'two way' liquor outlet, which will allow the pub to serve the cafeteria and the lobby either simultaneously or on an individual basis as the situation demands.

In the past, the whole pub operations had to shut down when some outside activity such as high school basketball was scheduled in the gymnasium. By sealing off the cafeteria from the lobby when this is taken over by outside groups, the new system will keep the booze freely flowing in one half of the SAC at least and should prevent screams of frustration from thwarted drinkers and make everybody happy.

The new pub location will, if all

goes as planned, feature draft beer. (I hear cheering in the background.) They will have a large walk-in cooler, which will ensure that the beer and wine remains cold at all times, as opposed to the old ice trays. Rob Slavik and the Student Association assure the LINK that they are all working hard to get the new food outlet open at the earliest date possible. With the flurry of activity that has been going on in the last few weeks, we can sympathize with the effort needed to get the job done.

You have probably noticed the new 'token' system that has been introduced at the SAC pub. These tokens are redeemable instantly, or at any future pub or dance you may attend.

The prices are 85 cents for a red token and \$1.25 for a white token. The red tokens are good for local and U.S. beer, cider or a glass of wine. The white tokens are good for an imported beer or, in sufficient numbers, a bottle of wine (three white tokens for a bottle of local wine, four or five for a bottle of imported).

The pub is open from 4:30 to 11:00 p.m. Monday thru Thursday, 3:30 to 1:00 a.m. Fridays and 1:00 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. Saturdays.

BCIT'S OWN DEMO DERBY

Here at BCIT you have the fortune (misfortune) to have as a parking lot the only below sea level swamp in British Columbia. It is, as many students put it, 'a fucking ridiculous situation'. And it's getting worse all the time. During the summer close to 200 student spaces were taken from the paved lot for new faculty. According to the administration, they relocated the 200 spaces throughout 'the swamp' area, although we couldn't tell you exactly where. They certainly are not much in evidence.

We mentioned it is getting worse. However, the blame cannot be placed on any one group of people.

The administration should all be hung for allowing the situation to degrade to the point it has. The commissioners should all be shot. While they are out in full force with their puddle-jumpers and Dick Tracy radios guarding the precious staff parking, the students' gravel lot is filling rapidly. Cars are being parked anywhere and everywhere, creating such a mess that nobody can get in or out when it's time to leave.

This brings us to the students themselves. It is amazing how some people feel it is their right to park wherever they damn well please. Last Thursday morning someone had parked a car in the middle of the through lane, completely blocking off a good 100-150 cars. Someone else, in order to get out, had smashed the rear side window, opened the door, and rolled the car about 30 feet down the lane. The commissioners who had arrived on the scene figured that they should tow away some 30 to 40 cars that were poorly or illegally parked. Consulting with whoever was on the other end of the walkie-talkies convinced them to forego the towing solution and let the students sort it out themselves.

This is not the first time a car has been broken into, bumped, dented or otherwise damaged by others trying to get out of the scramble lot. One only needs to ask 2nd year students to find how common this type of destruction is.

Complaints about the parking situation have been going on for years now without any effect. Unfortunately complaining is the easiest thing in the world and a very convenient substitute for action. If we really want to improve the situation the students themselves will have to take the responsibility for 'the swamp'. No one in the past has been willing to do that and it is up to this year's student body to get something going.

We are very interested in hearing from you on this matter - comments, suggestions, or anything. Write us a letter and drop it off at the LINK offices.

To those of us who have never been seriously ill, Cystic Fibrosis is something remote. It's one of those diseases that you hear of now and then in relation to fund raising drives and the like. But do you really know about it?

Can you imagine the anguish of the parents when they discover that their child will have to spend his life making endless trips to doctors, clinics, and CF centres? And what about the child? Drugs by the handful. Physical therapy. Sleeping in mist tents. These are just some of an endless round of treatments that the CF

SA constitution amendments proposed

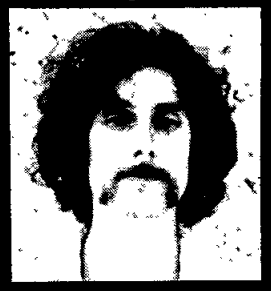
The Student Association executive is considering amending the bylaws of its Constitution. The changes proposed specifically concern the Annual General Meeting.

Changes in library

A plethora of changes has taken place in the BCIT Library over this past summer and one of the most interesting is the Library's shift away from the card catalogue to the microcatalogue.

Besides pointing out that the Student Association had, by a unanimous motion, come out against the increase, Tom noted that students are not financially that well off to be able to afford the increase. He also noted that now would be an excellent time to introduce a bus pass system for the students...

Apathy marches on... Under discussion is a recommendation by Tom Friedrich that the quorum requirement for the Annual Student Association General meeting be dropped from 10 per cent or 400 people down to 50 people. Besides the lack of interest, there was some question whether there was any room at BCIT licensed to hold 400 people at a time... Last year's general meeting didn't come off as it was never called...

The Suds Sweepstakes have been settled. The Executive has decided to go with Carling-O'Keefe draft beer this year. After meeting with representatives of the big three, it was decided that a change was needed from

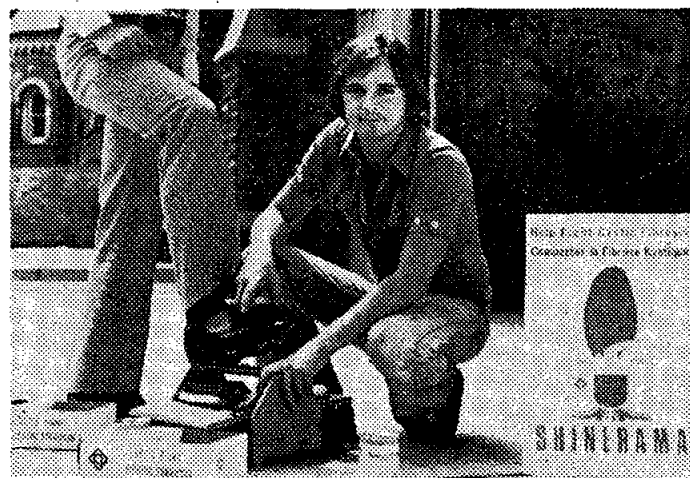

•When you are parking in the scramble lots in the morning, whether it's 8:29 or not, think before you park. Don't block off other cars so they won't be able to get out. In this issue you will see graphically what can happen. Also, you should know that right now the Security people are not towing away cars because it's the beginning of the school year and there is a bit of a grace period while you new students get used to the parking regulations. In a week or two you will be expected to respect the parking rules or pick your car up at Busters for \$25.

•When you come to the dances at night, you won't be able to park in the rear parking lot. This is because of noise complaints from Greentree Village, and if we want to keep our liquor license, we can't have people laying rubber at one o'clock in the morning.

•Consider forming a car pool. As you get to know other students here, you are bound to meet someone who lives close enough or whose route coincides with yours to make the idea of sharing travel practical. There is a car pool board in the hallway across from the Student Association offices in the SAC.

•I'd like to warn you about theft on the campus. When you put several hundred cars in one area you might as well invite every thief in the district over. If you have a tape deck, leather coat, or any valuable, for God's sake, lock

Yearbook on sale

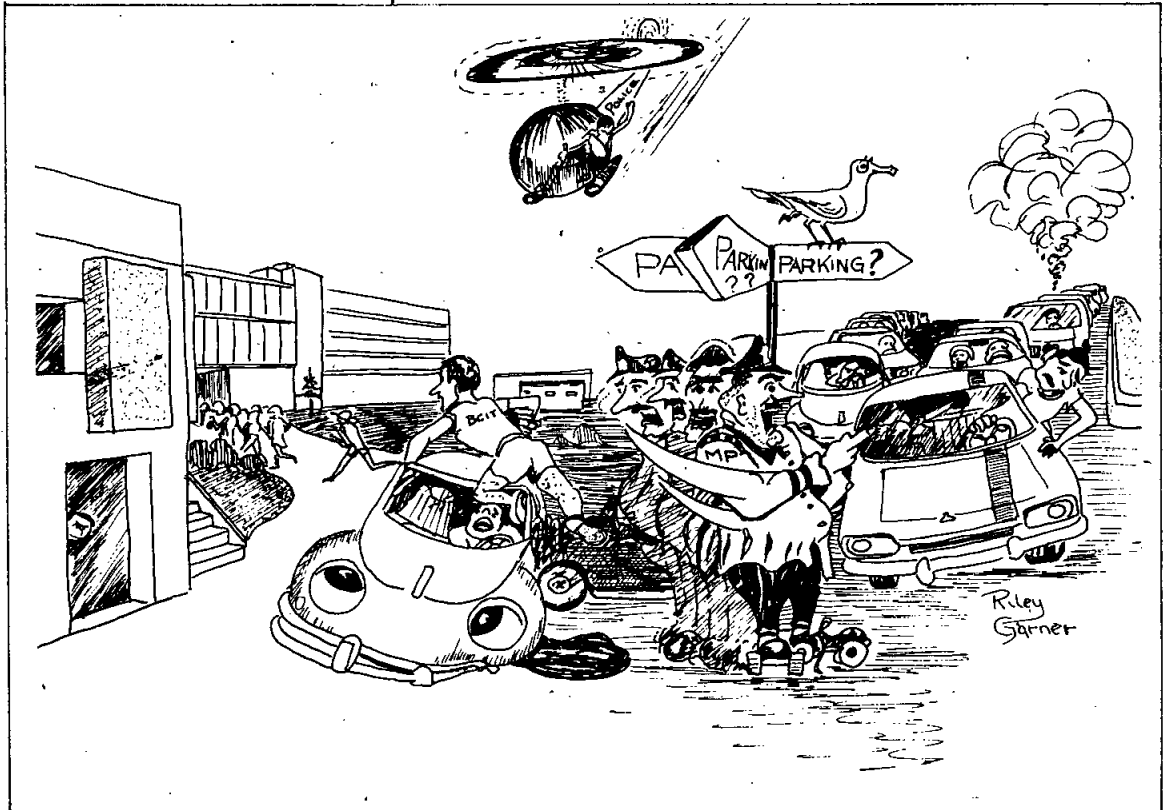

BEATLES GET RESPECT

It used to be said that when a particular artist or group included someone else's song in an album or a live performance, it was the highest respect that could be paid by that artist to the other. If that is the case, the Beatles are one of the most highly respected groups of musicians alive today. It would be impossible to compile an entire list of those, who in one form or another, have recorded a Beatles song. According to one source, over 200 versions of Beatles songs have been recorded. Unfortunately, not many do a version worth a second listen. There are a few exceptions. Joe Cocker does the most convincing rendition of "With a Little Help From My Friends" I've ever heard. I would even go so far as to say that I like the way he does it better than the original.

I'd already had it with orchestrated versions of "Eleanor Rigby" in every department store in the country when "All This and WWII" appeared in record racks across the country. It was supposed to be the soundtrack of a major motion picture, though I don't remember ever hearing about it locally. Anyway, it was a two record set entirely composed of a vast number of Beatles songs especially recorded for the album by people like Rod Stewart and Andrew Gold (ie. a lot of big names). It never did sell very well, and after hearing the mess made of a lot of Lennon and McCartney's best works, I can understand. I've noticed that this particular album set is popping up in 'delete' bins all over town, and quite deservedly so.

With the recent proliferation of disco versions of a lot of old songs (like the Animals' "House of the Rising Sun") there was bound to be someone crass enough to do a disco-ized Beatles. Even though I should have expected it, I was thoroughly disgusted when I first heard it in a disco. That was a good six months ago. Since then, the most colossal mistake ever set on vinyl has been completed. I'm referring, of course, to the "Stg. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band" starring good old Peter Frampton and the ever present Bee Gees. The Bee Gees seem to have replaced people like Bacharach and Mancini in the film score department. I'm not even going to talk about AM.

Back to the album itself, it is basically the most dull and uninteresting compilation of unoriginal material one could ever hope to bypass. With the exception of a half-assed decent version of "Come Together" done by Aerosmith, the only relief is in the form of a couple of comical tracks which are nothing but a joke anyway.

The ironic part of the whole situation however is that this latest RSO project will undoubtedly outsell and vastly outgross the original Beatles product. That is no indication of superiority on the part of the new product, but due more to a number of factors contributing to the success of this new album.

1. It is a soundtrack, and more and more people are buying the soundtracks from the movies they see.
2. And probably the most significant in this case, it has such teen and pre-teen idols as pretty Peter and his three step sisters, as well as groups like Earth, Wind & Fire (nobody will buy it for Alice Cooper, but he is also on it).
3. It is very disco-oriented, so there is another huge market to be exploited by the same product. And, lastly for now, the number of people able and willing to spend lots of money on records has increased by such phenomenal numbers that record sales for albums released by supergroups just a few years ago are being surpassed almost daily by relatively unknown groups on their first time out.

It's hard for someone raised on the Beatles like me to accept all this imitation bullshit, but I guess is something one has to get used to and learn to live with. Don't worry, I don't bitch all the time. Rock and Roll will live on.

There are a number of potentially interesting concerts already scheduled for the coming months. First of all, last night's Sammy Hagar/Boston concert will be reviewed in next weeks column, 10CC, Pablo Cruise, Bob Dylan, and the Moody Blues are all coming. More info on all of them next week.
