

New classroom building in planning stage

Planning has started for a new classroom building, expected to be ready by 1975, reports R.S. Carey, Chairman of the Technological Planning Committee.

"The Premier of the province has already stated that it will be provided.

"At this point we have again almost reached the capacity of our present classroom and laboratory accommodation. A new classroom building is needed if we are to cope with the increasing number of students in B. C. who wish to train at BCIT".

"We expect that there will be about 4500 full-time students attending by 1975.

"The government of this province has been quick to realize the value of technological training.

"From the original concept of a large classroom and laboratory building, opened in the Fall of 1964, there has been a continuous record of growth and development."

Buildings and facilities added since include a laboratory and classroom block as big as the original one, a fine information resource centre containing the Library which serves the whole campus, a mechanical building, and a food training centre containing a cafeteria and restaurant.

This year a new gymnasium-auditorium building was completed. Playing fields and a running track have also been provided.

Student enrolment figures for the years 1964 to 1970 indicate the need for the constant expansion of facilities.

Film producing here big step nearer

Many of the BCIT staff and television trainees at the Institute will be intimately involved in producing educational video tape recordings and films, principal Dean Goard foresees in his announcement that the partially completed production studio in the Information Resource Centre is to be equipped for operation.

The provincial government will purchase \$100,000 worth of equipment to bring the studio up to operational standards, Mr. Goard was advised on August 31.

Plans have existed for some time.

"It is the provincial government's intention to develop the studio as a production centre for videotape recordings and films for distribution to the British Columbia school system," explained Mr. Goard.

"The television trainees at BCIT will contribute to this program with their skill in putting projects on videotape or film. It is intended to add students to the instructional program and they will be trained to function as media technicians in the province's schools generally.

"I can see where many of the BCIT staff will be intimately involved in producing audio-visual materials for the school system as a whole.

"Already Mr. Laurie Irvine of Broadcast Communications Technology and his staff have produced a number of videotape recordings for the Penitcton school system.

"With the newly-equipped production studio, BCIT can expect to play a major role in providing material for all educational institutions in this province.

"The BCIT Information Resource Centre audio-visual department with its production studio, combined with Mr. Derek Franklin's Curriculum Development Branch, collectively represent a considerable resource available on campus."
