12 Pub workers sacked

Hopes of having a job at the campus beer hall have come to an abrupt end for several potential waiters, waitresses, doormen, and bartenders. At the beginning of the school year, twenty people were hired, on a probationary basis, by new 'Whynot' manager Graham Humphries, to serve drinks. Of those twenty, only eight remain.

Humphries says the training camp style hiring was done for the benefit of all BCIT students, "the average student at BCIT expects a helluva lot from the pub. In order to provide them with the best service, I need the most experienced people I can find."

However, four of the people fired were let go after only the first week of school, mainly for their work during the Orientation Dance.

But one of the people fired says he didn't get a fair chance at winning a job. The man does not wish to be identified, so he'll be called 'Bill'. Bill says he was fired for using what Humphries called 'abrasive action' on a customer. According to Bill, the man had been drinking for several hours. The customer became involved in a dispute with his waitress. The

argument went on for several minutes until Bill stepped in., "the guy came at me three times," Bill said. "The first time I told him to cool it, I talked to him for awhile and he seemed all right. After that he threw two punches at me, but they both missed. I grabbed his shirt, but that was the only time I touched him." Bill was fired because of the incident. He was later offered his job back but he declined, instead keeping another job he holds.

Lawyer Leo McGrady is a labour relations expert. He says, "the probation system is rarely used anymore." And BCGEU campus representative David Vipond says "this type of treatment of employees happens everyday in non-union workplaces." The Student Association is the official representative of 'Whynot' employees. S.A. President Antoine Van Dierendonck says he won't get involved in the pub situation. Van Dierendonck says he supports probationary hiring. The SA President seems unwilling to get involved with the hiring/firing practices of S.A. managers following the mass

resignations last summer of Cheryl Ebrecht (pub manager), Danny Yau (TNT manager) and Richard The (Operations Manager) for that very reason. Any grievances that an employee has will have to go through paid employees of the institute before

Van Dierendonck will become involved.

Humphries says the length of the school year justifies the hiring methods. He says there's no time to train a group of people and so there must be a way to pick the most experienced applicants.

Humphries says that can't be done simply looking at a job resume.

But at least one person says he wasn't fired solely for a lack of experience, and Bill says, "there isn't much job security at the Whynot, which is crazy."

Student parking oversold

Parking has always been an issue at BCIT, and this year is no exception. Lots within a five minute walk of most buildings are full by 7 a.m.. The south gravel lot by Moscrop Street is another 15 minutes away, but some students arriving after 10 a.m. say they can't find spaces there either. A shortage of parking spaces is nothing new, but this year, students paid \$35 each to fight for the privilege of parking. Now, they ask, where is that money going? Unfortunately, not towards improving parking conditions.

According to Neil Chadwick, manager of Security and Traffic, parking revenues, like all moneys currently collected on campus, are distributed at the discretion of the Vice-President of Administration and executive Board members. That means money generated in one area is not necessarily used for development of that particular department. Chadwick says future revenues may eventually be used to pave some gravel areas, but he does not believe there is any problems with the present parking situation.

Helen Cartmill, Parking Supervisor, agrees. Despite the fact that parking was oversold by 20 per cent, 1500 spaces sold to 1900 people, Cartmill said conflicts will never arise. What if all 1900 people show up at the same time? "That would never happen", said Cartmill. "There is never a time, morning or afternoon, when a student


cannot find parking on this campus." If you are an exception, Cartmill said she is available to help at Trailer 2Q.

Cartmill believes many students complain without looking hard enough for a space. She claims the south gravel lot always has 40 to 50 spaces available, even at midday. However, Cartmill also says it is only a five to seven minute walk from Moscrop to the 1A building, while students who walk the distance daily, claim it much longer.

Staff parking lots often appear to have many unused spaces. However, Cartmill and Chadwick both stated that staff parking is oversold by 40 per cent. Cartmill explained that the reason the lot

may not appear full is that not all instructors arrive at the same time, or work on campus every day. In the Health Technologies, for example, instructors divide their time between the hospital and BCIT. And, while they may only spend one or two days a week on campus, spaces must be allocated for them. Health students apparently park in these lots as well, a unique privilege among the student body.

Parking problems are not limited to BCIT. Most post-secondary institutions face similar inconveniences. Langara, for example, which has a comparable student population and structure, also has inadequate parking facilities. There is a major difference, however. Langara students park for free, whereas at BCIT students pay \$35.00.



Treasurer reports racquetball deficit

The racquetball courts recorded a \$6000.00 deficit for the year up to August 31, according to the Student Association Treasurer. Stefan Elmitt says, however, that this deficit should be made up within the next few months. The courts were not utilized much during the summer, which led to the loss.

The Student Association also paid off \$100,000 of the principle it owed on the new facility. It still owes \$419,000.

Also at last Monday's SA Executive meeting, Sports Chairperson Rob Paterson-Burton said that the student participation in intramurals is up substantially over past years. So much so, he said, that the school's athletic facilities are now overbooked. BCIT's only playing field cannot handle the number of teams that want to use it during the Wednesday three hour break, and the gymnasium also suffers from the same problem.

Paterson-Burton said if this pattern continues in future years, the SA should look to the creation of two hour breaks twice a week. He said this extra hour would increase facility room by 25 per cent, solving the overcrowding problem. He is currently turning away students who want to participate in intramurals.

The Student Association is also having its problems with the Village of Whistler. A new building constructed by the SA next to BCIT's present cabin at Whistler has violated the village's zoning bylaws. The new building, which was to be used as living quarters for the two caretakers of the cabin, was built too close to the property line.

The Village of Whistler says the unfinished building either has to be moved or come down. The SA will try to fight the ruling.

The fees for use of the cabin have also been revised this year. The cheapest time to stay at the cabin will be weekdays. It will cost \$5 for full time BCIT students; \$7 for continuing education students, alumni, faculty, and PVI students. The nightly charge will be \$12 for everyone who does not fall into one of those categories.

The rates will be slightly different during weekends and statutory holidays. \$7 for full time BCIT students; \$9 for continuing education, alumni, faculty, and PVI students; and \$12 for everyone else.

The work that was done around the campus during the summer came in \$3000 under budget. The forecast was to be \$40,000 to

Staff Society hosts speaker

A special open meeting organized by the BCIT Staff Society heard a Vancouver labour lawyer say the provincial government's restraint program is pointless.

Vancouver lawyer Leo McGrady told about 100 persons last Wednesday afternoon in 1A 197 the Bill 3, the Public Service Restraint Act, "is totally unnecessary" and is designed "to give unnecessary control to

government."

Concentrating mainly on the issue of staff cuts in the public sector as a result of Bill 3, McGrady said that passage of the legislation will create two different societies in British Columbia: the private sector, which he said will continue to live on as usual, and the public sector, which will be subject to every whim of the provincial cabinet. McGrady said that the cabinet could override any and all

protections that are currently built into collective agreements in this province.

However, McGrady cautioned that the government does not have the power to do anything until the legislation is passed, and even then government will have to wait until collective agreements expire.

He said that there is hope that the government will retract most or all of its legislation. He said the government has already backed down on refusing compensation to fired employees. But while some fired employees have been compensated, McGrady said the rest may have to go to court to seek redress. He added that the province has also agreed to a review procedure for such firings.

and you're on your way.

14) Another 10 minutes listening to a tape on the library catalogues will give you the jump on how to find exactly what you need by learning how the system works.

15) There's no card catalogue at the library. Our library provides unique ways of finding materials for your assignments. It will be very helpful and save you time if you check into these things early. Ask for these tapes at the circulation centre, listening and viewing desk or the Information Desk in the library.

I've seen people take an hour to locate something and they could have saved themselves at least 50 minutes if they had only understood how the library works.

Mid-terms are going to be starting soon (if they haven't already) and we're going to be looking at ways to fit test studying into your already over crowded schedules. Don't get blown away by it all, just practice your time management and follow your study schedule and you should be fine.

Everyone has blood pressure. It is the force of the blood against the walls of the arteries. This force is generated by the heart as it pumps blood to all parts of the body.

High blood pressure adds to the workload of the heart and arteries. If it continues for a long time there is increased risk of stroke, heart failure, kidney failure and heart attack.

Most people with high blood

pressure have no symptoms. There are no specific warning signs. It occurs in all age groups, in men and women, and in all races. It is also called hypertension.

The only way to find out if you have high blood pressure is to have your blood pressure checked. High blood pressure can be treated. Come in to Medical Services and have your blood pressure checked on **Thursday, September 29** from 8:30 - 11 a.m. and 1:30 - 4 p.m.

It is only three weeks old, but already we can tell that 1983-84 will be a rewarding year - for the BCIT administration and the student council.

The administration is reaping the rewards of its parking program: student parking is oversold by at least 15 per cent. At \$35 a crack, parking stickers are big ticket items on a student's list of supplies. The catch is that the yellow sticker on the windshield does not guarantee a parking space on campus. A BCIT student who wants such a space has to get to it before eight a.m. most days. If not, one is out of luck - and the \$35 dollar sticker seems like a costly frill. But for the institute, it is a moneymaker.

While rewarding itself at the expense of students who drive to school, the administration is also rewarding the instructors at BCIT. Not, mind you, with better facilities or less bureaucracy - but with fancy folders.

Every full time instructor at BCIT, so we hear, has been given a thick multi-colored plastic affair that folds into three sections and has pockets which contain little brochures on the benefits, monetary and other, of teaching at BCIT. Although information about salaries, pension plans and perks (of which guaranteed parking is one) are old news to instructors who have been here more than a year, the institute apparently felt everyone had to have a copy of a slick package that probably cost a small fortune to print and which could be placed on a few sheets with no loss in prestige and much saving of money. Evidently (with apologies to George Orwell), some things around here are more subject to restraint than others.

The same thinking seems to be in place on the student council. Perhaps it's taking its cue from parking fees, or perhaps it's just following the tradition of previous councils, but the BCIT student council has already played a few rounds of the reward game. The council rewarded itself for much needed pub renovations by hiring a manager who seems to place profit and performance (of student waiters and waitresses) above the rights of employees - legally defenceless students, in this case - to decent treatment.

The reward for the students who worked in the Pub and then were abruptly, and, by all accounts, callously, fired is a student council president who wouldn't hear the complaints of some of the people who elected him.

Meanwhile, to ease its Monday-night hunger pangs the council, with the exception of the president, voted itself a \$3 meal allowance for its meetings.

These events point to a good year for the BCIT administration and the student council. The same can't be said for the BCIT student, who has to settle for rewards that are only intellectual.

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

So get your sets and Techs out for Shinerama '83 and have fun!





Edmonton was equally as


