



# **PARKING**

There is a parking committee that includes in its make-up two students. Other members include; The Director of Planning, Technical Staff Rep, Staff Rep, Traffic Dept. Rep, etc. The function of this committee is to study our present parking facilities and put them to the best use, and to forsee future requirements.

Early in September, the functioning of this committee froze because of the procedural avenues that came into existence over changing parking regulations. THE BCIT STAFF SOCIETY AND THE BRITISH COLUMBIA GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES UNION ARE THE AVENUES THAT NOW EXIST.

The unions have to negotiate with the Board of Governors of BCIT, whether or not parking will be a condition of employment in their pending contract. If any changes to the present parking situation occured now, the Labour Relations Board would step in and say that you can't change a condition or term of employment with negotiations pending. This matter should be one of the first brought up once negotiations start, so the committee will begin to function soon.

One possibility to ease the parking congestion out back is one which would encourage car pools to develop. If a set number of parking spaces were markee as a student reserved section, with one permit to be issued to two students. The student's names and car license numbers would be on this permit. In this way you could share the driving with one other person and only half the number of cars for that section would be arriving each day. So if 100 spaces were reserved we would have 100 less cars to worry about. Do you think this solution is feasible? This solution would only help the people who had similar time tables and who lived close enough together to pick each other up in the mornings. Please communicate your reactions to us by dropping any suggestions you might have into the Information Booth or the SAC offices.








# THE PARKING PROBLEM

What I'm trying to say, in case you haven't realized, is that right now the parking situation at B.C.I.T. is disgusting and just plain crappy. Let's face it, without some help it's not going to go away, it's just going to get worse.

Okay, so some people are saying that when we lose a few of our fellow students after the first term, it will get better, and we do lose a few sudents. But remember those that were given the boot last year? Maybe they want to come back and restart the second term. Or maybe the former students of U.B.C., S.F.U., and so on, want to come to this beautiful place, at least until they see the parking eiterstien.

Hmmmm, maybe it won't get better after all, maybe it will only get worse! And hopefully some of us realize this! Okay, so it's your second year and it'll be all over in another seven months. But can we face ourselves in the morning if we let future generations of B.C.I.T.ites fight the war every morning. And what about all you first year guys and girls. The chaos you see this year is only going to be worse next year unless something is done about it. And maybe there is something both, we, the students and the B.C.I.T. Board of Governors can do to make it a bit better.

First of all, next time you roll into the unlined parking lot, look beside you and maybe, just maybe, you can park a few inches closer to your neighbour.

Or next time you're caught in the bottleneck, like tomorrow and the next day and the day after, just for something to do, count the number of cars with more than one body in it. Not very many, are there? You wouldn't be in that class would you? So get together with some of your friends or other students in your set and organize some sort of car pool. Especially you guys who live nearby. And there must be more than a few people living close enough to each other to all come in one car. Car pools may be a bit of a hassle, always depending on someone else, but try it anyway, who knows, it could work out. Every little bit helps.

Okay, since we've done our part, it's up to OUR representatives in the student council to present some ideas to the principal, the Board of Governors, and to whoever else is running this place.

At least we desparately need another entrance to the dirt parking lot off Wayburne Avenue. Like how about where the Forestry guys are set up. We've got a great deal of construction going on right now and it wouldn't take much for a cat and a truck to drift over and cut a hole to the dirt lot. This would get rid of one-third of the bottleneck at the main entrance off Wayburne.

For the very near future, let's have a hard, but not long, look at our all-weather field. How much do we really use it? Okay, so we use it walking to our cars, but isn't it a bit large for a sidewalk? What DO we use it for!? If we're lucky maybe a few football and baseball games a year.

Is there the slightest chance that it might be built up and used as a parking lot? Think about it! All three parking areas to the southeast of the school could be combined to form a larger area for cars that all the unreserved part of the main parking lot could ever hope to.

For the more distant future, most of our landscape is being ripped up for more classrooms and offices, which our staff sorely need, but that's another issue. But more classrooms mean more students and staff and that spells out parking shortage. So what can we look for? A double decker parking lot?? Is it really too much to hope for?

### COPIER INFORMATION

XEROX AND PITNEY-BOWES COPIERS

The Student Association is responsible for all the coin copying machines in the school. I imagine you have noticed that the XEROX machines are 10¢ and the PITNEY-BOWES are 5¢. The difference is because XEROX gives a bond copy and the PITNEY-BOWES gives a treated paper copy. At a council meeting last year it was decided that the Student Association would make a contract for three XEROX copiers and four PITNEY-BOWES copiers. The reasoning behind this was that your particular types of copying a student needs a good quality paper and reproduction. When you want to do a lot of copying you can use the 5¢ PTTNEY-BOWES machines.

You may have noticed that at some of the other schools XEROX machines like ours are only 5¢. In the summer time after we had made the contract with XEROX fore the ten cent vend, they came out with a new policy whereby you could put a five cent vend and still break-even. The only problem with that was that it would be in direct conflict with the PITNEY-BOWES contract.

If we put the XEROX down to five cents the other five cent machines wouldn't get used. With the PITNEY-BOWES we get charged for every copy and we get a .5¢ profit per copy. With this profit you have to buy the paper. When you figure it out the machine has to do 90,000 copies per year in order to break even. So that means in one year with just the four Pitney-Bowes copiers, 360,000 copies have to be made. If we don't make that volume we lose a lot of money. Of course that's not a new story because in past years we have always lost money on them. So that is the economics side of it.

The other side is, what do you want?

1. We could cancell the XEROX and have all 5¢ Pitney-Bowes machines and there would be no worry about losing money due to lack of volume.

2. We could leave things as they are and if you wanted a 10¢ quality reproduction, it is there.

Unfortunately we can not cancel the Pitney-Bowes two year contract unless we wanted to be subject to legal action. The Xerox contract can be cancelled with one months notice. If we cancelled Pitney-Bowes, then we could have all Xeorx machines for 5¢. The question is what do you want? Let's give the machines a chance and see which one breads down the least. It doesn't really matter what the cost is, the most important thing is, will it be working next time you rush out of class to reproduce last years exam or Harry Smedlaps' notes.

Servicing is another important aspect of a copying machine. Through experience we will find which of the two companies repair the machines the quickest when there is a major breakdown. The day to day up keep is done by Bert Cameron, the commissionaire, posted in the North Foyer (Local 356) or June Jones at the Student Association offices in the SAC (Local 601). If you notice that a machine isn't working report it to one of the people. If you get mad at a machine don't kick it, complain by putting a note in the suggestion box on the information booth.

If there already isn't a 5¢ machine in the library, one will be moved over shortly. We have a bit of a problem with the library because of the construction that is going on there. The machine may get in the way of workers, and we we can't have one in the quiet section of the library. The library staff has nothing to do with the copiers in there. They know nothing about how to fix them and I don't


there. They know nothing about how to fix them and I don't think they want to know anyways. Then they would probabley get swangled into fixing a machine that isn't even theirs. Maybe we can talk them into doing it, if we pay them a bit. The problem with the day to day servicing ie. putting in paper, keeping adjustment right, and keeping it filled with toner is that the present people are not available to fix the machine if it breaks down in the evening. They are doing their utmost to keep the machines in working order. It sure can be frustrating if you have to run all over the school to find a machine that will work. Save the guy behind you a trip and let us know when a copier isn't working.

Perhaps next year the students should leave it up to the administration to contract the copying machines. Then the library staff may be able to provide a better service in keeping the machines going 24 hours a day.

# THE TAMING OF THE SHREW-REVIEW

THE TAMING OF THE SHREW by William Shakespeare

On October 7, 1974, the Playhouse Theatre Center of B.C. opened the doors of the Queen Elizabeth Playhouse to a capacity audience for their 12th season. The Taming of the Shrew was the first production, and this reviewer believes that if the rest of this year's productions are as well done and entertaining as the Shrew, then the 12th season will be one to remember.

The Taming of the Shrew is a comedy - a comedy of pretences and disguises. It's all a game - a game which even the audience find themselves drawn into as they are asked to accept a pretentious 19th century train station in Padua, Italy. Here a band of travelling actors, having missed their train decide to rehearse their play for the station masters and porters. These viewers soon become very integral parts of the Taming of the Shrew and all (audience, actors and porters) are carried back to 16th century Padua.

As mentioned earlier, the case should be proud of this effort. All in all, the play moved smoothly. The first half the wooding and wedding of Kate and Petruchio was priceless. The audience was kept in stitches, first of all by the antics of Grumio, Petruchio's co-hort (acted extremely well by a talested actor, Bernard Hopkins), later by the quick and spicy play of Kate (Denise Fergusson) and Petruchio (Michael Ball). This scene, where Kate gets told by Petruchio that she WANTS to marry him is one of the best of the performance. Miss Ferguson and Mr. Ball bring it alive and one can almost feel the sparks flying between shrewish Kate and dominant, forceful Petruchio. This act concluded as the audience watched Curtis, a very old and faithful servant of Petruchio attempt to cross the plaza to join the wedding gaieties.

Grumio opens the second half of the play. Kate and Petruchio come home and here is where the "Taming of the Shrew" begins. Again, brought to life by the talent of Fergusson and Ball, the . "taming" moves quickly to a point where Kate becomes the docile and agreeable wife. She even goes as far as to say the sun is the moon just because Petruchio says it is, even though she knows that he is wrong.

Unfortunately from here on out, to the end of the play, the action starts to move slowly. TOO MUCH attention is paid to Bianca and her shallowness. Performed before an increasingly restless audience, it appeared that it was a chore. Too Bad!!

jolity of the performance. The final speech by Kate - called by Germaine Greer as "the greatest defence of Christian Monogamy ever written", was done brilliantly by Miss Fergusson. Kate realizes and tells her fellow wives (Bianca and the widow) that a husband is a protector and a friend. Kate has a man who is both gentle and strong. Kate found her happiness with her Petruchio. Shakespeare's message seems to be that while the Biancas may be desirable, it is the Kates that make the best wives: while the "Lucentios" and "Hortensios" make good suitors, it is the "Petruchios" that make the husbands.

### THREE HOUR BREAK

On Tuesday 8 October a special meeting of the BCIT council was held to discuss a very current item-THREE HOUR BREAK. Not regularly scheduled this meeting was called to review the students reactions to a referendum which suggested changing of the three hour break.

The week previous saw this referendum being held by the technology representatives.

: Choices were

1. Maintaining the break as it is Wednesday 11:30-2:30
2. Changing it to either two 2 hour breaks on Tuesday and Thursday, or one full afternoon off on Wednesday. Results came back to the council varied. Some were for maintaining it as it is and some of the BCIT students wished change.

For approximately one and one half hours following the calling to order of the council complete but redundant discussion followed. Motions were put forward and defeated; amendments were made and rejected. Finally a motion was put forward and accepted by a 13/4/2 margin. The motion which reads as follows:

I move that the tree hour break be kept as it has been in the past. That is that no classes may schedule in percent agreement by the class and instructor a class may be moved. I believe that the students will utilize that time to the best of their ability.

Hopefully activities and intra-mural sports will not suffer. If they do, have we made the right decision?!


# FROSH QUEEN '74



Could these be the two big brains behind the contract for the rip-off of Fish and Wildlifes mascot?



No one really knows the circumstances of the goats heads reappearance.


### LATE NEWS BULLETIN!

# VANCOUVER PLANETARIUM & CENTENNIAL MUSEUM NEWS

IT'S ALL YOURS FOR FIFTY CENTS

What is? Well, let's start with the Centennial Museum. If you're interested in finding out the fascinating history of this province, from earliest times until now, you can pass a pleasant hour or two exploring the galleries in the museum. You can explore the interior of the ship, look into cabins that are complete to the last tiny detail - a book lying on an unmade bunk, socks pegged on a line to dry, a radio playing the music of wartime 1944 when the ship made her epic voyage. If you believe in ghosts, you'll love the St. Roch!!

All yours for fifty cents? If you're a student with a card, yes, it is. The Centennial and Maritime Museums and Planetarium (plus gift shop, bookshelves, cafeteria and restrooms) in beautiful Vanier Park right on Kitsilano Beach, offers you an evening, a Saturday or a Sunday, that's filled with experiences you'll remember. The settings are gorgeous (you can walk on the beach from the museums) and the whole complex is easy to get to from downtown Vancouver. A bus (23 Macdonald) will drop you at the corner of Cypress Street and from there it's no more than five minutes on the hoof.

# NATIONAL UNION OF STUDENTS

NATIONAL UNION OF STUDENTS:

BCIT Student Association is a member of N.U.S. Last year the membership fee was 30¢ per student or approx. \$900.00. We have been a member in this 2 year old organization for one year, going into our second year.

The objective of this organization is to gain membership of as many post secondary institutes in Canada as possible, so that students all across Canada can speak to the government with a unified voice on issues of common concern.

N.U.S. is administered through a central office at Carlton University in Ottawa by a group of elected officers. This central committee handles all correspondence to member institutes and acts as a library or resource centre to collect studies and statistics done by member institutes.

In the past two years the organization has concerned itself with studying the proper organization and structure that would be most effective for a national union of students. This concern is justly so, because its predecessor C.U.S. (Canadian Union of Students) failed, due to poor organization. This lack of organization caused members to lose faith in the organization as a whole. N.U.S. now seems to be experiencing the same difficulties. It's credibility is being questioned by many present members and shunned by many non-members. This is due to the fact that N.U.S. has done nothing concrete except get itself organized. The greater majority of members are the universities, with little securing interest from community colleges and similar 2 year schools such as ours. If N.U.S. cannot secure it's membership it will fail, due to lack of funds.

The strength of N.U.S. lies in its members. An attitude that has been developing is seen when members refer to NUS by saying, "they aren't doing anything for us". The correct reference is "We haven't done anything". The core of N.U.S. is it's members, not the central committee that administer it.

Twice every year there is general meetings at various campus' across Canada. Delegates from all member institutes attend these 4 day conferences and hash out the orders of the dah. It costs each institute approximately \$275.00 per delegate (2 delegates) to attend these conferences. This is done through travel pool arrangements, whereby the total costs are averaged and equalized for every member.

Some of the issues that the N.U.S. has concerned itself with are the following:

Canada Student Loans Program. (more money for students with the rising rate of inflation & tax eeduction for texts)
 Student Residence & housing

3) Financing of Post Secondary Schools (physical plant)
4) Recruiting a larger membership to N.U.S.

The above points are the most recent issues of debate for N.U.S. In it's childhood N.U.S. was thought to be developing a right wing attitude when they began debating such issues as: (womens rights; boycotts of Food & MacDonalds Tobacco) An organization such as N.U.S. surely carries quite a political clout if it speaks for every student in Canada. Many members, became concerned that N.U.S. was becoming too concerned with social issues. Is this what students want? Should we speak up, on issues to do with this country? OR on issues we are inheriting from our parents? What do you want? Will an organization like N.U.S. provide a valuable channel for young people to voice there opinions about their future? Since N.U.S. is concerned with long erm goals, should member institutes cry when they don't see immediate results? It is true that change comes slowly and tangible results may never be able to be directly attributed to N.U.S. Do you think however that our concerns will echo in the back of the politicians mind in Ottawa when it comes Does BCIT have a place in NUS????? election time? The reason I am asking you all these seemingly unimportant questions is because the BCIT students council may be asking you to vote FOR or AGAINST the National Union of Students. If council decides to hold this referendum, what percentage of the students will vote? If the vote goes against N.U.S. the Student Association Executive will be obliged to pull out of the union.

A referendum is a must if we want to pull out, because it has to be a wish of the majority of the students. (N.B. this is in the N.U.S. constitution)

From OCtober 17th - 20th there was a N.U.S. conference in Saskatoon. There was some new developments that arose out of this conference:

l) the membership fee decided by a majority will be increased to \$1.00 per student (approx. \$3000.00 for BCIT)

2) Also decided was that N.U.S. should form a corporation. Our membership fee is due at the end of October. If we decide to hold off the payment of \$900.00 we may run into some legal problems. The new \$3000.00 membership fee will be effective as of Oct. 30th, 1975. With this in mind although we will most likely remain a member this year we can hold a referendum in the spring of next year to determine whether you want to remain a member.

There are some drawbacks to 2 year schools being members of N.U.S. We have a high turnover rate of students compared to the enrollment length at universities. As a result the new students council lacks the continuity with their delegates and executives. Thus it is more difficult to pass the torch on to the students who follow us, from year to year. However our elections in the spring are before the spring conference of N.U.S. so the newly elected external affairs officer could attend the conference for our representation.

The post secondary institutes in B.C. formed a union called B.C.A.S.U. (the British Columbia Association of Student Unions). Although B.C.A.S.U. was not conceived as a lobbying organization, it is more feasible that lobbying with the Provincial Gov't. through B.C.A.S.U. would be more effective than lobbying with the Federal Gov't. through N.U.S. They hold several meetings a year with the greater majority of B.C. Post secondary institutes attending to help B.C. student councils approve their services to students. There is no fee to be a member of this organization and it doesn't operate under the societies act with a set of by-laws.

It gives B.C. Student Gov't. the chance to get together and talk about mutual areas of concern in B.C. In dealing with government agencies B.C.A.S.U. is valuable to speak with one voice about student concerns in B.C. However this organization has evolved into a sub-organization or standing committee of the N.U.S. This is valuable because the meetings of B.C.A.S.U. Bridge the gap between the semi-annual meetings of N.U.S. Myself and Jim Clark attended the first meeting of the year on October 5th. Items that were on the agenda:

- l) co-operative pub policies between B.C. Universities, colleges & institutes.
- 2) discussion on liquor laws in B.C. and the campus licences.3) B.C. HYDRO bus services and what extra services we need.4) N.U.S.
- 5) The task force report on Community Colleges in B.C. (a report to the Dept. of Education making recommendations on the services & atmosphere that new developments should take on)

If we decide not to be member of N.U.S., we can still be a member of B.C.A.S.U. Think about N.U.S. Is it valuable? Should we allocate our resources elsewhere? Bring us your opinions.







## WHERE HAS OUR 3 HOUR BREAK GONE?

By now you will have noticed a blank spot on your timetable from 11:30 to 2:30 on a Wednesday. (Unless you are one of the unlucky ones!). This is the time which most students refer to as 'the three hour break'. This break has been used in the past, and is being used this year for Club meetings, Intramural sports, Extramural sports, and other activities. The film club occasionally show films, and the Student Association sponsors acts in the SAC Cafeteria for the students to watch. Sometimes controversial speakers are invitied to give lectures which may interest or benefit the students.

Some students who did not realize that these activities are available have been studying during the break, and some classes have been moved into the break time-slot.

The reason the students were granted the three-hour break by former principal Dean Goard was to give us a chance to provide these activities for the students. Mr. Goard instructed timetabling to leave this time blank for all students, and for a number of years this was done.

This year, however, timetabling found that it was not possible to leave three hours open with out scheduling classes on Saturday mornings, (or so they said). They were instructed by the Student Association Executive in August to avoidboth Saturday morning and Wednesday break classes. Regardless, classes were, for some students, scheduled during our break. To these students there are very few activities open, since the break is the time for the activities.

Also, as happens every year, a number of technologies, with perhaps one class on Wednesday afternoon, requested that it be moved to 11:30, so that they could leave early. Feeling that this was against established policy, the SA Executive again said no, and informed all instructors of their decision.

As a result of the memo sent to the instructors, the Student Association has received many complaints and suggestions as to how the problem could be dealt with. These are the suggested alternatives:

1. Two two-hour breaks, one on Tuesday, one on Thursday: Most club meetings are over in 1-1 1/2 hours, most sports take less than two hours for a game. This would allow for 4 hours of participation rather than the present 3, and the time off could be more effectively utilized. Teams could hold twice as many practises, meetings could be held on two different days, rather that the present Wednesday set up.

- 2. A whole afternoon off, once a week: This would mean a possible 4 or 5 hours of classes in the morning, and the whole afternoon off. The students would request Wednesday afternoon off, but probably get Friday afternoon, which is when many students already have a light day. This would be very convenient for both students and instructors, since all week-ends would start at Friday noon. However, from the point of view of the Clubs and Teams, both Intra- and Textramural, this policy would be bad. Potential teams would be weakened, since most students would have left for the week-end by the time of the practises. Clubs would be in the same positions as the teams.
- 3. Leave the break as it is with NO classes in the break time. Keeps all meetings and sports on Wednesday, edit the newspaper on Wednesday, show movies, etc, and leave the problem of making a decision until next year, when there will be more students, more classes, and more hassle.
- 4. Drop the whole idea of a break, have time off when timetabling wants to give it to you. This of course means no clubs, no sports, no films and no speakers.

These alternatives given, the Student Association had a special meeting of all division reps, on Tuesday October 15, at 7:00 p.m. All reps were to have asked each class before that time what their preference was out of the alternatives given.

This is a summary of that meeting:

Motion: (summarized) Change to an afternoon off as soon as possible. Motion Defeated.

Motion: (summarized) Change to an afternoon off in September 1975. Motion Defeated.

Motion: (actual words) Moved by Donna Pasko, seconded by Marian Benjamin: I move that the three hour break be kept as it have been in the past. That is that no classes may be schedualed in the three-hour break by timetabling. But if there is a 100% agreement by the class and the instructor a class may be moved. I believe that the students of the school will utilize that time to their best advantage. Motion Passed, 13 / 4 / 2/

It was also pointed out that while 100% is required, it is probable that a majority would sway any decision, since a few won't hold up the rest. For example, one basketball enthusiast in a class will probably not argue too much if everyone else in the class wants the class during basketball practise time.

It was mentioned that if Students are allowed to re-schedule their classes, then timetabling will assume that they can also. If this happens, and it inevitably will, we will have lost the break altogether. One point which was not mentioned was that before a class can be re-scheduled, it must go through timetabling, because timetabling have to approve all room changes.

Well, the decision was made, on what it seemed was the feeling of the majority of the student body. I believed this to be the case until I discovered that some classes were asked their opinion after the meeting, and some were not asked at all. Therefore their opinion was not even considered in making the decision.

Is this a democratic process?? Nineteen people decided the course of the entire student body, without first consulting that entire body. Do you feel that this is fair? I call for a referendum of the students, with the majority decision being the rule. I argue that the students, should know all the facts and all the alternatives. Some students who voted didn't realize the implications of their decision.

The foregoing points were brought up at the meeting, but in the interest of an early adjournment they were disregarded. The decision, which will affect students for years to come, was made too quickly, and without enough thought. Are we here to be politicians, and make hasty decision which we will later regret, or are we here to decide on well thought-out matters?

The thirteen people who voted for that motion meant vell, but could it be that they made a mistake? Do YOU think that they made a mistake? Do YOU feel that this should have been an impromptu decision, or should all students be consulted with a legal referendum????? DO YOU WANT A BREAK AT ALL???

If you agree with me, or even if you don't, why not tell someone? Write to the LINK, or to me, or to one of the SA Executive, or talk to your class president, whatever you do, for Chirst's sake do SOMETHING.

Our legislation is supposed to be for you, and your opinion MUST be considered.

# **MOVIE REVIEW**

AIRPORT '75 By HAL HICKEY

Airport is back, shorter in 1975, but fast moving and captivating.

Airport '75 stars Charelton Heston, George Kennedy, Susan Clark, Linda Blair, Helen Reddy, a cameo appearance by Jim Plunkett (quarterback of the New England Patriots) and Gloria Swanson who plays herself.

Airport '75 is a perfect example of today's modern movie, a 4 hour movie crammed into 1 hour and 45 minutes. Being short, it leaves out important character developments which are essential for a movie such as Airport '75.

The cast is a long list of familiar names and faces which tend to spoil the reality of the event, always spotting someone and trying to associate what T.V. show he or she was in. Because of the short length and the large cast of the film a great mistake was made. In an attempt to explore into the characters, the director trys to esplore everyone's character. What he does accomplish instead is a short-lived brushon everyone's background and character. Through the entire movie, one becomes lightly annoyed at the jumping from character to character.

Airport '75 is not unlike other movies involving passenger planes. Everything occurs in the air right from the delayed and confusing takeoff to the ending which brings a large sigh of relief.

The story starts out at the passenger entrance gate, and with rapid jumping between characters, it is quite confusing. The jumbo 747 is diverted off route to Los Angeles because of fog just as a small private plane is also diverted. The pilot has heart trouble. Add one and one and you get a collision. If you saw the preview, you know what happens then. If not, well I won't spoil it. From then on its up to our heroes, the Stewardess, (Susan Clark) and the well known super pilot, Charelton Heston.

The film offers magnificent and probably the best and clearest of any aerial photography ever shown to the public. Many eye pleasing sights make an appealing movie. It should be on T.V. next year but commercials would tear the fast moving action apart. So, if you've nothing better to do, truck on down to Lougheed Mall, Cinema 1 and enjoy your eyes.

Bachman-Turner Overdrive - NOT FRAGILE on Mercury Recrods.

All right, who holds the #1 spot on the Billboard chart? That's right, Canada's own Bachman-Turner Overdrive. If you have ears you know the reason why, because you can't listen to the radio without hearing a cut off this album:

Of all the albums we have listened to in the past months this is the one that proves that boogie is still very much alive and well.

Opening the album is the title cut "Not Fragile", a foot stompin', toe-twitching piece of HEAVY DUTY rock and roll. This cut definitely lives up to its name and proves that B.T.O. is no two bit, hackneyed Canadian group.

The second cut "Rock is my Life and This is my Song" is self-explanatory for those of you who feel the same way.
"Rolling on Down the Highway", the third cut, is one of the meanest songs on the album, a real mother trucker. Ninety-nine and mine ninths percent of the west coast must have heard the fourth cut "You Ain't Seen Nothin' Yet" and if it's the only song you've heard, then you definitely ain't. Another superb foot stomper.

The last cut "Freewheeling" is dedicated to Duane Allman and contains some classic guitar riffs in the style of the late Allman brother. A beautiful instrumental that shows why these four musicians are so popular.

The opening cut on Side two comes on like a real 50 ton "Sledgehammer". Another raucous number that gets you up and keeps you there. The next track hits you before you get a chance to recover from the last one. "Blue Moanin" is a heavy rhythmic rocker that leaves you moanin' for more. The third track "Second Hand" is a true rocker in the classic B.T.O. STYLE. C.F. Turner plays some demonic inspired bass that will tap in your feetfor days. The last cut "Giving It All Away" is a fast moving screamer that draws away whatever energy you may have left just to sit down and rest.

If after listening to this record your blue suede shoes aren't worn out, you either have a hearing imperiment or you don't like music. (so why are you reading this column anyway?)

This has to be the most high energy rocker of an L.P. we've had the pleasure of listening to. This one gets the buy of the month hands down. (Get it, it's great, and it's Canadian).

# Golden Earring - MOONTAN on MCA Records

We expect most of you are familiar with Radar Love"; well, here is the L.P. by Golden Earring chock full of equally fine musical selections to tickle your eardrums. Although they are not as well known over here these boys have mine records plus three best ofs to their credit back in Holland. If their music in the future is as consistently well done as this L.P. they will be a big name to watch out for in the coming months.

Side one opens with that familiar cut "Radar Love", longer than the AM version but just as hot. A real boogie number. The second cut "Candy's Goin' Bad" is another good rocker which sounds like it was influenced a great deal vocally and musically by the Alice Cooper band. The bassist, Rinus Gerritsen, pounds out some very classical riffs almost exactly as Dennis Dunaway does for the Coops band. Towards the end of this cut the music slows down and unfortunately loses a large part of its driving force.

The last track on this side "Vanilla Queen" is an interesting combination of musical expressions including heavy rock, billowing keyboard work and acoustic and lead guitar work a la Focus (not to mention some very strange sounds that make the cut on the whole an intriguing conglomeration).

The first cut on the second side "Blue Sea, Big Tree" is again a mixture of different sounds. Although it is well done, it is a pity somewhat that the group did not select one particular sound and develop it to its peak. The unfortunate result is that one is left waiting for a musical climax that never occurs.


The final cut "Are You Receiving Me?" has unfortunately not fall victim to Golden Earring's habit of flitting across the musical spectrum. Possessive of a steady rhythm with some very mellow complementary overtures it is heavy yet fluffy enough to listen to without having to be in a raucous state of

On reflection this album contains some easily distinguishable influences from some of the better groups around these days but it is not totally without individuality. If you like "Radar Love" or bave it, you'll undoubtedly like the album.

EDGAR WINTER GROUP "SHOCK TREATMENT" on epic


Having reached new heights of popularity with his last album, "They Only Come Out At Night", and the super single hit "Frankenstein", Edgar has come up with an album that isn't called "Shock Treatment" for nothing.

Opening side one is a typical rocker from the storming albino called "Some Kinda Animal", which really gets your









feet tapping. This cuts into "Easy Street", with some of the best vocals done by Winter in a long time.' A very nice bluesy number with some super saxophone.

The next cut is probably the smoothest song on the album, and describes exactly what its title says, "Sundown". Written by bassist. Dan Hartman its mellowness really makes you want to find a sundown somewhere so you can play the song at the same time. On this cut the lead guitarist presence is really felt, and if his playing sounds familiar its because the new guitarist for Edgar Winter is Rick Derringer of "Rock and Roll Kootchie Koo" fame, and who incidentally produced

"Sundown" blends into "Miracle of Love" which is a perfect dance number for parties with its excellent beat, musicianship, and overall excitement.

Side one closes with another hardrocker called "Do Like Me", where Edgar gets back to his origins with some gutsy vocals and some solid rocking music.

Side 2 continues where I left off with some rock'n rollers called "Rock'n Roll Women", "Queen of my Dreams", and a jumping little number called "Rivers Rising".

"Someone Take My Heart Away" is a very pretty ballad by Edgar, and with Dan's "Maybe Some Day You'll Call My Name" the romantic part of your head is kept very much alive and well.

The last track on the album is very much fashioned after "Frankenstein" and must be played loudly. Edgar has really created a monster with "Animal", and its definitely going to be a very popular stage showpiece. Its a typical gutsy Edgar Winter heavy rocker with all kinds of electronic sound effects.

If you want an album that has a little bit of everything; blues, ballads, jumping dance tunes, and heavy rockers, then this record is what you've been looking for. Definitely a fine job by this veteran of the rock world.

# JOURNEY TO THE CENTRE OF THE EARTH by Rick Wakeman A & M records

Rick Wakeman is well known for his extraordinary ability at playing some thirteen keyboards with gutsy vigor, in his old group YES. His first solo album, "The Six Wifes of Henry the VIII" proved that he is indeed a master of all the keyboards he is famous for.

However, on this, his second solo outing, Rick Wakeman has gone back to the origins that turned him from a starving pianist to a rock millionnaire; classical music. (The same brand of music that caused his break from YES). Gathering together a group of unknown musicians, Rick proceeded on his own journey, so to speak. After writing and composing all the music for this extravaganza, he decided that in order to create the proper mood the album would have to be recorded live. With the London Symphony Orchestra, the English Chamber Choir, and actor David Hemmings as narrator, what transpired on the evening of January 18, 1974 at the Royal Festival Hall in London may perhaps be Rick Wakeman's downfall.

It opens with a song called "The Journey", complete with orchestration and a strange buzzing sound. This leads to some offkey vocals and the first of Hemmings narration. Some not to badly done rock'n roll, and then that strange buzz leads into more narration.

The second song "Recollection" seems more like Wakeman reminiscing about his own past than keeping with the plot of his composition. Some very nice sweeping orchestration, and more narration close the first side.

The second side starts with some soft sound effects, and even more narration by Hemmings, then bursting into a piece called "The Battle" which is supposed to sound like a battle between two sea monsters, but gives the impression of a pee-wee soccer game. Gary Pickford-Hopkins sounds like he's going to cry "mommy help" at any second. Just as Wakeman starts to improve on his keyboard playing, Hemmings cuts in again with his atrocious Richard Burton imitation. From here the music picks up and begins to sound like the kind of music that Wakeman is known for. Hemmings blows it again with his mouth and seems to take over the rest of the album as it closes with what might have been the best part of the album except for those vocals again.

Overall this album is basically not bad if you like musical soundtracks. Personally we believe Wakeman should have found a better vocalist, chucked the orchestra for a mellotron, and spent some time in the studios perfecting what is essentially a good piece of music. But, more than anything, he should send David Hemmings back to acting school, so he can learn to use his voice properly. (After listening to the album a few times it does become enjoyable)

# **ELTON JOHN: THE KING OF ENTERTAINMENT!**

A standing ovation was the order of the night for the rest of Elton's songs. Breezing through his more popular numbers; "Grimsby", "Rocket Man", "Daniel", and "Benny and the Jets", his stage show was nothing less than fantastic. Performance wise, Elton is unsurpassed in total energetic drive to please his fans.

Unlike many recent concerts the sounds of Elton John and Kiki Dee were surprisingly clear. All the insturments somehow came out melodiously despite the horrid acoustics at the Coliseum. Top -notch musicianship is nothing new from Elton John and his band, and they certainly proved their talents that night. Davey Johnstone did a lot of perfect guitar work to add to the flash of Elton's piano pounding, and Dee Murray and Nigel Olsson's rhythm was strong in the background supporting the constantly rocking ivory tickler's every beat. Also on hand for added flash were the Muscles Shoals Horns section from Alabama and a maniac percussionist named Ray Cooper who is perhaps the number the number one session man for percussion needs.




The BCIT Band still practises every sunday from: 10 am to 1:pm. They will be playing some of our pubs soon, so watch for time and places.



# WILLINGDON SCHOOL

Not only did the Willingdon School for girls provide residence facilities for students attending BCIT & BCVS, in 1973 it provided athletic facilities (pool & gymnas ium), 5 classrooms to accommodate approximately 1,000 students in extension & evening courses, & 200 students during the day in the Industrial Services Dept. Plus a work assessment programme was instituted to aide the performance assessment of the physically handicapped. Food service students used the cafeteria as a training centre, Justice Training students used the Gym for self-defence classes, etc. The Willingdon complex was in use for the full year of 1973 for 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.

On October 24, 1974, members of the Willingdon School Comm. the Board of Governors & Administration, to include Gordon Thom, J.D. Michaels, V.J. Langan, M. Ferrie, C.Gibbons, G. Fane, B. Kennedy, J. Caldwell, D. Macpherson & D. Hume, attended a conference in Victoria to initiate the need of keeping the Willingdon Complex for residence purposes.

Spokesman on our behalf was Graham Fane, student liason, He stressed the on-going operational needs of the complex. With reference to shelter as 1st importance, he pointed out the "desperate need" list to include some 450 odd names. He then proceeded to emphasize that the 110 possible spaces in Willingdon Complex would not alleviate our problem but would bring the residence ratio closer to that of other campuses.

Other areas of concern are: the Extension Division where 1000 students participate in night time classes. With added facilities this enrollment could increase even farther. The Industry Services Division where 45 students resided in portable units to use the pool & gym for their fitness programme. (This year main operation for them is conducted in a trailer because we don't know if we will have Willingdon Complex for long.)


Central Stores also benefitted by using the basement of Wiling don Complex for storage space. But needless to say, much more expense has been inqugurated because of off-campus rental space needs.

And because existing recreational areas are so limited, use of the pool & gymnasium was scheduled for use by some 6000 staff & students.

After pointing out the areas of use that Willingdon Complex has provided for the students in the past and on a temporary basis so far this year, Graham went on to illustrate some of the concepts appropriate for a permanent residence for the future for BCIT.

One justly reasons that the existing space that Willingdon Complex holds for a future residence is because it lies close to the campus and the encompassing large allotments of land on the perimeter of BCIT campus have been reallocated for vehicle testing stations and ICBC CLAIMS.

We will receive a commitment for or against our use of the Willingdon School for Girls in the next week and we will then be able to advise you of the answer.





Hockey season is well underway for the 1974-75 term. Coach Wally Rowan opened the new campaign on the road and upended Trinity Western College (in Langley) by a 9-5 margin. The game featured some heavy hitting by the Cougars club.

BCIT roared off to a fast 3-0 lead by the middle of the opening period. Ken Gusyk scored the league's first goal on assists by Jerry Reglin and Maurice Regnier. Gusyk followed up his initial effort by taking passes from Regnier and Mike Matson and faking the pads off the Trinity netminder. Gerry May combined with Bill Danshin and Daryl Frank to count the 3rd goal. After a Trinity marker, Gusyk once again shook the turn by converting a shot from Denis Turman in a goat mouth scramble.

The second stanza was also dominated by the Cougars, especially by Gusyk. Ken laid out some heavy checks along the wings and opened the period by taking a pass from Turman and scoring with BCIT, short handed.
