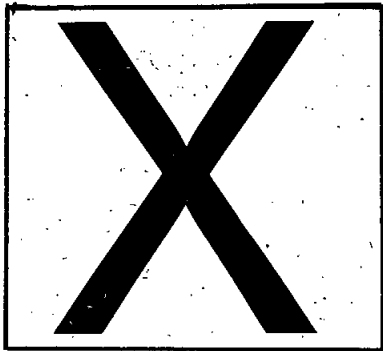


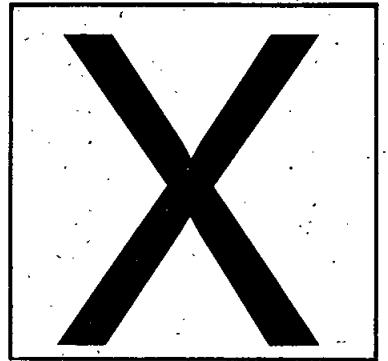

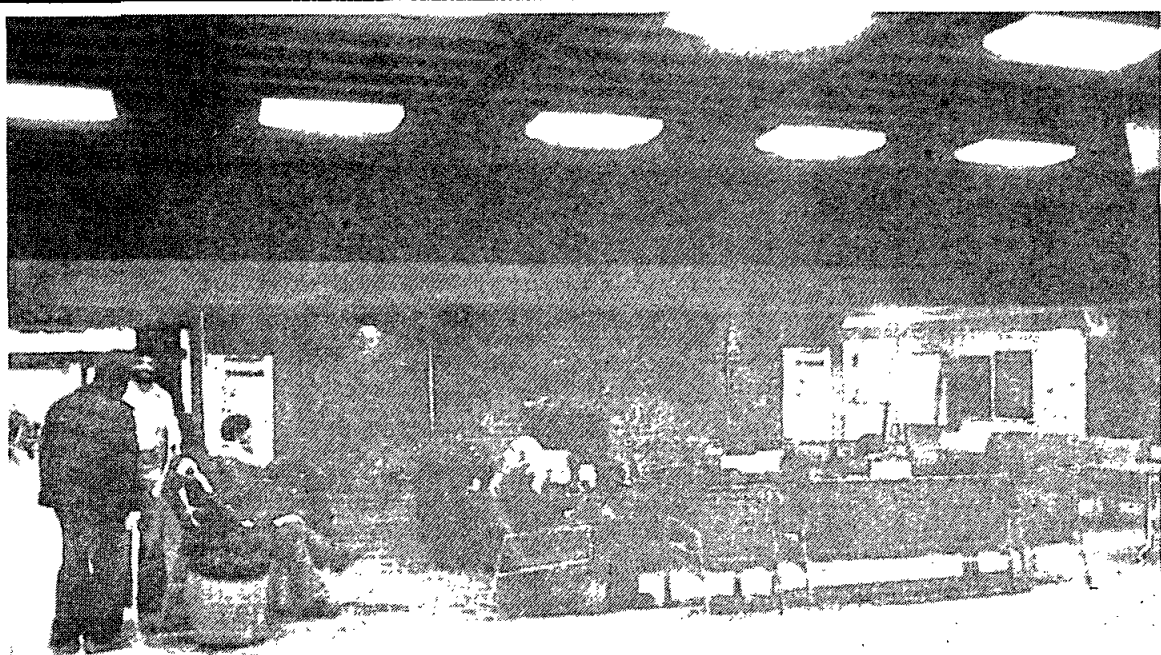

Concert on the 20th

The prizewinning Szczecin Choir from the Szczecin Technical University of Poland will give a free concert Thursday, April 20 at 1:30 p.m. in the SAC Cafeteria.

The 45-member choir is touring the province during April and May as part of a cultural exchange visit with the Vancouver Bach Choir, who toured Poland last year.

The choir is made up of 45 students and is under the direction of Jan Szyrocki, a professor of concrete engineering. They perform 90 concerts yearly at home and abroad, have toured Europe, the U.S., India and the Philippines, and are much in demand for radio broadcasts and recordings.

Their on-campus concert will consist mainly of Polish folk tunes and light music.

The visit of the Szczecin Choir is made possible through the assistance of the Canada Council Touring Office.

Major changes planned

This week there will be a referendum that will have a significant effect on the future of BCIT. The question it asks will be, "Do you wish to increase the building fund allocation from \$5.00 to \$10.00?" (an increase in your student activity fee from \$35 to \$40).

Two years ago the student council voted to add \$5 onto the student activity fee. It was increased from \$30 to \$35. This additional \$5 was earmarked for a Building Fund. The purpose of this fund was and is to accumulate moneys for development of the SAC Building. In two years the fund grew to over \$30,000. In November of last year, work started on the SAC cafeteria and lobby. Except for a few minor additions, it is now finished, at a cost of over \$38,000. The entire project was funded by the students through their Building Fund, along with \$3000 from the Administration. This week's referendum asks you to increase this Building Fund allocation to \$10.

Why should I pay and extra \$5.00? I probably won't see any more work done?

WRONG! Plans are already underway. The money would be used to make things better for YOU.

"What kind of improvements?"

The number one concern is the food in the SAC cafeteria. Plans are in the works to have the Student Association take over the food distribution in the SAC. Basically, it would turn **GROWLIES** into a full time outlet (with several changes to the menu such as a Keg 'n' Cleaver style of self-serve salad bar where you would pay for what you get).

Besides offering what we feel would be better food, the food would also be a lot cheaper. Since it would all be funded by student money, the outlet would be run on a "cost plus 10%" basis. Think of how much cheaper you could make it for yourself.

Other areas for development would be to enlarge the cafeteria from a capacity of 350 to 700 people, as well as the addition of squash courts and saunas. A swimming pool could be ready by September of 1980.

The changes you have seen to the SAC building this year were only a start at what could be done. So, for better food, for lower costs, for newer and better facilities, PLEASE turn out and vote to increase the SAC Building Fund allocation to \$10.00.

EDITORIAL

VOTE !!!

Today, tomorrow, and Friday are probably the most important three days of the year at BCIT. Starting today with the all-candidates meeting and ending with the final vote count Friday night the future of BCIT's Student Association will be shaped. This is not a matter to be taken lightly. One has only to listen to the candidates to quickly realize how serious they are about student affairs. The Student Association is entering a critical point in its history and every student should be sure to exercise their right to see that the Student Association is controlled by people who express the views of the student body. It is imperative that all interested students attend the meeting today in the SAC and question the candidates about the issues. It is even more imperative that every student then votes for his choice on Thursday or Friday.

There will also be a referendum to vote on. The SA is asking you to increase your student fees from \$35 to \$40 per year. The \$5 increase would go directly to the SA's Building Fund and bring the total portion of student fees going to that fund up to \$10 from \$5. It is this fund that has paid for the improvements made to the SAC building this year and increasing the fund will mean that more improvements can be made.

Second Year Students: Don't forget you have a vote in these elections also. First year students who might not feel this is fair should make sure that more first year students than second year students vote to ensure that graduating students don't control the election.

As the year wears down the Link rolls out. We are looking for people right now who will be involved with the Link next year. You don't have to know anything about newspapers (obviously!), you just have to be concerned enough about BCIT to find out what is really going on around here. Working on the Link could be a perfect opportunity to remain involved next year for those candidates not fortunate enough to be elected.

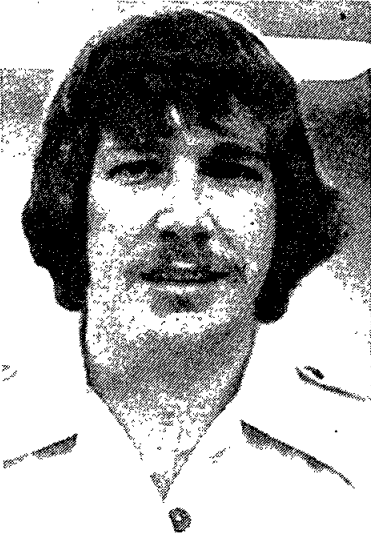

ROD BAY

What experience do you have that might help you in student government?

The Presidents



FIONA FRASER

ROD BAY: I was the president of my high school in Cranbrook as well as on the executive of some social clubs there. I have also been involved in both Federal and Provincial elections.

FIONA FRASER: This year I was Health Society Chairperson on Council along with being tech rep. I've been an active participant in all BCIT activities, both athletic and social.

VIC SPENCER: I had some management training at a hotel and feel that I've got good experience in dealing with people and in consolidating ideas. This year I was set rep, 1st year Finance rep in the Business Society and tech rep on council.

At present I'm on the Young Canada Works Ministerial Advisory Board.

What do you see as the major issues in the election and what is your stand on them?

FIONA FRASER: Parking! The administration doesn't seem to be aware of our problem in this area.

There is need for increased security, more lighting and improvement in the location and general conditions of the parking areas themselves.

SAC Management is also an issue. We'll have to look into special programs for the 250 people living in the residences for which the SAC will be a living room. We should consider expansion in order to give them

more than just beer and TV.

I am for improved food services. It's not that the food itself is bad, but the hours are poor and should be improved.

Along these lines, I think we are within our rights to ask for an extension of library hours to from one hour before classes starting in the morning until one hour after the last class ends (including night school).

I'm aware that there are many other issues and I welcome any questions concerning them.

VIC SPENCER: The SAC Management Agreement! We must make sure the agreement works, and that it works for the students.

The proposed expansion of Health Services would cost us room in Publications and the barber shop. A better solution would be to have Health Services relocate in the recreation area where they can easier deal with injuries. There'll have to be expansion to take care of the new people in residence.

I'm not sure if parking is as big an issue as some people say. If parking is the biggest thing on everybody's mind here, then this place has got to be running pretty smooth. People here don't have to walk as far as people at UBC or SFU. Of course, parking must increase with enrollment. I'd like to investigate the possibility of pay-reserve student parking.

Campus food services in the SAC are questionable at best. "Growlies" should expand to take over the other area. This would also supply more student employment and any profits would go to the SA.

ROD BAY: We're going to be losing fine parking spaces in return for isolated ones. A trip to Victoria to talk to Pat McGeer might be helpful in this connection. I figure we could fit 60-100 more cars into the scramble lot if it were redesigned and this may be helpful in the short-term.

Residence is an issue. The people in residence will make the use of present facilities that much heavier and something must be done.

Food services in the SAC are Terrible. Line-ups are sometimes 15-20 minutes long for food that isn't that tasty.

The fine record that BCIT has in recreation should be maintained. I also don't think the student body should go into debt over non-essentials.

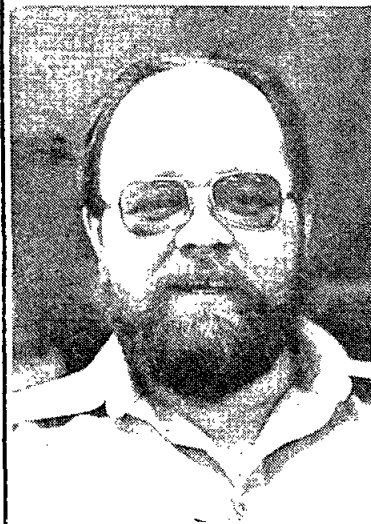
Why should the students vote for you?

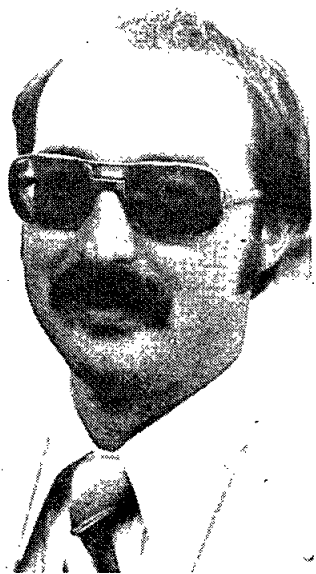
What past experience do you have that might help you in student government?

TOM FRIEDRICH: I have had experience with both the student council and Business Society affairs during the last two terms through my position as Tech Rep for Operations Management. I have also gained experience through supervisory positions in industry.

DAVE KIMPINSKY: Before coming to BCIT to enroll in Marketing Management, I was a Product Manager in a retail food outlet. This past year I have been a helper and researcher in student activities.

What do you see as the major issues in the election and what is your stand on them?

DAVE KIMPINSKY: More work should be done in the SAC to follow up this past year's work. There is money available for more improvement, renovation and

even expansion. Parking renovation is another issue, for we must ensure that permanent parking is planned for the future. Parking procedures in the scramble lot could also be more organized. Furthermore, the lines of communication—from Victoria to the Administration to the Commissionaires to the students—should be improved.

TOM FRIEDRICH: We need more parking and we're going to have to work for viable solutions. In the same vein is bus passes, which should relieve parking problems. Bus passes at \$75 a year would be a lot cheaper than using a car, and apparently UVic students have this privilege already. We don't have enough knowledge of student opinion and I plan to continue the efforts of the current VP Internal and get more information. I also see the SAC Management Agreement and Bearpit sessions as areas that

are in need of work.

Why should the students vote for you?

TOM FRIEDRICH: I've been involved this year, especially in Exposure. The position of VP Internal is basically an Operations Management job and I feel I have the abilities and the experience to work for the students.

DAVE KIMPINSKY: I feel I'm a very likeable person. I also believe I'm a very aggressive person, but I do listen to problems before I speak or decide on them.

What past experience do you have that might help you in student government?

NORMAN LEGGATT: For the past 20 years I have been working in the Performing Arts as a teacher, choreographer, director, producer and public relations officer. This has given me great exposure in the Vancouver busi-

CATHY McMAHON: I think that the parking situation is a major issue. If students had bus passes, it would alleviate the problem to a large extent. This will be my chief objective. Also, present parking facilities should be developed so that students don't have

to walk through miles of mud to get to school. The SAC Management Agreement is another major issue and I would really like to get on the SAC Management Committee. I would like to see better timetabling in the SAC, particularly with regard to writing exams in the cafeteria. I'm sure this could be done without creating a food problem for students if the time-tabling were improved.

NORMAN LEGGATT: The Open House will be an invaluable way to sell BCIT to future students and potential employers. Shinerama and Telethon are two other very important activities coming up in the next school year. There are many other issues on which I am prepared to act. Among these is the current parking problem, problems with the SAC pub and improvement of the existing food services. My first priority is to establish a close working relationship between student council and the students. This in turn will increase student input to council, and add to awareness as to what's happening on or off campus.

Why should the students vote for you?

NORMAN LEGGATT: The job of VP External is an extremely important one. As VP Ex., I will bring to the job many years of organizational experience. I will also be totally involved and, above all, approachable.

CATHY McMAHON: I think it's important for BCIT students to have a good reputation in the community, and I intend to encourage this through activities such as Shinerama. Ian Robertson, the present VP External, worked to set up meetings with members of the GreenTree Village Community, after receiving complaints about the noise for BCIT dances. This kind of input into the community is good, and I will work to maintain that input if I'm elected.

LOUIS ZONTA

What past experience do you have that might help you in student government?

BLAKE COWAN: The majority of my experience comes from my involvement in BCIT in the past year. I was Tech Rep for first year Marketing and a member of the Business Society.

LOUIS ZONTA: I worked in a retail outlet for four years where I had the opportunity to oversee the running of a retail operation and to work with people. I was

also set rep and attended a number of council meetings.

What do you see as the major issues in the election and what is your stand on them?

LOUIS ZONTA: SAC expansion is an issue to be considered to provide more facilities to the student body. Added income could result through the addition of squash courts and possibly adding lights to the tennis courts. Parking is another issue, with an increase in need for 1300 parking spaces in the next three to four years. I think it's important to provide some added attractions

for those students who don't usually get involved in campus activities.

BLAKE COWAN: Basically, I see the major issues as SAC expansion, parking, and, as Treasurer, running the Bookstore properly. I want to pursue the idea of plugging profits from the Administration Bookstore back into the Student Association. I would also like to see the referendum on SAC improvements passed in the upcoming election as it would allow for a continuation of SAC renovations.

Why should the students vote for you?

BLAKE COWAN: I believe I have the capabilities required by the position of Treasurer. I saw how council worked as Tech Rep and I appreciate what goes into the actual running and maintaining of school. I managed to maintain a first class average despite fairly extensive extra-curricular activities and I feel this shows that I can do the job if I'm elected.

LOUIS ZONTA: I believe I can be a very successful treasurer. I have lots of experience at the retail level which will be valuable in working in the TNT. My practical experience includes both supervisory and merchandising experience. If elected, I will be approachable and will voice the opinions of myself and the students.
