





## Major changes planned

This week there will be a referendum that will have a significant effect on the future of BCIT. The question it asks will be, "Do you wish to increase the building fund allocation from \$5.00 to \$10.00?" (an increase in your student activity fee from \$35 to \$40).

Two years ago the student council voted to add \$5 onto the student activity fee. It was increased from \$30 to \$35. This additional \$5 was earmarked for a Building Fund. The purpose of this fund was and is to accumulate moneys for development of the SAC Building. In two years the fund grew to over \$30,000. In November of last year, work started on the SAC cafeteria and lobby. Except for a few minor additions, it is now finished, at a cost of over \$38,000. The entire project was funded by the students through their Building Fund, along with \$3000 from the Administration. This week's referendum asks you to increase this Building Fund alocation to \$10.

Why should I pay and extra \$5.00? | probably won't see any more work done? \*

WRONG! Plans are already underway. The money would be used to make things better for YOU.

"What kind of improvements?"

The number one concern is the food in the SAC cafeteria. Plans are in the works to have the Student Association take over the food distribution in the SAC. Basically, it would turn GROWLIES into a full time outlet (with several changes to the menu such as a Keg 'n' Cleaver style of self-serve salad bar where you would pay for what you get).

Besides offering what we feel would be better food, the food would also be a lot cheaper. Since it would all be funded by student money, the outlet would be run on a "cost plus 10%" basis. Think of how much cheaper you could make it for yourself.

Other areas for development would be to enlarge the cafeteria from a capacity of 350 to 700 people, as well as the addition of squash courts and saunas. A swimming pool could be ready by September of 1980.

The changes you have seen to the SAC building this year were only a start at what could be done. So, for better food, for lower costs, for newer and better facilities, PLEASE

Today, tomorrow, and Friday are probably the most important three days of the year at BCIT. Starting today with the all-candidates meeting and ending with the final vote count Friday night the future of BCIT's Student Association will be shaped. This is not a matter to be taken lightly. One has only to listen to the candidates to quickly realize how serious they are about student affairs. The Student Association is entering a critical point in its history and every student should be sure to exercise their right to see that the Student Association is controlled by people who express the views of the student body. It is imperative that all interested students attend the meeting today in the SAC and question the candidates about the issues. It is even more imperative that every student then votes for his choice on Thursday or Friday.

There will also be a referendum to vote on. The SA is asking you to increase your student fees from \$35 to \$40 per year. The \$5 increase would go directly to the SA's Building Fund and bring the total portion of student fees going to that fund up to \$10 from \$5. It is this fund that has paid for the improvements made to the SAC building this year and increasing the fund will mean that more improvements can be made.

Second Year Students: Don't forget you have a vote in these elections also. First year students who might not feel this is fair should make sure that more first year students than second year students vote to ensure that graduating students don't control the election.

As the year wears down the Link rolls out. We are looking for people right now who will be involved with the Link next year. You don't have to know anything about newspapers (obviously!), you just have to be concerned enough about BCIT to find out what is really going on around here. Working on the Link could be a perfect opportunity to remain involved next year for those candidates not fortunate enough to be elected.



#### VIC SPENCER What do you see as the major issues in the election and what is

your stand on them? FIONA FRASER: Parking! The administration doesn't seem to be aware of our problem in this area.

There is need for increased security, more lighting and improvement in the locaton and general conditions of the parking areas themselves.

SAC Management is also an We'll have to look into issue. special programs for the 250 people living in the residences for which the SAC will be a living room. We should consider expansion in order to give them more than just beer and TV.

I am for improved food services. It's not that the food itself is bad, but the hours are poor and should be improved.

Along these lines, I think we are within our rights to ask for an extension of library hours to from one hour before classes starting in the morning until one hour after the last class ends (including night school).

I'm aware that there are many other issues and I welcome any questions concerning them. VIC SPENCER: The SAC Man-agement Agreement! We must

make sure the agreement works, and that it works for the students.

The proposed expansion of Health Services would cost us room in Publications and the barber shop. A better solution would be to have Health Services relocate in the recreation area where they can easier deal with There'll have to be injuries. expansion to take care of the new people in residence.

I'm not sure if parking is as big an issue as some people say. If parking is the biggest thing on everybody's mind here, then this place has got to be running pretty smooth. People here don't have to walk as far as people at UBC or SFU. Of course, parking must increase with enrollment. I'd like to investigate the possibility of pay-reserve student parking.

Campus food services in the SAC are questionable at best. "Growlies" should expand to take over the other area. This would also supply more student employment and any profits would go to the SA.

ROD BAY: We're going to be losing fine parking spaces in return for isolated ones. A trip to Victoria to talk to Pat McGeer might be helpful in this connection. I figure we could fit 60-100 more cars into the scramble lot if it were redesigned and this may be helpful in the short-term.

Residence is an issue. The people in residence will make the use of present facilities that much heavier and something must be done.

Food services in the SAC are Terrible. Line-ups are sometimes 15-20 minutes long for food that isn't that tasty.

The fine record that BCIT has in recreation should be maintained. I also don't think the student body should go into debt

over non-essentials. Why should the students vote for you?

VIC SPENCER: I feel that I've represented the views of the students fairly this year. I have experience and I know the issues. I offer continuity and can implement decisions that were made by this year's council.

#### What do you see as the major issues in the election and what is your stand on them?



number of council meetings. What do you see as the major

issues in the election and what is your stand on them?

LOUIS ZONTA: SAC expansion is an issue to be considered to provide more facilities to the student body. Added income could result through the addition of squash courts and possibly adding lights to the tennis courts. Parking is another issue, with an increase in need for 1300 parking spaces in the next three to four years. I think it's important to provide some added attractions

What do you see as the major issues in the election?


I'll be running on my last year's performance and will be maintaining what I have attempted to set last year.

Imagine yourself in a movie theatre. You're on your way to the snack bar for some popcorn, and your date says, "Could you get me some granola please?" Or, you're watching the movie, and your kid starts crying. Or maybe your grandmother would enjoy seeing a show, but her hearing is going downhill.

Well you don't have to worry anymore. The Ridge Theatre at 3131 Arbutus Street has opened. This is no regular movie house, thanks to the efforts of Leonard Schein and Allen Stevens. planned for the Burnaby Campus, and that the warehouse situation was only a temporary measure has led to some skepticism.

We have had to fight to obtain some semblance of cafeteria services. We have had to "demonstrate" to have installed baseboard heaters during the winter months. We have requested that proper illumination levels be ashered to, that library and student service facilities be established, that Burnaby's fire by-laws be enforced in order to have a fire alarm system installed. Lately rain is draining through a rotting roof. If and when these requests are followed up, the situation still remains far from adequate as a permanent training facility.

We support your proposal that available parking spots are allocated prior to construction. We would propose for the long term the following:

a) That B.C. Hydro initiate a "Student Bus Pass" arrangement.

That improved transit b) service be provided on the Willingdon run.

c) That planning for multi-level parking be initiated.

Assuming construction proceeds by late August, the completion date is estimated to be September 1980 (???) We would hope to expect the co-operation of all concerned at BCIT in resolving any difficulties which may arise before and during construction of the electrical trades training centre.

In an immaculate performance last Thursday he held the entire Queen Elizabeth Theatre in awe of his incredible guitar and vocal capabilities. The way he swiftly glides up and down the guitar strings with such smooth precision, virtually unequalled by other guitarists, has people talking about him for days after the show. From the moment he steps on stage he is in command, of the music and of the the audience. Backed by a very talented and very closely controlled band, George Benson does not overpower and yet does not let himself fade away

Dressed in an all white suite, George had the spotlight for 80% of the show, standing very still, moving only to allow the spotlight to shine on one of the band members during short instrumental excursions.

The repertoire consisted of many songs written or composed by others, but performed in Benson's own special way. The highlight of the show was when he performed "Masquerade", probably the most well known (as in commercially successful) song of his long career. A very fine concert by one of the most renowned singer/guitarists in the world. The sound, by the way, was excellent; quite a contrast from the harsh acoustics to which I am accustomed in the Coliseum.

After such a relaxing and enjoyable concert, I went down to the Zodiac in New Westminster to catch Trooper in action. On record these guys are very clean and controlled. Live, Trooper is the definition of rough and raunchy rock and roll. Great stuff to get down and boogie to. The Zodiac actually has one of the better laid out cabarets that I've seen, including a decent sized dance floor. Trooper premiered a number of the songs that will appear on their new album, and they sound good.




