STIRLIKE AWERITED?

FSA, institute hammer out a framework for settlement Any return to a strike seen as unlikely this spring

hances of another strike by BCIT's Faculty and Staff
Association members are fading

According to Student Association president Shane Styles, both sides appear to be optimistic about the possibilities of reaching an agreement.

This return to goodwill in the negotiations would appear to make a resumption of strike activities by the FSA this spring unlikely but does not rule out the possibility of future strike activity—such as next September—should negotiations breakdown again.

On Tuesday March 1, the FSA—which represents instructors in BCIT's technology programs and staff in some support areas—cancelled an information meeting scheduled for that afternoon citing "recent developments in negotiations" Instead, the bargaining team met with the FSA's board of directors.

In a release later that day they said significant progress had been made.

"After a meeting with the Bargaining Team today, the FSA Directors believe that there has been significant progress toward a final resolution of the ongoing BCIT labour-management dispute," said the release.

"We have not reached a tentative agreement but we have at least been able to agree to a framework for a settlement. Now the good intentions of both sides must be put to good use to draft the terms of a tentative agreement that can be submitted to the members for ratification."

The framework for a settlement, according to the FSA release, includes resolutions to a number of issues which have been obstacles between the fac-



ulty and the administration.

The issue of wages has been settled in accordance with provincial government guidelines of no increases for two years with a two percent increase in the third year. Also benefits will include improved vacation for those employees with 20 years of service and 100 percent employer-paid Long Term Disability premiums.

Under the framework regular working hours will be extended hours to 7:30am - 6:30pm, Monday - Friday, with protections for individual employees. The extension of regular working hours to also include Saturdays, as proposed by the institute, is not included in the settlement framework.

Also as part of a settlement, benefits will extended to Part-Time Studies Instructors working the equivalent of half of a full-time instructional load and

an improved set of guidelines for hiring PTS Instructors will be drawn up, according to the FSA.

The conflict over the issue of professional development funding has essentially been delayed. The framework calls for the creation of a short-term professional development leave fund for regular

faculty members and some improvements to the existing PD Leave fund.

Not included in the framework is BCIT's plan to establish a new \$775,000 Technology Innovation Fund for curriculum/professional development leaves that the FSA criticized for being "management-controlled". Nor will it included "the transfer of PD Leave funds to expense funds," according to the FSA.

The institute's proposals for what the FSA called "the creation of two-tiered working conditions and benefits based on seniority" where new employees would have a different set of work hours and benefits—like paying more for parking—are not included.

It is not clear from the FSA's releases whether new instructional positions to deal with the problem of instructor workload are a part of the settlement framework, although BCIT's proposal had included the hiring of five additional instructors and to conduct a study into educational and workload issues.

A new meeting has been scheduled for members of the FSA will be meeting on March 29th to make a final decision on any Tentative Agreement that is agreed to as a result of the framework.

SA continues to watch FSA-BCIT negotiations

A President Shane Styles reported that the SA is still monitoring the negotiations between the Faculty and Staff Association and BCIT management. Styles said both sides appear to be optimistic about the possibilities of reaching an agreement. This would appear to make a resumption of strike activities by the FSA this spring unlikely.

SA begins forgivable loan program

he Student Association is establishing a new loan fund for students. Loans to students from this fund will be forgivable — not repayable to the SA. All the SA asks is that you make a donation back to the SA if you are ever in a financial position that makes it possible.

BC students unhappy over campus strikes

BURNABY, BC abour unrest may have come to a halt at British Columbia's post-secondary institutions, but the results haven't been ideal for everyone involved.

Even though the recent strike by college support staff across the province was brief and managed to produce settlements, some students affected by the job action are criticizing the unions for interrupting their classes and setting them back in their studies

Karen Burkell, an environmental chemistry student from the University College of the Cariboo in Kamloops, said the workers went too far when they set up picket lines that shut down 11 colleges, institutes and agencies on February 23 and 24.

"The two days that we were off last week for the strike I missed a four hour lab period, which put all the people in that lab behind," said Burkell, adding that other students she has spoken with share her feelings. "We don't know if we're going to be able to make that time up."

But Carol Nielson, communications officer for one of the two unions representing support and technical staff at the affected schools, said the strike was mandated by the union's 3,500 workers after nearly a year at the bargaining table.

"We needed to send a strong, clear message to the government that the strike was about more than just money," she said. "It was about fairness and respect for support staff, and that it was time to get serious at the bargaining table."

"It was unfortunate that the colleges were shut down for a couple of days," she added. "We didn't want to disrupt education for students. Nobody ever wants to go on strike, but sometimes you have to in order to achieve a fair settlement."

In response, Burkell said other techniques can be used to pressure governments and employers, like the work-to-rule campaign she witnessed as a high school student in Ontario.

"It gets the students upset enough to do something about it, to really pressure," she said. "But at the same time it doesn't affect your academic career."


Yet despite the concerns of students like Burkell, the strike action got official support from the Canadian Federation of Students, which represents students at seven of the 11 affected institutions.

"Many students joined our members on the picket lines and showed their support," said Nielson, whose union was joined in the dispute by the Canadian Union of Public Employees. "It only lasted two days, and I think most students saw the issues that were on the table and the issues that were important to our members and supported them."

While school administrations and the unions were able to reach a tentative four-year agreement to end the strike on February 25, Nielson said the deal won't be voted on by members until sometime in April.

Women prepare for world-wide march

live years ago a group of ₹850 women from the Fédération des femmes du Québec (FFQ) marched in three contingents for 10 days yelling "Bread not Roses" and demanded social and economic equality. About 15,000 women cheered them to the finish line.

When a group of women met at the September 1995 Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, they decided it was time for a similar march on a global scale.

This year, on Oct. 17, what is now called the World March of Women, is expected to have women participating in 70 per cent of the countries in the world.

"We should march for all the women who are not free to march themselves," said Nancy Burrows of the FFQ.

The official launch is on March 8, with the start of a signature campaign in support of demands for international women's rights.

Still, women have been working hard all year to get the event up and running.

The FFQ would like Quebec women to write their own personal message on support cards, sign them, and mail them to the FFQ, whose members will pass them on to the Secretary General of the United Nations, Kofi Annan, on the day of the march.

The FFQ has also requested

meetings with the presidents of the International Monetary Fund and the World Bank in Washington on Oct. 15.

For reasons such as war, politics, repression, geography and financial resources, women in different countries will use different means to get their messages

The two main themes emerging around the world are poverty and violence. Recognizing the connection between the two, organizers are urging countries to adopt a tax on financial transac-

The so-called Tobin Tax named for James Tobin, an economist at Yale University - proposes a 0.1 per cent tax on speculative transactions.

The United Nations says this could raise \$720-billion (US) per year for a social development fund, managed by equal numbers of men and women. March coordinators say this would be enough to put an end to poverty.

The World March of Women is calling for the cancellation of all third-world debt.

Johanne Emond from the FFO. says the march has already "exceeded expectations" with women in 145 out of 210 countries participating in the event. However, women in countries such as Afghanistan and China

Organizers say they don't want this to be a one-time action. They hope to establish a concrete women's network, and facilitate future calls to action

Media concentration hurts journalism: press critics

CALGARY The concentration of media ownership in Canada is degrading journalism, the audience of a recent Media and Democracy forum was told.

The somewhat sombre event, organized by the women's group Arusha and the organization Friends of the Herald, featured a panel of media critics, activists and journalism instructors discussing problems with the media and how to improve it.

David Rooney, a journalism instructor at Mount Royal College, says concentration of media ownership chokes out fairness, balance and ethics in jour-

"Where does this leave newspaper journalists?" he asked.

Rooney suggested that alternatives must be sought. However, as he pointed out, start up costs for print media are prohibitive. So one solution he brought forward was for cyberspace to become the new home of independent journalism.

"If independent voices are ever going to be heard in Canada during the future, some band of journalists must hive off and establish a presence in print or in cyberspace," said Rooney.

Rooney quoted from a 30 year-old report by the Davey Committee, a senate special comcalled Canadian newspapers, "the boneyard of broken dreams."

According to the committee report, between 1958 to 1970 newspaper chains increased their share of daily circulation from 25 per cent to 45 per cent. In 1980 that figure had risen to 57 per

Today, almost all of Canada's 105 newspapers belong to chains - including the Globe and Mail, Toronto Star, National Post, Southam Newspapers and the Sun Chain - while 58 of these papers are owned by Conrad Black's Hollinger International

Gillian Steward, a writer and journalist, spoke on specific problems she saw with the media in Calgary.

"Calgary, compared to any city of comparable size in Canada, is the worst served by it's local media," she said.

Ann McGrath, an international media activist, echoed this harsh critic by comparing Calgary to other Canadian cities.

Toronto has four daily newspapers - the Post and Globe publish special city editions - while Montreal has many different publications in French and English, including four large alternative weeklies and four dailies. Vancouver, meanwhile, has only two major dailies but a slew of

cities enjoy a wider spectrum of debate on many issues due to the greater number of media outlets. Calgary, in contrast, has two major dailies and one of them, the Herald, is currently involved in a bitter strike.

All of the above has led, McGrath believes, to a serious lack of debate in Calgary.


"That's death for democracy," she said. "[We need] lots of ideas, lots of debate, discussion, points of view . . . because that is how people make decisions."

A lack of fairness and objectivity were the main problems discussed at the forum. Solutions to these problems ranged from communities starting their own papers, to opportunities on the Internet, to simply better journal-

The most immediate and practical solution for the public to receive better media was suggested by Talbert Walters, a Calgary Herald editorial writer.

"You gotta phone," said Walters. "Phone the person whose name appeared in the story, if it's a wire story phone the editors of the paper that produced the story. Ask the questions you have and then, insist on an answer."

Walters argued that if people voice their complaints to the paper, then the product must change. And if it doesn't, he suggests you withdraw your support


product, from Beck. And don't get his name mixed with Jeff Beck.

Likewise, in the Bitter Moon by Polanski, a civilized, married


