International students adjusting

For many students, moving from Prince George to BCIT is a major adjustment. Imagine, then, the upheaval involved in coming here from Ethiopia, Kuwait, or another foreign country. That's the situation faced by eighty-seven international students here at BCIT.

To make sure the transition isn't too traumatic, Tyrone Walls, coordinator of the International Students Program, tries to look after any needs that arise: from finding housing to arranging a prayer room for Moslem students. "My job is to help the students in any way possible," says Walls. "You can't put people into a new environment and expect them to adjust totally, forgetting about their own culture. There has to be a blend of the old and new."

According to Walls, the largest group of foreign students on campus this year are Libyans, sponsored by the oil company they worked for at home. Most study Mechanical Engineering.

Other students, from Nigeria, Kuwait, Ethiopia, China, Bangladesh, and New Zealand study Business Management, and Forest resources, along with Engineering.

It is important for these students to mix with Canadian students in their technologies. Walls says

"The first problem students face is language. That is helped by a one year English course at UBC, as well as CORE studies at BCIT, the second major problem is cultural awareness. Both language and cultural difficulties are best overcome when foreign

Tragic tale of a star

Dorothy Stratten was a young and naive woman from Vancouver. She came to national prominence almost five years ago by taking her clothes off and



posing in Playboy magazine. people said this girl had something, something that according to her manager-husband, would make her the star of 1980.

This is the subject of Bob Fosse's latest film 'Star 80'. It is supposed to be the story of Dorothy Stratten, but the focus appears to be on her manager Paul Snider. He's the slimy and

slippery man-on-the-make who discovers Dorothy at a suburban Vancouver Dairy Queen in the spring of 1978. After much wining and dining, he persuades her to pose for some nude pictures. He then sends them to Playboy and soon she is 'hobnobbin' with the Hollywood crowd at Hugh Hefner's mansion. She becomes Miss August, then the playmate of the year.

As a token for her appreciation, and confused love, she marries Snider, much to the dismay of Hefner and her other friends. However, it soon becomes apparent (what took so long?) that Snider is really quite sick. He's very possessive and jealous of Dorothy's success. After all he gave her her start in the business.

So, finally, Dorothy, who is trying to make an acting career for herself, decides that Snider is a hindrance to her, and wants to end the marriage. Well, this is too much for Paul - he can't take the rejection, so he kills her...and then kills himself.

Well that's how the story goes, we read about it in the newspapers, hear about it on the radio, and saw it on the TV news. A television movie has been aired as well. So why after three years another rendition of the story? This major motion picture

is really quite unnecessary. How many times can the life of Dorothy Stratten be exploited.

Still the film, for what its worth has a lot going for it. Fosse directs the film in a sensitive manner. There is some excellent still shots giving the film a glossy look. The photography is beautiful to look at.

Mariel Hemingway turns in a good performance as Stratten. At times there is a strong resemblance. Eric Roberts is appropriately slimy as Paul Snider, and Cliff Robertson portrays a convincing Hugh Hefner.

If you are interested in seeing a movie about the so called price of fame, then Star 80 may be worth your while, but keep in mind that the story is nothing new.

Although there may have been fewer students on campus, the Food Training Centre was closed and the Snackery certainly seemed as busy.

Maybe the attitude of

those students and staff who were attending classes was better and they cleaned up their own messes more. Possible but doubtful.

Or is it possible that the management fill-ins (untrained but capable of friendly and efficient service) were plentiful and therefore, lots of help was available. Again doubtful, although there did seem to be an extra cashier available when lineups built-up.

Or was it all due to a difference in attitude of the 'staff'?

Whatever the reason, the manager (and his/her staff) of the Snackery should take note and try to encourage the same standard that was evident during the strike.

Life's final chapter

The threat of nuclear war. Where will you be if it happens? If you live in a big city, you'll most likely die right away. If you live in a small town, you'll probably be around to witness the painful and disgusting aftermath.

The movie 'Testament' examines the effects of the unthinkable on a small California town.

The town wasn't hit, but San Francisco and other Eastern U.S. cities were. That's the extent of the explanations concerning the attacks. The movie isn't political at all.

The focus of the film is how a family and the other residents of Hamlin, California deal with a nuclear bomb going off so close to home.

The Weatherlys are a typical small town family. This is shown realistically at the beginning of the film. The son rides his bike with his dad, the daughter takes piano lessons, the younger son

makes a mess of breakfast and the mother is involved in community and school events. They lead a fairly structured and quiet life. But nothing could prepare them for the horrible event that is about to happen.

We never see the actual bomb going off, it's represented by a strong flash on the screen. The film centers on the human aspect of the incident - the emotions of fear, anger, sadness, and depression are all explored.

The movie seems very realistic, and it's very disturbing. The audience was quiet and almost mesmerized at what was unfolding on the screen. Sniffling could be heard throughout.

There isn't an overabundance of gore in the film, but there's enough to make you realize that all the warnings about the aftermath of a nuclear attack aren't a joke.

Jane Alexander plays Carol Weatherly - the mother who tries desperately to remain strong and in one piece for her family. It's a truly fine performance, which should probably earn her an Oscar nomination. The children in the film are a group of good actors. The script is based on the book 'The Last Testament' by Carol Amen.

'Testament' is one of those 'must see' films. But beware, bring some tissues and be prepared for a thought provoking movie.

students associate with Canadian students."

Libyan, Ahmed Namer, and Kuwaitian, Suleiman Sheik, both in Mechanical Engineering, speak English fluently. Their main problems have been adjusting to the BCIT system. "Getting used to labs and more intensified studies has been difficult," says Namer.

Sheik agreed: "We are used to a more theoretical approach. It is the practical work that's tough. BCIT standards are high, but Kuwait standards are actually higher. A lot of Canadian students found some things difficult, which I found easy. I have problems in other areas, though."

Both Namer and Sheik believe a good rapport with their classmates is necessary. Most students are helpful and curious about the native countries of international students. "People want to know about where you come from, and what it's like," said Namer, "You have to tell them and clarify things for them."

Obviously, stereotypes do abound. "Someone asked me if I had any oil along with me. I told them yes, I keep some in my bedroom," joked Sheik.

As Namer said: "many people don't know anything more about a country than what they hear in the news. I want to see for myself what it's like before I believe what I'm told."

That's one reason he and other international students have come to BCIT. And if Tyrone Walls is right, the cultural exchange should be a benefit to all.

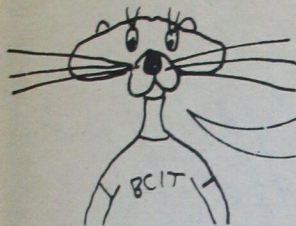

Games will be 15 points for Racquetball and 11 points for Squash (win by two). A consolation round will guarantee all players two games. Consolation winners will receive a prize.

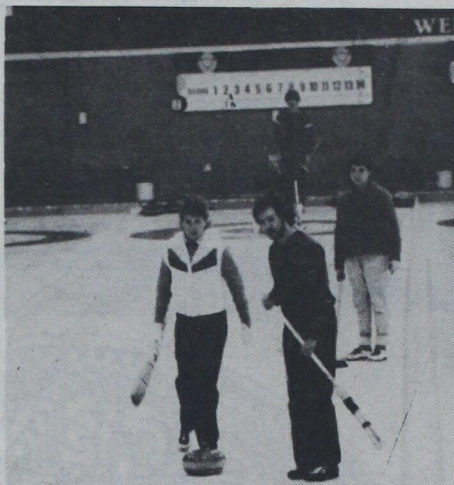
