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Murray expects at least \$2 million cut

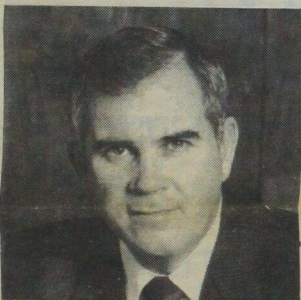
Cutbacks to BCIT next year "will be in the two to three million dollar bracket."

At least this is what BCIT President Roy Murray is hoping. He told student council last week that he doesn't believe the government will cut BCIT's operating grant by the 5 to 10 million dollar amounts feared by students and staff.

Murray told council members that BCIT will be able to cope with cuts in the 2 to 3 million dollar range.

"The Institute has the ability to make some adjustments with the budget without adversely affecting the quality of the current programs," said Murray.

He said "hundreds of thousands of dollars" could be saved, and that the Educational Council

will be looking at various "sound academic" means of cutting costs, including reviewing the number of classroom hours and the set system.

Murray indicated that the institute would also be looking at how programs are structured and delivered.

"BCIT has the opportunity to reassess where it's going academically, regardless of the financial crisis," says Murray. He added that the institute has a very good track record and said there will be a lot of innovative things happening at BCIT in the future. "BCIT is too valuable an institution not to be utilized to the fullest."

Fears that BCIT was facing massive cuts were sparked last fall when Stan Hagen, Minister of Advanced Education and Job

Training, announced that BCIT would be going back to formula funding in 1989. Formula funding allocates educational dollars in the B.C. college system by granting money to an institution based on the number of students in a particular program.

BCIT was part of the system prior to amalgamation with the Pacific Vocational Institute, when BCIT was promised global funding (a lump sum to operate). BCIT had wanted out of formula funding at the time because it did not recognize BCIT's higher costs per student.

Fleming Sondergaard, Chairman of the BCIT Board of Governors, reacting to reports that the institution's budget could be cut anywhere from 5 to 10 million dollars, says he has "heard a lot of numbers being thrown around, but I haven't seen an announcement to that effect."

Dick Melville, information officer for the Minister of Advanced Education, says they won't know how much money BCIT will be getting until the provincial budget comes down. As far as BCIT's return to formula funding is concerned, Melville says "We won't be able to devise the final formula until we find out how much money we're getting from the government."

Sondergaard says he doesn't know how the new formula will affect BCIT funding, but adds it is felt that if BCIT had been in formula funding (since the amalgamation), "there would have been a shortfall of some 14 million dollars."

"We have a year and a half to get into formula funding, and we will have to tell them (the government) where we're different from anybody else if we need additional financing, but it has not been said there will be a definite cutback."

In a letter to premier Bill Vander Zalm, Staff Society President Mark Angelo expressed concern that BCIT's funding would be cut by five million dollars or more. He told the premier that such a reduction "would have a devastating effect on the quality of (BCIT) programs."

S.A. President Jamie Letwin says the Student Association is considering a mail-out campaign to solicit support for BCIT.

aid. The Campus Centre campaign is made up of several separate campaigns, each concerned with a different target group. The President's Club is for friends of the institute. The Industry Assistance Project is the campus 'broker' for technology transfer between BCIT and industry and vice versa.

The next meeting of the Development Council is Friday, March 18th, when it will discuss future projects and funding objectives in further detail.

College faculty occupy administration building

Faculty at Douglas College occupied the campus' administration building last week in a "one day silent vigil" to protest the college's bargaining methods.

Over 100 faculty members were involved in the protest, with 10 professors taking one hour stints, according to Len Mills, president of Douglas College Faculty Association.

"The college is bargaining with the faculty on an individual basis rather than at a bargaining table," said Mills. "The college is bargaining in bad faith."

But Ross Cameron, chief negotiator for Douglas College, said faculty members have been approaching management on a one-to-one basis, asking questions about negotiations.

"The negotiation team is not under instructions from myself or management to negotiate with faculty," said Cameron. "The faculty is indulging in misinformation to members."

"The faculty is frustrated by the lack of negotiations and they expressed it in their demonstration," he added.

Faculty's collective agreement with the college expired 10 months ago. The faculty has threatened strike action in their push for wage parity with other B.C. college instructors although it was declared illegal by the provincial arbitration board.

The main stumbling block in the talks is the contract's hiring clause.

The college has final say on who is hired to teach and the faculty can only present a list of whom they consider the best candidates, according to a recent arbitration decision.

The administration insists that the college, not the faculty, should have the responsibility for hiring. But the faculty say the college is just looking for ways to save money while sacrificing the quality of instruction.

"The college wants to hire more people with less experience at a lower salary," said David Reynolds, a lawyer for College/Institute Educators Association. "But the department should set the criteria of who is hired."

Anena Johnston, Douglas College's student president, said the students support the faculty.

"Instructors should be hired on the basis of quality, not cost. We do not want the management to decide who gets hired," Johnston said.

"It's a question of priorities: the deans just got a raise," she added.

Last week, 500 Douglas College students rallied in support of the faculty.

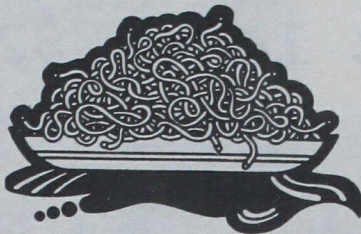
Candidates wishing to advertise in the March 23 issue

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Park report in limbo

The Park Commission report is currently in limbo and is going to be left alone for the time being.

"Nothing is going to be gained by debating the report," says BCIT President Roy Murray. But, he says, the Institute can't take any chances of letting the report disappear. "We are too close to it."

The eight week program audit, completed last fall, was intended to help give BCIT direction.

A submission to the task force by BCIT suggested that a Centre of Advanced Technology be established at BCIT. The centre would develop expertise in specific technologies and facilitate technology transfer to business and industry. Murray said the centre would "tighten the ties between the institute and industry, and provide the opportunity for students to work on class projects and faculty to develop some of their ideas."

However the report, while recognizing the value of such a centre, recommended against

setting it up at BCIT.

Murray told student council last week that BCIT was very disappointed with the recommendation, but didn't think the government was necessarily trying to curtail BCIT activities.

Murray said the report "just got things off the rails" and added that the idea of a separate facility established as a "world class institution of technology education" sent "shock waves to the universities," who Murray said would be threatened the most. Murray says SFU has already contacted BCIT about the possibility of joint efforts.

The government has had the Park report since October 19, but has not yet announced which, if any, recommendations it will implement.

Murray said until the government makes those decisions, BCIT will continue "doing what it does best."

BCIT volunteers help out at Vancouver wine festival

BCIT Hospitality and Tourism students, along with staff members from the Library and Computer Resources department once again helped out at the Vancouver Playhouse Wine Festival. BCIT students and staff have joined the Vancouver Playhouse in its annual fund-raising event for the past eight years.

The BCIT volunteer contingent had the most important task of the event, opening and pouring wine at the wine-tasting booths. This year, 88 premium wineries from nine countries were represented and over 320 vintages were introduced. Guests paid \$30 per evening for the opportunity to taste wines from around the world and to take part in a variety of special events.

Carmine Morelli, an instructor with the Hospitality Administration department, was responsible for organizing the BCIT volunteers, who he says work hard and "displayed a professional attitude and remarkable enthusiasm throughout the festival."

The festival, which Morelli says is the largest "educational consumer event in Canada, if not in North America," is an important event for BCIT Hospitality students. "Students get to meet and work with winemakers, wine experts, owners, sales representatives and fellow wine

enthusiasts," says Morelli. "They also learn about the production, marketing, taste and evaluation of wines."

The wine festival ran for five days, March 2 to 6. Approximately 80 BCIT students and staff took part.

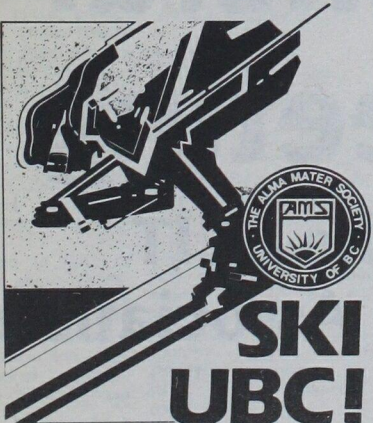

But he's no fool

Depending on your point of view, Bill Vander Zalm is either a moral crusader protecting the rights of the unborn, or a dictatorial religious nut bent on forcing the entire province to toe the official Roman Catholic line.

But it's also clear he's one of two other things... politically courageous or politically suicidal. Vander Zalm has worked himself into a situation where he can't possibly win.

Not only do most of the people in B.C. disagree with his abortion views, but it's becoming clear most of his own party doesn't either. His own cabinet members and MLA's are using words like 'distressing' and 'objectionable' when speaking out on the premier's statements on abortion.

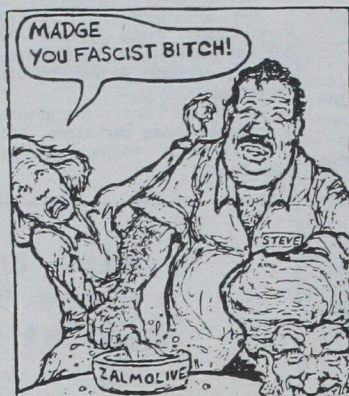
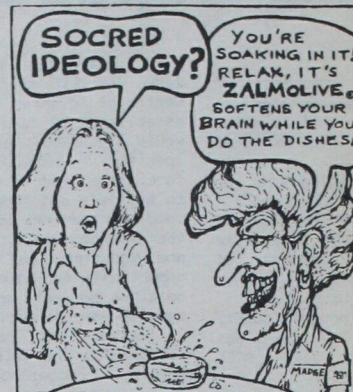
Faced with an ever-increasing level of dissent from his own people and the general population, Vander Zalm will have only two choices. Either fight his personal battle until the bitter end, or retreat and put his religious beliefs aside. So whether it's courage or self-destruction is irrelevant; the result will be the same, which makes the premier's actions fascinating. Because Bill Vander Zalm may be a lot of things, but he's not a fool. This debate is going to cost him his political career, and he knows it.

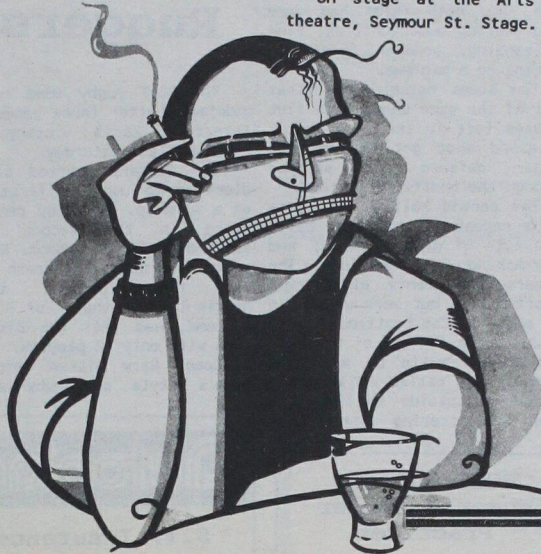

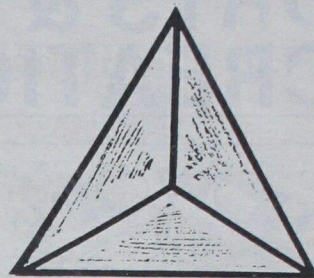

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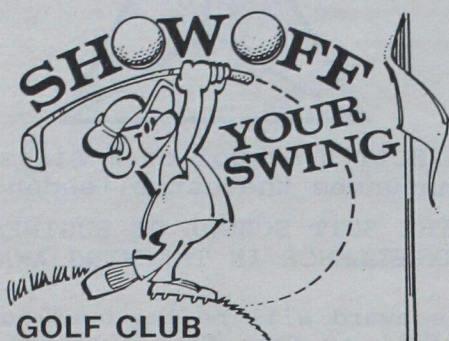
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Cougar soccer team does its best against Capilano
