Register to vote

Students at University and College who have no other place of ordinary residence than the campus may have to take some action in order to be able to vote at the May 22nd Federal Election, according to Jean Marc Hamel, Chief Electoral Officer.

Since enumeration of voters will take place April 2nd to 7. These students will be placed on lists in the cities or towns where they are studying-but on election day, or on the days of advanced polling, they may have completed their study year and gone to a summer job or moved elsewhere.

Here is what student should do if they are eligible voters:

1. A student who has retained the parental home as his residence while away studying should have a parent or guardian place his or her name on the voters list on his home electoral district during enumeration.

2. A student whose name is placed on the preliminary voters list at the university or college local, and wants it changed, he or she must take individual action to have it removed and placed on the voters list in the electoral district to which he or she has moved because of summer employment

if she or he wishes to vote there.

This can be done by contacting the Returning Officer of the electoral district to which he or she has moved (telephone numbers of returning officers appear periodically in the press) who will direct the voter to the local Capitol Court of Revision which will rewrite voters lists during May 2-4.

After May 4, students who have moved will be unable to make such a change and unless their name is on the voters list, such a person will be unable to vote.

Graduating students or others who are remaining at the university or college, and who have no other place of residence, should be enumerated and placed on the voters list there. 109,000 enumerators will obtain the names of an estimated 14.5 million eligible voters between April 2-7 for placing on the Preliminary list of Voters in Canada's 272 electoral districts.

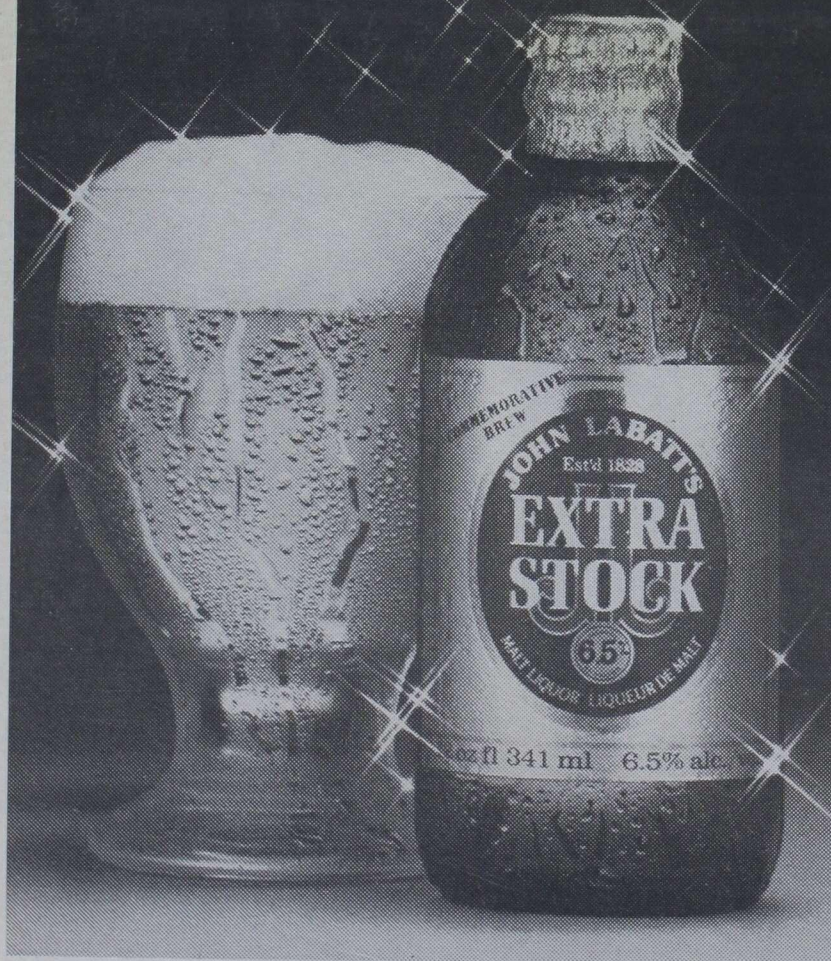

Alice no longer cooped up

I was rather pissed off last Wednesday. Knowing that the Alice Cooper concert was not going to sell out, and not wishing to suffer through a warm-up act like the Babies, I had planned on arriving sometime after nine o'clock. That would normally put me just in time for the main act. However, when I dropped in on some friends on the way to the Coliseum, they informed me that the opening band was a no show, and that Alice was alone. That finished it for me, the show was already more than half over, so there was no use going late.

Fortunately, a couple of my classmates attended the show. One is an old burnt out hippie from the interior, and the other is this kid straight out of high school. (you should see the rest of my class). Both agreed that the volume was far too high and that the music was barely recognizable at all.

However, as expected, it was the stage show that was impressive. By the sounds of it, the show included as many typical Cooper props as ever with few changes. The snake was missing, and instead of the characteristic guillotine, Alice was electrocuted. As usual, the theme of the show is taken from the latest album. Last year it was **Lace and Whiskey**, this year, the album is **From the Inside**.

For a moment, forget that Alice is the one who performs all those gross indecencies on stage. Forget about the snakes, dead babies, monsters, giant teeth, and whatever.

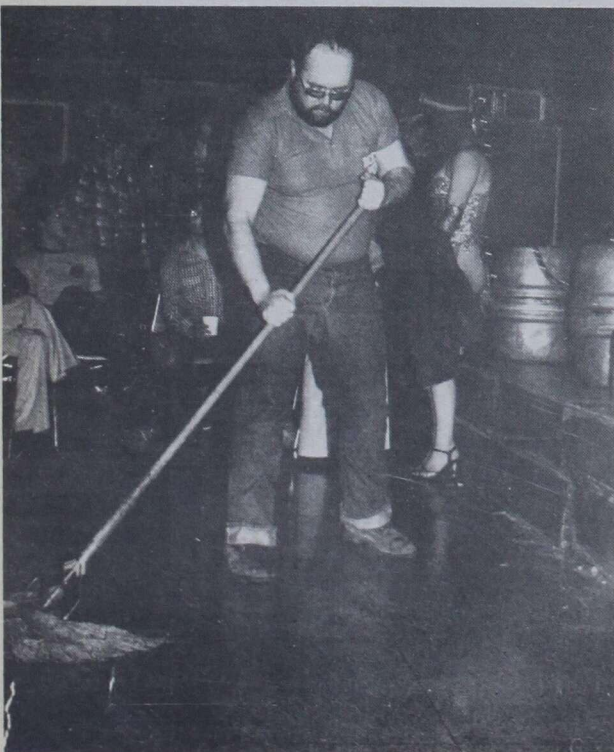
Now, take a look at his latest album - **From the Inside**. Many have dealt with insanity as the subject of their music. Most notable to my recollection is the Pink Floyd album **Dark Side of the Moon**. That was (and still is) one of the most incredible albums of all time. It was a satirical yet poignant look at insanity, one of the most successful concept albums ever packaged. On the other hand, it takes Alice Cooper to deal with insanity at the insane level. And insane is the only way to describe this album.

The songs on this record contain some of the most interesting lyrics generated by the Coop in a long time. The fact that Bernie Taupin is his main co-writer on this album probably helps. On **From the Inside**, Cooper and company tell of Alice's self-imposed exile inside a sanitarium to get him off the drinking that was slowly killing him. They also introduce us to some of the other 'inmates'. Take Millie and Billie for example, the criminally insane couple who disposed of the former's former husband by slicing him up and sealing him in plastic baggies. Neat, huh? Or Jackknife Johnny, the Vietnam veteran who is... 'strung out at night on your morphine and meth.' Of course we can't forget Nurse Rosetta, who causes the ruin of all ... 'I can't hold back no more' cries the holy man.

Not only do the lyrics on this album prove more interesting than on some of Cooper's last few efforts, but the vocals and musical arrangements have also improved. Cooper may very well be back on the road to recovery.

It's hard to pick a favourite from this album, but ahead in the running, it's got to be 'Inmates (we're all crazy)', which ends the album with a rousing mass chorus of 'We're all crazy'. Indeed we are.

I am really looking forward to the Jethro Tull concert tonight. I've been told he puts on a fine show. This is going to be a busy weekend - George Thorogood and the Destroyers in the Commodore on the 14th, George Benson in the QE on the 15th, and Rod Stewart in the Coliseum both nights. Next Wednesday sees the Tom Robinson Band in the Commodore and Eddie Money in the Coliseum. The word is that Supertramp will be in Vancouver with Dire Straits for an open air concert at Empire Stadium on July second. More on that later if it proves to be true. It sure would be welcome. Lets hope that the people in charge of the facilities don't screw up.

2. Okay let's start. Saute onion and celery in butter until soft and yellow.

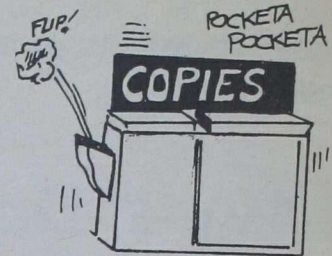

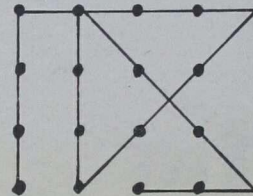

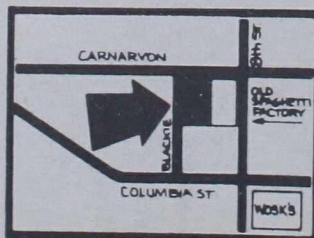

Running Commentaries

I'd like to pass on an interesting story about a 71 year old grandmother who runs the marathon.

Mrs. Lindgren, a California resident, celebrated her 71st birthday by running a marathon-that is 26 miles, 385 yards.

She didn't start running until she was nearly 62. "But it was so beautiful," she says about her first marathon in northern California's Humboldt Redwoods State Park. "It was just like a fairyland in the redwoods."

She had a history of illness ever since she was two. She says, "After I started running, I never had another cold. I've been sick once in nine years. I had a real bad type of flu. I had it for three

hours."

For her age-group, Mavis Lindgren is the U.S. marathon record holder if not the world. Runner's World magazine, which keeps track of such facts, can't find another American woman over 64 who has even run a whole marathon. "Supposedly there is a lady marathoner in Sweden who is 72," Mavis says. But she adds, "I think she walsk."

She trains for each marathon. At last word, she had run five. She ups her weekly mileage from 30 to about 50 miles. She does 15 or 16 miles two or three times a week and fills in the other days with shorter runs.

Mrs. Lindgren exemplifies the sport of running--that age is no barrier.

Sports chairperson job description

5. Superstars '78, held last December, was organized to be an

annual event at BCIT. Theoretically, it is not required to be held but it is the hope of the organizers that each subsequent sports rep will keep the new tradition going.

Superstars '78 was a small event, but one should realize that this was only its first year, and that with some keen organizers at the head of it, it will grow each year held. The sky's the limit here. Who knows? In a few years, Superstars could be a major college sports event involving BC Students competing against professional athletes. (In any case, I hope to enter next year as an alumni.)

Does it look to you like just a little job? Well, any job is what one makes it and one gets out of something what one puts in. There are countless things an ambitious person can do to make her/himself not an adequate but an excellent Campus Recreation Chairperson. So if you are even remotely interested in running, please come into my office and talk with me. I'd love to talk with you about my successes and flops, and all of your ideas.

By the way, it feels good to be involved and to accomplish something.
