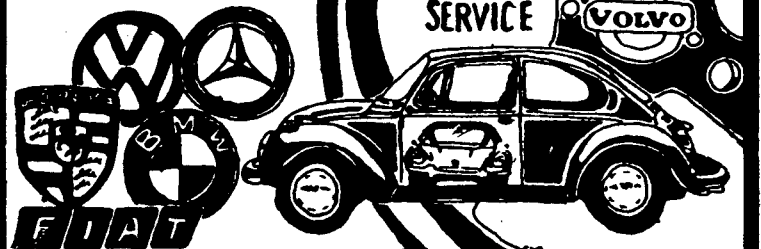

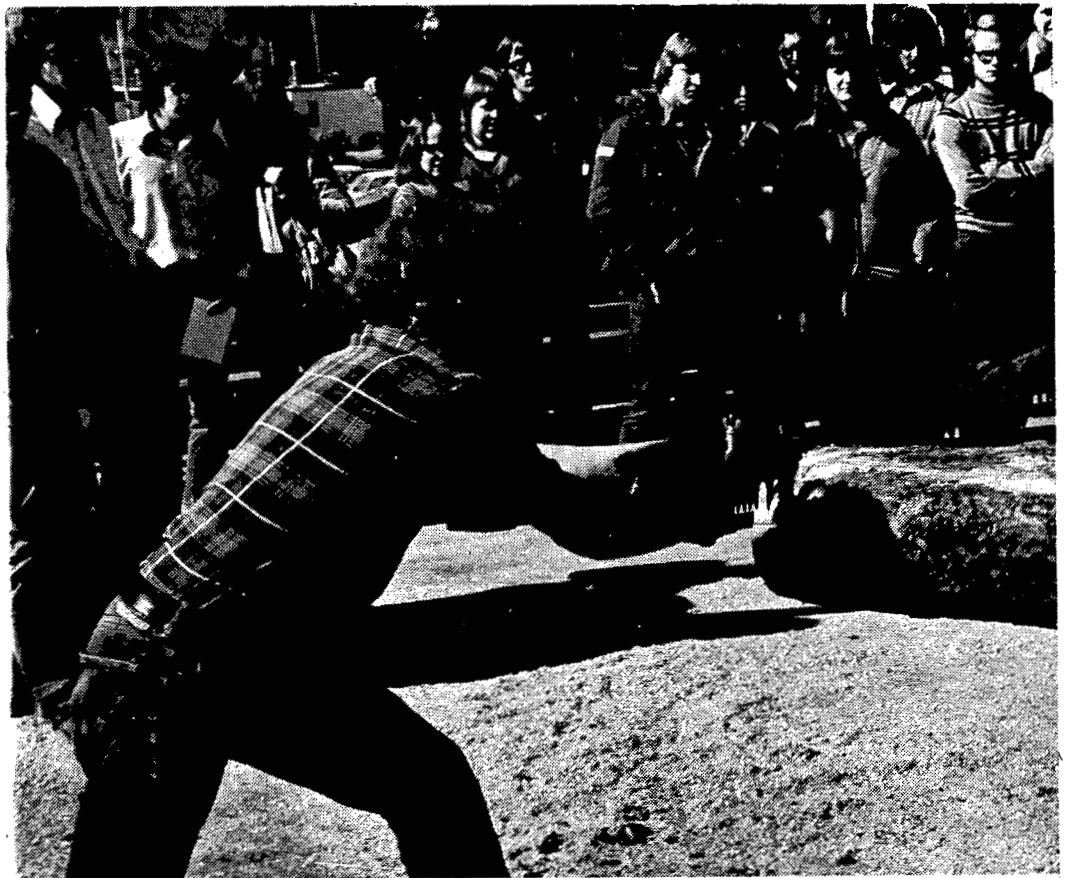
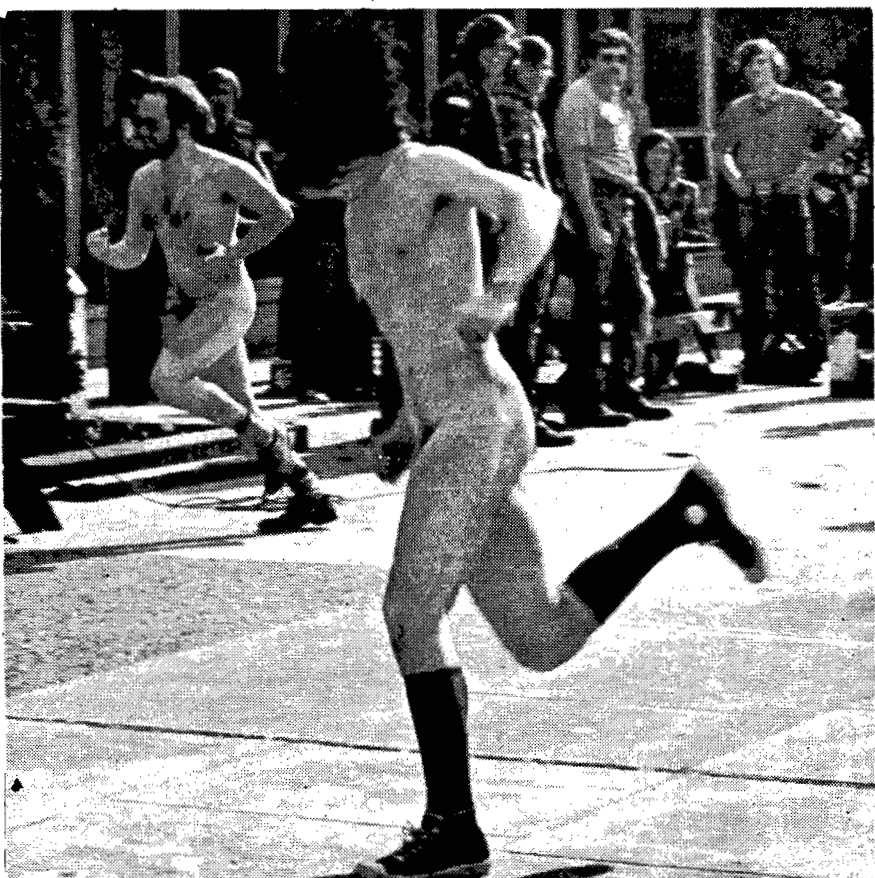

STUDENT EVALUATION FINAL

1. WHAT PHYSICAL IMPROVEMENTS DO YOU THINK SHOULD BE MADE TO THE STUDENT ACTIVITY CENTRE? WHAT ADDITIONAL SERVICES SHOULD BE OFFERED THERE?

I feel that this is a very important question in view of proposed SAC expansion. Any expansion committee should take a careful look at student desires in this area. This is one building that should have a students first priority.

To no one's surprise, the greatest demand was for an honest to goodness lounge, with comfortable furniture, no music, no games, no noise. Music belongs in a music room and games in a games room say the majority of students and those two requests were #7 and #4 in order of desirable improvements.

The second-largest concern to students about the SAC building is the food. That should surprise no one who eats there either. The general consensus is that food is overpriced, lacks variety and just doesn't constitute a decent meal. Pace was mentioned specifically by several students as a big rip off.

Closely following this, an almost equal amount of students want something done about the physical appearance of the SAC. Drapes, carpeting, murals, graphics and comfortable furniture were among the suggestions to help change the cold, stark interior of the building.

Tied with the games room in fourth place in student desires, was the call for more pool tables. Squash and handball courts placed eighth and more pinball and other games (eg. football) were ninth in suggested improvements. Also mentioned were shuffleboard, bowling, an ice rink and more tennis courts (with night lighting) in the area of recreation.

The fifth most popular request was for a larger cafeteria and number 6 was for better music over the intercom system. If I'm not mistaken, that means CKLG-FM at the very least. For some reason, we often lose sight of the fact that this is a STUDENT building, not an office where music drones on to help us work better. If there's one thing most students have in common, it's pop music. If we don't like it, we should turn it off in the office or re-evaluate the use of the sound system.

A permanent place for a pub rated seventh (tied with the music room) in popularity and there was a three way tie for tenth spot. The three were, a dentist, a steam and sauna room and a massage parlor.

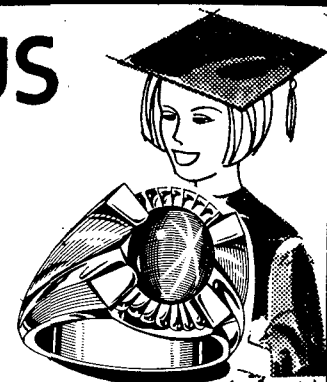

a reflection on the grads themselves.

If there are a few energetic souls wishing more than a regular pub for graduation please see Gerry Poitras as soon as possible. There will also be a grad meeting Monday, April 1 at 7:00 p.m. in the SA Committee Room.

Lesser mention was given to a host of other ideas such as more stores (e.g. drugs), T.V. monitors, a typing room, art displays, an information centre, a theatre, government gasoline and church services. Some people requested a second gymnasium and a swimming pool; these people need an information centre.

The most often repeated theme was "move the pinball and games out and make a lounge". For clarification sake, I will list in order the 10 priorities that students feel should be given to SAC expansion or improvement.

- a comfortable quiet lounge
- better food services
- improved decorations and furnishings
- games room - more pool tables
- larger cafeteria
- better music on P.A.
- separate pub - music room
- squash and handball courts
- more pinball and games
- massage parlor - dentist - steam & sauna room

2. WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE B.C.I.T. PUT ON CONCERTS, ROCK OR OTHERWISE?

84% of those answering this question say "yes".

Rock was the favorite, but folk, jazz and classical were also mentioned. This seems to be a fairly strong mandate for the S.A. to pursue the idea of evening concerts.

What kind of entertainment or activities would you like to see offered during the Wednesday Break?

It's noteworthy to mention that 15% of students were completely satisfied with the present Wednesday break activities. A further 13% stated that they were far too busy to partake in any activities and used the time to do assignments. Over 25% favoured concerts as the type of entertainment they wanted. Films were a distant second, followed closely by speakers and lectures and there was also a strong call for more sports.

Other suggestions included club demonstrations, a noon hour pub, dances, plays and an organized bridge tournament.

Students also requested a schedule of Wednesday noon activities and more publicity and information about clubs.

3. WHAT DO YOU THINK THE CONTENT OF THE LINK SHOULD STRESS?

There is a lot of feedback here for present and future Link Editors to consider. The students seem divided on whether they want the Link to be a slightly controversial news magazine or a hard news fact sheet. One thing they are in unison about is that it must stress campus activities, both upcoming events but more recapping of what just happened and what it was like.

Along with this, most students expressed a strong desire to know what the different techs are doing, and more articles on student problems and opinions. Interviews both of students and other campus personalities were recommended to give the paper a more campus (less SAC) flavor.

Two other frequent requests were for more news on what other schools are doing and a rundown on all student oriented (and priced) entertainment that's happening in Vancouver.

Requests for more student council news ran 9 to 1 in favor. People also want more news about clubs and intermural sports.

Job possibilities, changes in technology and stories of past grads were asked for by some. More poetry and more humor are also in demand.

Many people asked for what the Link already provided, such as want ads, sports scores, etc. Many are oblivious of the fact that a student paper is only as good as the students make it. They feel the Link should pull the school together but don't even volunteer a letter to the Editor. The Link staff must go out and spend more time interviewing students and therefore create some kind of forum for exchange of opinion even if it is solicited. Basic theme - student news.

Do you think a hard cover year book is a valid expenditure of your activity fee?

69% of students said yes and a further 4% specifically stated a soft cover would be preferable.

4. WHAT IS THE BIGGEST DOWN ABOUT GOING TO SCHOOL HERE?

Far and away, the work load and the amount of time to do it in is the heaviest thing students face. All other problems seemed minor in comparison and 43% of students said this was their number one hassle.

- Teachers
- Getting to the school
- Exams
- High school atmosphere
- Too much pressure
- Living in the city
- No money

Most of the problems involved work load or other classroom related items such as pressure. Who determines how hard a student must work? The exam structure is a large source of frustration to students, as are boring instructors as they feel helpless to remedy the situation.

What is the best thing about going to school here?

Every story should have a happy ending and this one is no exception. The biggest single source of delight to B.C.I.T. students is...their fellow students. This was followed closely by the courses and the knowledge gained from them. The third most popular thing about B.C.I.T. is the fact that it's only two years in duration. As many people thought that the teachers here were a high point as though they were a sore point. Other sources of joy were the school atmosphere, good job opportunities, the social life, working together, the good reputation of B.C.I.T., inexpensive education, the sports program and the residence.

ELVIS LIVE!

ALL ALAN COMING TO VANCOUVER

Remember screaming girls, leather pants, and "Don't Be Cruel"? Alan brings it all back, as he shakes and shimmers on stage. Being fairly new to the music scene, he is receiving tremendous and familiar audience response. ALAN will be touring the United States and Canada with possible recordings in the near future.

No! You did not see "Elvis Presley" in Vancouver the other night, but you may have seen a young man who acts, looks, sings and simply is "Elvis" on and off stage. His name is "Alan" and he is billed as "A Tribute to Elvis".

With the real Elvis in short supply and the demand so great, Alan has become a show stopper everywhere he performs. It has been a long time since crowds waited in line for forty minutes as they do to receive an autograph or close-up glimpse of the man called "Alan." It was no different on Alan's last performance at the Seattle Airport Hilton when Alan performed two shows. Act One was early Elvis with all the hip swinging, leg movements that made Elvis famous. The second Act-Alan, now attired in Elvis 1970 style, belted out hit tunes with the same ease Elvis does himself.

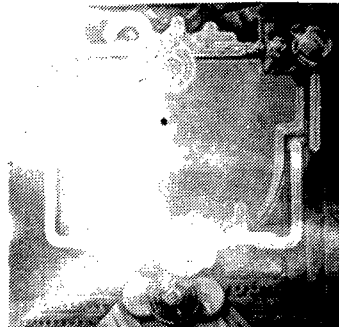

When people start talking about heavy bands, somewhere along the line someone will mention Deep Purple. They have always been ahead of their time in music, putting out such albums as MACHINE HEAD, WHODO WE THINK WE ARE, MADE IN JAPAN and now...BURN! In the last few years it seems as though many of the super heavy bands, Led Zeppelin, Black Sabbath, etc., have been putting out real duds. Not so with Deep Purple. Although the band is somewhat changed member wise, their music is consistently heavy but most important of all, it is always good. The vocals on BURN are done by David Coverdale and Glenn Hughes and are not exactly alike those on any of their other albums. This album has more of a blues character to it and once you hear 'Mistreated', I guarantee that you will like it. Jon Lord puts a great deal into his keyboard arrangements on BURN and once again there is more electric piano in amongst the individual cuts like there was way back when Deep Purple first began.

The only hang-up about the album is that the distributors, Warner Bros., have raised the list price from the usual \$6.29 to \$7.29 so you can expect to pay a slightly higher price for BURN. It's worth every cent!

Energized is a good work to describe Foghat as a group and this, their third album, proves it. Both the first album FOGHAT and the second, ROCK & ROLL were outstanding, good, fast and powerful music. This album, ENERGIZED, makes it definite that Foghat is one of the best heavy rock and roll bands around.

Foghat is made up of what was at one time the original Savoy Brown who became successful over here in North America with a cut called "I'm Tired." Although Savoy Brown is still putting out records, they're not what they used to be. Foghat is a band best described as being 'tight' which means that they really know how to put their music together. Each cut is really fine and there are no long, boring riffs which tend to put most people to sleep.

There are eight songs on the album. All of them are really good although "Wild Cherry", "Home in my Hand" and a real oldie, "That'll Be the Day", are the best. If you go out trying to find this album and can't, it's because ENERGIZED is one of those albums everyone gets turned on to at the same time. Pick it up and find out why!



...very personal, very special

BRUCE COCKBURN AT THE EGRESS

Last Friday I had the good fortune to catch the act of singer-songwriter Bruce Cockburn at the Egress. For those of you not familiar with Cockburn (pronounced Coburn), he's from Ottawa originally and still calls that city home. While not enjoying commercial success to the extent of Lightfoot, Anne Murray or Neil Young, he is still a subtle presence in Canadian music. That he has a following in Vancouver was evident from the several enthusiastic sell out crowds at the Egress during his run.

In person, his appearance suggests an air of... well, normalness. A plain undistinguished face is topped with short cropped blond hair. His wire frame glasses with clear, rounded lenses add to the image and his simple, woodsy clothes complete it.

But when he sits down to sing, it becomes immediately apparent that this guy is anything but ordinary. He still writes and sings about what might be considered ordinary subjects but his lyrics, singing and playing all combine to say something very personal and very special.

Another facet is his finely balanced sense of humour, either in normal conversation or on stage between numbers. This translates into a good stage presence, something not always found in performers who sing such personal songs. A good example of this is one of his songs, called When The Sun Goes Nova, a beautifully written song which pokes fun at over-zealous songwriters who make sweeping statements.

This last song mentioned, incidentally, is from Cockburn's latest album, Night Vision. Since he was on stage for an hour and a half he played songs from all his four albums. It's a long set for one performer, but he carried it off, switching instruments several times. He excels on guitar but also plays piano, banjo and dulcimer. Near the end of the set he was joined by his producer, Eugene Martyn, and they played a couple of pleasing guitar duets.

Bruce Cockburn doesn't usually get out to the West Coast so the next time he comes, get out and see him. If you like hearing tasteful, intelligent lyrics sung with a clear voice and backed by first rate playing, you won't regret going.

JACK BENNY BENEFIT CONCERT

Jack Benny will be performing as violin soloist in a special benefit concert for the "Save the Orpheum Fund.", with the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra conducted by Kazuyoshi Akiyama, at the Orpheum Theatre on Friday, April 5th, 1974 at 8:30 p.m.

In the early 1930's Jack Benny turned to radio, developing his own format, which has been imitated on several other radio shows, the combination comedy-variety-continuity show. He was one of the first to good-naturedly kid the commercial plugging his sponsor's product. He was definitely the first comedian who would play straight for other people in the show, who had laughs turned on himself as often if not more often than he'd turn them on others.

There was always music on Jack's show, but the orchestra leaders were characters on his program instead of merely baton-wavers. Ted Weems, Frank Black, Don Bestor, Johnny Green, Phil Harris and Bob Crosby were all of orchestra leaders on Benny's show.

After Jack Benny became a radio personality, he was sought more than ever for pictures and has made a score of them since 1933.

In 1950 Jack Benny started his television program, he won eight Emmy's for excellence of program before he decided he wanted to do other things and discontinued his regular weekly TV show in 1965. He now appears in one or two Jack Benny Specials a year, does four or five guest appearances, and spends the rest of his time touring the country.

His latest enthusiasm is performing as violin soloist with the top Symphony Orchestras in North America and he has already appeared with eighty symphonies, raising over five and a half million dollars, with all proceeds going to the orchestra fund or the orchestra pension fund. He has been invited to solo with every Symphony Orchestra in the United States and eventually hopes to cover them all.

S.E.T. CRITERIA

The Society of Engineering Technologists of the Province of British Columbia in it's role as the Certifying body for Engineering Technicians and Engineering Technologists in B.C. defines an Engineering Technologist in the following:

- A graduate of an accredited curriculum in an Engineering Technology who has completed two years of satisfactory practical experience in employment following graduation may be certified as an Engineering Technologist by the Board of Examiners and approved by the Council of the Society.

- The curriculum followed by the Engineering Technologist shall have been based upon a core of applied science and applied mathematics generally including topics such as differential and integral calculus, an introduction to differential equations, statistics, linear algebra and Computer Science which will permit the graduate to use Mathematics as a tool in the synthesis of designs or in the analysis of technical problems.

- The curriculum will also have included the fundamentals of science and engineering applicable to a particular branch or specialty of engineering technology, taught in terms of the mathematics core.

- The academic and theoretical portions of the technical curriculum will have been reinforced by suitable laboratory experiments and exercises amounting to approximately one-third of the total academic curriculum.

- The occupational functions of the Engineering technologist vary widely. In a technical capacity he may progress from the relatively simple tasks of the recent graduate to complex technical responsibilities which are comparable to those of professional engineers and engineering supervisors, where the exercise of judgement is required and responsible decisions are essential.

- Where professional decisions are required, the engineering technologist will always find himself associated with professional engineers in either a subordinate or a supervisory capacity.

- In an administrative capacity, the engineering technologist may gravitate away from purely technical responsibilities, assuming instead the responsibilities of administration and management up to the highest levels.

nical responsibilities, assuming instead the responsibilities of administration and management up to the highest levels.

- The engineering technologist may carry out a wide range of complex work processes under general direction in areas such as engineering, production, marketing, maintenance, quality control, quantity surveying, inspection and supervision of construction activities. He may be employed as a technical sales representative and in all of the levels of responsibility related to technical sales.

- He evaluates his assignments, determines the objectives, defines the problems and determines the procedures to effect solutions to the problems, either to interpret the creative ideas of engineers or on his own initiative, (he will often be the only technical authority in a plant, especially in the smaller plants). He schedules work to meet the objectives and participates in long and short range planning.

- He may supervise and co-ordinate the activities of engineering technologists, engineering technicians and skilled craftsmen and he may be assigned administrative responsibility for engineering specialists and scientists. He may often assist in the training of less experienced technical staff including professionals.

- The Engineering Technologist is a vital part of the "Engineering Team" and he should consider strongly the above points in practising his profession.

point in law

The following legislation is now before the B. C. government. It reads:
BILL NO. 75 - Residential Premises Interim Rent Stabilization Act. Introduced by the Hon. Attorney-General

Would provide that any tenancy agreement entered into renewed on or after the 1st of January 1974 no landlord shall charge a rent that is greater than eight per cent more than the amount of rent charged during the last rental period of 1973. Would require refunds to tenants of increased rent paid on or after

January 1, 1974, to the extent that such increases exceed the allowable maximum. The Lieutenant Governor in Council would have the power to exempt certain residential premises. Would permit councils of municipalities or regional districts to apply for exemption on the grounds that it is unreasonable to require a rental ceiling in their municipality or district.

Sources in Victoria report that the bill is currently in its first reading, and should become law by April 14th.
